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ADL OBTAINS A SHOW CAUSE ORDER
AIMED AT STOPPING PLO LEADERS FROM
ENTERING THE U.S. TO ADDRESS UN

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (JTA)—The Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith obtained a show cause order in a federal court today aimed at preventing Yasir Arafat and other Palestine Liberation Organization leaders from entering the United States on the grounds that their "crimes of murder, acts of barbarism and savagery" put them into a category of persons prohibited by U.S. law from coming into the country.

Judge Mark A. Constantino has scheduled a hearing for 11 a.m. tomorrow in the Eastern Federal District Court in Brooklyn on the order requiring the federal government to show why the PLO representatives, who are coming here to address the United Nations General Assembly, should not be denied entry to the U.S.

Lawrence Peirez, the ADL's attorney in the suit, submitted a list of 234 acts of terrorism committed by the PLO, and plans to submit documentary evidence on 158 of the incidents at tomorrow's hearing. The suit, which was filed by the ADL and Seymour Graubard, its national chairman, Dore Schary, honorary chairman, Benjamin R. Epstein, national director, and Arnold Forster, general counsel, also asked as an alternative that if the PLO leaders are admitted their travels and activities should be supervised and restricted. Peirez said, as an example, restrictions could prohibit their participation at public rallies, speaking engagements, and at any other actions that do not deal specifically with the UN debate on the Palestine Question.

#### Past Precedents Cited

At a press conference at ADL headquarters, Graubard said the ADL believes that the PLO leaders should be barred to prevent any harm to American lives or property that might result from their visit, since the PLO has threatened action against anyone who supports Israel. He noted that he and the other three petitioners along with other American Jewish leaders have been given police protection at various times because of police information of danger to their lives. He stressed while he did not believe the PLO leaders would personally try to kill anyone they could meet with "thugs" or set the situation for later terrorist acts. Graubard's affidavit noted that "history has shown that the only souvenirs of their (PLO) travels are death, violence and tragedy."

Peirez said there were several cases when the U.S. had barred persons from attending UN sessions because of their past criminal activities. He said none of these people committed as serious crimes as the PLO had admitted to having done. He noted that in 1954 the then U.S. Ambassador to the UN, Henry Cabot Lodge, told the UN that the U.S. agreement with the UN does not include admitting "desperados and triggermen" to the U.S. Peirez labelled the PLO leaders as "desperados and thugs."

The ADL suit is filed against Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger, Attorney General William Saxbe and Treasury Secretary William

Simon, all of whose departments can bar foreigners from the U.S. Peirez said he asked for the government to produce a Central Intelligence Agency recording of Arafat in Khartoum in 1973 applauding the murder of the American Ambassador.

STATE DEPARTMENT'S LEGAL DIVISION TO CONSIDER ENTRY OF PLO LEADERS

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Yasir Arafat, the Palestine Liberation Organization's leader, has not yet asked for a visa to enter the United States as a result of the United Nations vote allowing the terrorist group to participate in its debate on the Palestine Question. State Department spokesman John King said today that apart from the five PLO members who had asked for visas a week ago through the UN Secretariate in New York, no other visa requests have been made for PLO members to his knowledge. The Department, he said, has not yet 'processed' visas for those who had applied for them.

King's statement came during questioning on the suit filed earlier today in Brooklyn Federal Court by the Anti-Defamation League of B'nai B'rith to bar PLO officials from entering the United States or, at a minimum, limit their travel and access rights if entry cannot be forbidden. King said that the Department's legal division will "respond appropriately at some point" in the proceedings. An unanswered question is whether persons regarded as criminals by the United States may be permitted to enter this country regardless of the agreement between the UN and the U.S. that admits access to those accredited by the UN.

Reports from the Middle East indicated that not only will Arafat make an appearance—even if for only 24 hours at the UN headquarters in New York—but that he will be virtually escorted there by a top level Arab delegation. Among those reported as expected to come with Arafat are Lebanese President Suleiman Franjieh, Arab League chair—man Mahmoud Riad, Morocco's King Hassan II, who was chairman of the recent Arab summit conference in Rabat, Algerian President Houari Boumediene, all representing "non aligned nations," and possibly Pakistani Prime Minister Zulfikar Ali Bhutto, who is the Islamic conference chair—man, and Somali President Siad Bare, who is the chairman of the Organization of African Unity.

### ARAB LEAGUE ASKS UN DEBATE BE DELAYED TO NOV. 13: APPROVAL EXPECTED

UNITED NATIONS, Oct. 31 (JTA)—United Nations Secretary General Kurt Waldheim has received a request from the Arab League for postponement of the scheduled opening of the General Assembly's debate on the Palestine Question from Nov. 7 to Nov. 13, a UN spokesman said today. The spokesman said that Waldheim, who received the request from Arab League Secretary Mahmoud Riad, would begin consultations on the request which is expected to be approved.

#### Sadat Rejects U.S. Proposal

It was reported from Cairo, meanwhile, that Egyptian President Anwar Sadat has rejected an American proposal for further negotiations on an Israeli withdrawal from Egyptian territory captured in 1967. Sadat was quoted as telling Egyptian

journalists at a press conference in Rabat that Israel must withdraw from all occupied Arab territories, not Egyptian territory alone. "Israel wants to foment trouble among the Arab countries by creating sensitive situations. Withdrawal should take place on all Arab fronts," Sadat said. He also reportedly said he had informed Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger of Egypt's position.

Kissinger, in Bangladesh today, said he did not believe the Arab summit meeting in Rabat had foreclosed further Arab-Israeli peace talks but he would hold further discussions with Arab leaders to determine how best to proceed. Reports from Dacca said that Kissinger was planning "a salvage mission" to the Middle East at the end of his current trip to shore up the sagging prospects of further peace talks. The Secretary was quoted as saying that he does "not believe that the door to all negotiations in the Middle East is closed, but what negotiations and in what framework, that will have to be seen,"

### PREDICT GREATEST OUTPOURING FOR MASS RALLY AT UN NEXT MONDAY

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Rabbi Israel Miller predicted today that the mass protest demonstration against the Palestine Liberation Organization outside the United Nations next Monday would be "the greatest outpouring of Jewish community sentiment since the founding of the Jewish State." Rabbi Miller, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, which is sponsoring the rally, said there has been "unprecedented" cooperation on the part of the Conference's 32 constituent organizations. He said the expected postponement of the General Assembly debate on the Palestine issue will not affect plans for the demonstration.

shalls will work with New York City police officials to keep the demonstration "both peaceful and dignified." He said the marshals would be provided by the Jewish War Veterans of the U.S. and B'nai B'rith. B'nai B'rith is also making arrangements to feed and house out-of-town members who are coming to New York to participate in the demonstration.

Council for Histadrut and the Jewish Labor Committee, working together, have won wide support for the demonstration among the country's top labor leaders. Thousands of trade union members will march in a body to the demonstration from a central point, Rabbi Miller stated.

#### Nationwide Participation Reported

He announced the formation of a "Concerned Labor Committee for America" to promote attendance at the rally and to serve afterwards as a continuing instrument of labor support for Israel's cause "for the duration of the crisis." Rabbi Miller reported that scores of Hadassah members were serving as volunteers making telephone calls to urge people to attend the rally. He said the American Jewish Congress has put its public relations department on full-time service to the Presidents Conference in making arrangements for press coverage. The AJCongress is also chartering buses for members of its chapters and divisions to attend the demonstration.

Jewish community centers from as far as Pittsburgh and Cleveland are sending busloads of delegates, the Jewish Welfare Board reported today. The Jewish Community Centers Association in St. Louis plans to fly groups of teen-agers to

New York for the event. The Board of Jewish Education is bringing an estimated 20,000 students from the metropolitan area to the rally.

#### U.S. WILL SPEAK UP DURING DEBATE

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (JTA)--A delegation of Jewish leaders from the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, headed by Rabbi Israel Miller, met this morning with the United States Ambassador to the United Nations, John Scali, and discussed with him the participation by the Palestine Liberation Organization in the forthcoming UN General Assembly debate and the U.S. position in that debate. The delegation received "assurances" from Scali that the United States would not remain "silent and will respond to misstatements" against Israel, Rabbi Miller told reporters after the meeting.

The delegation, which included Dr. William Korey, Yehuda Hellman and Malcolm Hoenlein, also discussed with Scali the attack Tuesday on the PLO office here. Rabbi Miller told reporters that the delegation members told Scali that they did not approve of the attack and, in fact, the demonstration sponsored next Monday is a protest against terror acts. Rabbi Miller said Scali expressed concern that the rally might lead to violence. The delegation, however, promised Scali that the demonstration would be peaceful.

### TERRORIST BASE SHELLED By Yitzhak Shargil

TEL AVIV, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Israeli naval vessels shelled a terrorist encampment near Rashidiyeh on the southern Lebanese coast last night. A military spokesman said there was no return fire and no Israeli casualties. Foreign press reports today said five Israeli warships took part in the shelling which killed three people and injured 13 in the target area. The sprawling Palestinian refugee camp near Rashidiyeh is believed by Israeli authorities to serve as the base of terrorist gangs that have recently infiltrated Israel or attempted to do so.

Lebanese regular army units fired mortar shells at an Israeli patrol in the Biranit region of Upper Galilee last night. The fire was returned. There were no Israeli casualties. A number of Katyusha rockets were fired into the Birinit region early this morning from Lebanese territory. There were no casualties.

An investigation of the three terrorists killed in a clash with an Israeli patrol near Kibbutz Iftah Tuesday indicated that at least one of them may have been an Israeli Arab serving as a guide. The dead man was wearing a shirt made in Israel. Police are investigating reports that he was born in an Arab village in Galilee and went to Lebanon a year ago.

Meanwhile, security forces were continuing their search for a terrorist gang believed to have entered Israel nearly three weeks ago. The manhunt has been extended from northern Israel to the central regions of the country on the premise that the terrorists may have been aided by local Arabs to leave the border regions undetected. Security sources said it was likely that the terrorists are hiding out because of the high security alert. The alert has been extended to the Jordan River valley where authorities believe new terrorist flare-ups are possible in the aftermath of the Arab summit meeting in Rabat. This morning five days of large-scale military maneuvers on the Golan Heights ended with a ceremonial parade and an overflight of Air Force jets.

## SAUVAGNARGUES MEETS WITH ISRAELI LEADERS; NO UNTOWARD INCIDENTS. By David Landau and Gil Sedan

JERUSALEM, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Foreign Minister Yigal Allon told French Foreign Minister Jean Sauvagnargues at a state dinner here tonight that with the Middle East at the crossroads between war and peace it was vital for the outside world to encourage moderate elements and shy away from words or deeds that might encourage the extremists. The latter were described by Allon as pushing for a new war. "And the most extreme of the extremists, by its words and deeds, is the organization calling itself the Palestine Liberation Organization," Allon said.

His remarks were a pointed reference to France's Middle East policy which has given encouragement to the PLO and its leader Yasir Arafat who met with Sauvagnargues in Beirut only a week ago. "It is enough to read its (the PLO's) covenant," it is enough to recall the chain of murders and sabotage perpetrated by its members and associated units in order to realize that the essence of the PLO is terror," Allon declared. The state dinner at the King David Hotel ended the first day of Sauvagnargues' three-day visit to savagle, the first ever by a French Foreign Minister.

Allon, who is also Deputy Premier, and the French diplomat met in the morning and in the afternoon at the Foreign Ministry for discussions in which the Israeli Foreign Minister reportedly made clear his government's sharp disagreement with French Mideast policies. Sauvagnargues reportedly replied that Israeli criticism stemmed from misunderstanding and a one-sided view of the Middle East conflict. One source quoted him as saying that he understood Israel's fears but suggested that Israel must reach an agreement with its Arab neighbors. "I doubt if you can afford to win more wars," the French visitor reportedly said.

Sauvagnargues was received during the day by President Ephraim Katzir and Premier Yitzhak Rabin and made a ceremonial visit to the Yad Vashem. His wife, who is accompanying him was escorted by Mrs. Allon on a tour of the Hadassah Hospital medical center.

#### Hope For Israel-French Amity

In offering a toast to his guest at the state dinner tonight, Allon expressed the hope that the
friendship that exists between Israel and France
will find its true expression in friendly relations
in the political field as well as in the fields of
economics and culture. He recalled happier days
in Franco-Israeli relations when France aided
Jews in achieving statehood and help Israel defend
itself and develop. "It may be because of the
friendly memories that the present differences of
opinion between our two governments hurt so,"
Allon said.

He said that Israel recognized that France had other interests in the region and did not assume that friends of Israel could not be friends of Israel's enemies. It has been proven, he said, that whoever pursues a balanced policy in the area can maintain its influence in this region.

#### Reception Correct, But Cool

Sauvagnargues arrived at Ben Gurion Airport late last night where he was greeted by Allon. His reception was correct, but cool. About 200 demonstrators turned up at the airport to protest the visit on the grounds that France was allying itself with the PLO. About 150 demonstrators gathered outside the Foreign Ministry this morn-

ing. When Sauvagnargues' limousine drew up they chanted "Arafat assassin, partner of Sauvagnar-gues," a reference to his meeting with the PLO leader.

"Don't barter Jewish blood for Arab oil," and "Remember the children of Maalot." Two of them were detained when a group tried to push past armlinked police. Sauvagnargues didn't seem to notice the demonstrators or the scores of press reporters and photographers as he entered the Ministry building. His face was expressionless. He is conducting his talks with Allon in English.

#### EDUCATORS PROČLAIM 1974-75 WEIZMANN YEAR FOR JEWISH SCHOOLS

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Calling upon "students of all ages" to participate in "Chaim Weizmann Year" by reading and relearning "the lifestory and accomplishments, the words and deeds of one of the greatest figures in modern Jewish history," a meeting of representatives of more than a dozen national Jewish educational institutions and associations set forth a program of assemblies, publications and other projects "in tribute to Chaim Weizmann—scientist and statesman, diplomat and spokesman, servant of his people and the first President of the State of Israel—on the centenary of his birth,"

The proclamation calls for a renewal of Weiz-mann's vision "in tribute to his memory and in solidarity with the people of Israel in the land of Israel." The meeting at which the proclamation was issued was called by Mrs. Charlotte Jacobson, chairman of the World Zionist Organization, American Section, and Dr. Abraham P. Gannes, director of the Department of Education and Culture of the WZO-American Section.

The birthday anniversary itself will be celebrated by an official observance by the World Zionist Organization Executive Nov. 27 at the New York Hilton at which the featured speakers will be Dr. Nahum Goldmann, past president of the WZO and now president of the World Jewish Congress, Pinhas Sapir, chairman of the Executives of the WZO and Jewish Agency and Mrs. Jacobson. There will be a specially prepared filmstrip on the life and career of Dr. Weizmann.

#### UN URGED TO REJECT UNESCO ACTION

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (JTA)—B'nai B'rith to-day called on the United Nations to reject a motion by 34 Arab and East European states to suspend Israel from membership in UNESCO. David M. Blumberg, B'nai B'rith president, said that even consideration of the proposal "is in violation of the UNESCO constitution."

expulsion in UNESCO's constitution, which specifies that ouster from the UN itself will result in automatic loss of membership in UNESCO," Blumberg said. "Since this has not happened, the question cannot properly be put to debate."

WASHINGTON (JTA)—Nineteen prominent Protestant and Roman Catholic religious leaders, meeting here in connection with the 1974 session of the American Academy of Religion, issued a statement sternly criticizing the United Nations General Assembly for its "ill-advised" invitation to Yasir Arafat to address the United Nations. They said the UN action was improper because: Israel is a member of the UN while Arafat represents a group out to destroy Israel; the PLO is committed to terrorism and atrocity "that shock human sensibiliaties"; and the invitation jeopardizes the prospects for peace negotiations in the Mideast.

### SPECIAL INTERVIEW WITH SILVA ZALMANSON By David Friedman

NEW YORK, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Silva Zalmanson believes that only strict monitoring by the American government will ensure realization of the agreement allowing Soviet Jews to emigrate to Israel. She stressed today in an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the Soviet Union does not like to make concessions and only agreed to the deal contained in the exchange of letters Oct. 18 between Sen. Henry M. Jackson (D.Wash.) and Secretary of State Henry A. Kissinger because the USSR needs American trade.

Wearing a blue jacket, white blouse and red skirt, Miss Zalmanson spoke Russian as she was interviewed through a translator at the offices of the Greater New York Conference on Soviet Jewry. The Conference is sponsoring her visit to New York which began with her arrival from Israel Monday night. Her nation-wide three-week tour is sponsored by the National Conference on Soviet Jewry.

Miss Zalmanson's release from a Soviet labor camp last Aug. after she had served four years of her 10-year sentence was directly due to the pressure of public opinion, she said. But she added she was afraid that her freedom might have been only a "symbolic bone thrown to the West" to quiet the international clamor over her case. She expressed fear that others, such as her husband, Edward Kuznetsov, and her two brothers. Vulf and Israel, might not be freed before the end of their sentences. Her husband, who was originally sentenced to death for his role in the alleged conspiracy to hijack a Soviet plane to Israel, had his sentence commuted to 15 years after a worldwide protest. Vulf is serving a 10-year term, and Israel, 8 years.

#### Top Priority For POCs

Miss Zalmanson said she was particularly concerned about the 40 Jewish "Prisoners of Conscience" still in Soviet labor camps and felt that efforts to free them should gain top priority because they were in danger of their lives. Noting her own illness while in a labor camp, she said the Soviet authorities do not provide proper medical attention and the only way to get it is to go on a hunger strike. She has not received any news from her husband since her release, and only one letter from her brothers.

Because of this she expressed concern that the references to the prisoners in the Jackson-Kissinger letters were vague. Malcolm Hoenlein, the GNYCSJ's executive director, noted that Miss Zalmanson had met with Sen. Jacob Javits (R.NY) for breakfast yesterday and he had promised to seek a clearer statement on the POCs. Javits also asked for a list of Soviet Jews who have been harassed since the agreement was announced, Hoenlein said.

Miss Zalmanson said that public pressure in the United States and other Western nations must now be intensified to ensure that the agreement is kept and that the prisoners and other Soviet Jews are allowed to emigrate.

#### Warm Feelings Toward Israel

She spoke warmly of her feelings toward Israel where she has been living for the past two months. She said the people she has met have treated her with great hospitality, frequently bringing tears to her eyes. She noted that she never cried before her enemies but now that she is among her people she lets her tears flow.

"It's like living in a dream," Miss Zalmanson

said. She added that she is still "captured" by her prison experiences and that in Israel she feels as though she is in a movie theater. As for criticism by some Soviet immigrants, Miss Zalmanson said Israel does more for newcomers than any other country. She speaks some Hebrew which she learned before being sent to prison, and remarked that Hebrew textbooks were smuggled to her in prison but conditions were too difficult for her to study.

#### Recalls First Leningrad Trial

Miss Zalmanson, recalling the first Leningrad trial in Dec. 1970 in which she and the others were sentenced, said that the average Russian wanted all of them to be shot. Asked about the Soviet government's charges that she, her husband and brothers, and others at the trial were intending to hijack a Soviet plane, she said the group had planned the hijacking, over the opposition of the Israeli government, because they had no hope and were seeking a miracle.

She said they wanted to stage a demonstration because it was impossible to continue living as they were, never knowing if they would be allowed to go to Israel. She said they always believed that they had a 50 percent chance of being killed and a 50 percent chance of being imprisoned.

Before the Leningrad trial, Israel had urged the United Nations to adopt an anti-hijacking resolution, Miss Zalmanson noted. After the trial, she added, the Soviet Union supported the measure and it was finally adopted. She also noted that after she and her friends were sentenced the Soviet Union began allowing large-scale emigration to Israel because of the publicity caused by the trial.

Miss Zalmanson spoke movingly of the two non-Jews who had joined the Leningrad group and were given even harsher treatment in the camps than the Jews. She said she did not agree with the Israeli government's refusal to grant them citizenship. She said her husband and others will not accept release from their sentence unless the two non-Jews are also released.

#### YATES OPPOSED TO OIL LEASES

WASHINGTON, Oct. 31 (JTA)—Legislation to prevent purchase or lease of American-owned oil lands by the petroleum producing cartel countries or their associates is being prepared by Rep. Sidney Yates (D.III.), the Congressman has announced. In a letter to his constituents in Illinois where he is unopposed for re-election to his 13th term in Congress, Yates said he will introduce his legislation when Congress reconvenes in mid-Nov. to block such control by foreign interests. He said that he has expressed his concern to President Ford, urging him to take steps for the same ends.

The "disquieting answer" that he received in questioning U.S. Treasury officials on the subject Yates declared, is that the Arab nations could sit "on our oil leases" and that "there are no barriers to their participation." Yates said that he considers "appalling, if not dangerous, the prospect that the cartel nations, whose monopolistic price-gouging activities had compelled us to speed up the development of our own energy resources, should be given the opportunity to buy control of our oil lands upon which, to a great extent, our hope for independence is based."

In his letter, Yates said that his questioning at the Treasury Department followed the Administration's announcement that it would welcome investment in the United States by Arab nations of their oil income.
