



KRISTALLNACHT AT THE UNITED NATIONS 100,000 IN RALLY TO PROTEST AGAINST ANTI-ZIONIST RESOLUTION

MASSIVE OUTPOURING FILLS AREA

NEW YORK, Nov. 11 (JTA)--More than 100,000 persons poured into midtown Manhattan today in an angry, militant but orderly and well disciplined mass demonstration of protest against the anti-Zionist resolution adopted by the UN General Assembly last night. Whites and Blacks, Jews and Christians from New York and other cities as far off as Dallas and Toronto packed the garment district.

The human tide filled every block from 42nd to 39th streets and Sixth to Seventh Avenues, chanting and bearing placards with such slogans as "The UN Is Dead"; "Anti-Zionism Is Racism"; "Is the UN the Fourth Reich?"; and "Protect the UN From Its Own Racists."

Hundreds of Israeli flags were waved by young and old as speaker after speaker proclaimed solidarity and support for Israel and declared that it was the UN itself, not Israel, that was wounded by its own action.

Traffic was blocked off from the entire area of the demonstration. Hundreds of police were present, assisted by marshals provided by the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, organizer of the demonstration. Similar rallies were held today in major cities throughout the U.S.

Rallying For Justice, Morality

Rabbi Israel Miller, Conference chairman who presided, told the demonstrators, "The voices of hate are raised against Zionism but are directed at all free people. The Arab and Communist totalitarian dictatorships and their cohorts are again using the big lie to challenge and undermine the values of the civilized world. They must not triumph. They will not triumph. Liberty and justice will live. The Jewish people will live, Israel will live."

Continuing, Rabbi Miller declared: "We are not merely rallying against racism and anti-Semitism. We are rallying for international justice, decency, morality, for liberal democracy, for values which gave birth to the United Nations for the Jewish people and for Israel."

Rabbi Miller warned that the UN resolution "could wreak havoc with Jewish life not only in the Soviet Union--which would now have a UN-approved excuse to crush the movement of those seeking to emigrate to Israel--but in other countries that have permitted local Zionist organizations to function without official hindrance. The effect, not only on Zionist groups but on Jewish life generally, would be catastrophic," Rabbi Miller said.

Message From President Ford

A message from President Ford to the Presidents Conference was read at the rally. The President said, "Your gathering here today is a reaffirmation of the American belief in justice and basic human values. I salute you for the depths of your conviction and for the spirit which motivates this rally." The President's message

went on to say:

"We strongly deplore the linkage of Zionism and racism. We are equally firm in our belief that racism, in its real form, should cease to exist. The United Nations is weakened and its credibility suffers when it takes action, under whatever guise, which serve only to debase the principles upon which the UN was founded and to which its charter is dedicated. I assure you the United States will remain steadfast in its support of freedom and democracy, justice and the rights of all people."

Tumultuous Cheers For Herzog

Israel's Ambassador to the United Nations, Chaim Herzog, was greeted with tumultuous cheers when he rose to speak. Referring to his dramatic gesture after the General Assembly vote last night when he tore the anti-Zionist resolution in view of all the delegates, Herzog declared, "I tore it up in your behalf and thus, for we Jews, it no longer exists."

The Israeli envoy largely reiterated his remarks before the General Assembly last night. (See separate story) He said here today that while addressing the Assembly, "I somehow sensed at that moment the feeling of the Jewish heart beating as one throughout the world." He praised the U.S. delegation to the UN and observed that the European community, too, stood up for Israel in "a most impressive manner." Herzog added that for the first time in many years, "the majority of the Black African nations refused to support an anti-Israel resolution in the face of Arab pressure."

'Master Of Our Own Fate'

Mrs. Leah Rabin, wife of Israeli Premier Yitzhak Rabin, who addressed the rally, declared that Jews will no longer be objects of persecution because there is a State of Israel. "We are the master of our own fate," she said. "We are the only ones to decide our future." She declared that the Jewish people, combined with Israel, constitute a strength that has made anti-Semitism meaningless.

Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R-NY) told the rally: "As one who has been a diligent supporter of the United Nations since its founding, I am hard put to continue my support for the UN in the face of criticism by my colleagues in the Congress, if such offensive nonsense as this latest PLO-inspired resolution is given the solemnity of a document of the United Nations itself. And when a tyranny of the majority runs it through the General Assembly, the American people have every right to demand to know what kind of an organization it is that their tax dollars are supporting."

Disservice To Black People

Bayard Rustin, the civil rights leader, and Manhattan Borough President Percy Sutton spoke for the American Black community. Rustin declared that "the racists who enslaved my people" are trying to make racists out of some of the most prominent defenders of civil rights and opponents of racism who are Jews. He called the anti-Zionist resolution a disservice to every Black person in America because it weakens the real fight against

Racism and apartheid.

Feminist leader Betty Friedan said she joined the protest demonstration "as a woman, as an American and as a Jew." She called on all women to protest and denounce the racist resolution adopted by the UN. Fay Schenk, president of the American Zionist Federation, said the attack on Zionism is clearly an attack on the Jewish people. "When Zionism is attacked, Judaism is attacked," she said. Clarence Mitchell Jr., a member of the U.S. Mission to the UN, said those countries that voted against the anti-Zionist measure were "voting out of conscience that impels them to stand for freedom and democracy."

The Rev. Paul Moore, Episcopal Bishop of New York, said that all Christians are spiritually Jews and that in a moment of great danger such as the present one, not only Jews are threatened. He expressed support of Zionism and the right of Israel to live in peace and security.

A large contingent of the Jewish Defense League attended the rally. They carried a huge banner proclaiming "Herzog Was Right. The Jewish Leadership Must Be Changed." The slogan was a reference to Herzog's recent criticism that Jews in the U.S. and in Israel reacted too passively when the anti-Zionist draft was first adopted by the General Assembly's Third Committee last month. Herzog explained subsequently that his criticism was directed at the Jewish man-in-the-street, not the American Jewish leadership.

HERZOG: UN VOTE RECALLS KRISTALLNACHT OF NOVEMBER 10, 1938

UNITED NATIONS, Nov. 11 (JTA)--"It is symbolic that this debate, which may well prove to be a turning point in the fortunes of the United Nations and a decisive factor as to the possible continued existence of this organization should take place on November 10th. Tonight 37 years ago has gone down in history as Kristallnacht or the Night of the Crystals. This was the night on Nov. 10, 1938 when Hitler's Nazi storm troopers launched a coordinated attack on the Jewish community in Germany....It was the night which led to the most terrifying holocaust in the history of man."

This link with the infamous Kristallnacht was made by Israel's Ambassador Chaim Herzog yesterday just prior to the vote in the General Assembly on the resolution which termed Zionism "a form of racism and racial discrimination." The resolution was adopted after a four-and-a-half-hour debate by a vote of 72-35 with 32 abstentions.

Tears Up Resolution

Herzog in a speech that traced the history of Zionism concluded by angrily tearing up the resolution, after declaring that "for us, the Jewish people, this resolution based on hatred, falsehood, and arrogance, is devoid of any legal value. For us, the Jewish people, this is no more than a piece of paper and we shall treat it as such." He was roundly applauded.

Earlier Herzog told the General Assembly delegates that "I stand not here as a supplicant. Vote as your moral conscience dictates to you. For the issue is not Israel or Zionism. The issue is the continued existence of this organization which has been dragged to its lowest point of discredit by a coalition of despotisms and racists."

Herzog added that "For us the Jewish people, this is but a passing episode in a rich and event-filled history. We put our trust in our Providence, in our faith and beliefs, in our time-hallowed traditions, and in our people wherever they may be."

In his speech, Herzog noted that it was fitting "that the United Nations, which began its life as an anti-Nazi alliance should 30 years later find itself on its way to becoming the world center of anti-Semitism. Hitler would have felt at home on a number of occasions during the past year, listening to the proceedings in this forum, and above all to the proceedings during the debate on Zionism."

Israel Shown In Contrast

Herzog after contrasting the freedom Arabs enjoy in Israel with the discrimination against Jews in Arab countries, declared:

"We are being attacked by a society which is motivated by the most extreme form of racism known in the world today....Look at the tragic fate of the Kurds of Iraq. Look what happened to the Black population in southern Sudan. Look at the dire peril in which an entire community of Christians finds itself in Lebanon. Look at the avowed policy of the PLO which calls in its Palestine Covenant for the destruction of the State of Israel, which denies any form of compromise on the Palestine issue and which, in the words of its representative only the other day in this building, considers Tel Aviv to be occupied territory."

Switching Of Votes

The vote yesterday found 29 countries switching their vote on the anti-Zionist resolution from the 70-29 vote with 27 abstentions which the General Assembly's Third Committee adopted on Oct. 17. Among those voting in favor of the resolution yesterday were Gambia, Grenada and Rwanda who earlier had abstained, and Burundi, Equatorial Guinea, Maldives, Sao Tome, who were registered as not voting in the Third Committee.

Among those opposed yesterday were Fiji, Honduras, Malawi and Swaziland, who had earlier abstained; and the Central African Republic, El Salvador and Panama, who had not voted in the Third Committee.

Among the countries that abstained yesterday were Burma, Chile, Gabon, Mauritius, who voted in favor Oct. 17; Ecuador, who had opposed the resolution; Argentina, Bhutan, Bolivia, Greece, Guatemala, Paraguay, Thailand, Trinidad-Tobago, all of whom did not vote in the Third Committee. Romania, which had abstained on Oct. 17, and Spain, which voted for the resolution, did not vote yesterday.

David Wilson, the Liberian representative, in opposing the resolution yesterday, noted that he had not heard one word in the General Assembly or the Third Committee explaining what makes Zionism racist. He also deplored the fact that the debate on Zionism caused the delegates to obscure the argument against apartheid.

RABIN: UN RESOLUTIONS PART OF A PLAN TO REMOVE ISRAEL

JERUSALEM, Nov. 11 (JTA)--Premier Yitzhak Rabin told the Knesset today that yesterday's three UN resolutions were initiated by the Arab states as part of a plan aiming at the eventual replacement of Israel by an "Arafat State."

"Their aim is to ostracize Israel...to negate Israel...in order to prepare the political conditions required for the intensification of their struggle against the very existence of Israel as an independent state...to prepare the ground for the estab-

lishment of an Ararat State instead of Israel and upon her ruins."

Rabin spoke at the start of a special debate on the resolutions. Government and opposition whips quickly got together to draft a joint resolution which they hoped would gain the support of all factions, barring the New Communists (Rakah) and, possibly the Orthodox Agudat Israel which has ideological difficulties accepting Zionism as Jewry's liberation movement.

Rabin repeated his statement of yesterday that Israel would never sit with the PLO and would have no truck with the committee set up by the Assembly to ensure implementation of the Palestinians' rights.

Sparing In Criticism Of Egypt

He gave no hint, however, of any action that Israel might take in the wake of the three resolutions which, he said, should be viewed as one entity. There were no implied threats to retaliate against the UN presence or participation in Middle East politics and peacemaking, or of intentions to leave any of the UN's subsidiary organizations.

Rabin was sparing, too, in his references to Egypt's role at the UN. The "content and timing of the resolutions," he said, "contradict the positive trend of events that was implicit in the Israel-Egypt interim agreement.... But peace can only be achieved through respect of Israel's rights, existence, aims and security. We shall continue to pursue this course, despite bitter disappointments, despite selfish appeasement of the oil-rich...."

Urges Jews To Stand Firm

The Premier called on world Jewry to "stand up against the plot being woven against us--as Zionism, Judaism, the State of Israel and the Jewish people are one and the same thing." The Jewish faith was imbued with the idea of the return to Zion, Rabin said, and this ideal had always unified the nation. "I call upon the Jewish communities in the diaspora to work with greater effort and energy and devotion to ensure the safety and security of Israel and the Jewish people."

Joint Commission Meets

Meanwhile, the Israel-Egypt Joint Commission met at Balasa in the Sinai again today for its second meeting to discuss aspects of the disengagement agreement. Only military personnel took part. But officials here said Israel would insist on civilian participation at the third meeting, the date of which is still to be announced. The agreement is being implemented according to schedule with Egyptian nationals due at the Ras Sudar fields this weekend.

CONGRESS TO REASSESS U.S. RELATIONS WITH THE UN

WASHINGTON, Oct. 11 (JTA)--A Congress angered by the United Nations General Assembly's adoption of a resolution equating Zionism with racism moved today to reassess the United States' relations with the United Nations.

Sen. Hugh Scott (R., Pa.), the Senate Minority Leader, introduced a resolution with 30 co-sponsors calling on the Senate Foreign Relations Committee and the House International Relations Committee to begin hearings immediately on further U.S. participation in the General Assembly. The resolution was unanimously accepted.

In the House, Majority Leader Thomas O'Neill

(D., Mass.) introduced a resolution calling for the House International Relations Committee to hold hearings on future American involvement in the UN as a whole. "I despair for the future of the UN and I wonder how useful it can continue to be," he said.

Rep. John Rhodes, the House Minority Leader, in associating himself with O'Neill, noted he was co-author of the House resolution supported by 436 representatives which condemned the anti-Zionist resolution adopted by the General Assembly's Third Committee and urged the Assembly to reject it. The Senate adopted a similar resolution.

House Adopts Resolution

However, Rep. Robert Kastermeir (D., Wisc.) offered a procedural objection to O'Neill to have his resolution adopted by unanimous consent. However, the House voted 384-0 to adopt the O'Neill-Rhodes resolution.

The Scott resolution urged "energetic effort by all concerned with adherence to the United Nations" to obtain "reconsideration" of the anti-Zionist resolution "with a view to removing the subject of Zionism which is a national but in no way racial philosophy, from the context of any program or discussion focussing on racism or racial discrimination."

The resolution also says that "the Congress strongly opposed any form of participation by the U.S. government in the 'Decade of Action (by the UN) to Combat Racism and Racial Discrimination' so long as that decade and its program remain distorted and compromised" by the anti-Zionist resolution.

Thorn Warns Of Evil Consequences

Meanwhile, at the UN, Gaston Thorn, President of the General Assembly, warned that the Assembly's action last night had "evil consequences" that would be perceived only too soon. He castigated the 32 nations which abstained in the vote on the anti-Zionist resolution, asking, "How could they have abstained from accepting their responsibilities?"

Although he made it clear that he spoke as Premier of Luxembourg, Thorn's remarks were viewed as unprecedented criticism by the head of the General Assembly of a decision taken by that body. "I fear that the evil consequences of this vote will appear only too soon for all, including those who were its instigators. I can only hope that this realization will allow a sufficiently large number of delegations to put things right," Thorn said.

ISRAEL BITTER AT UN VOTE

JERUSALEM, Nov. 11 (JTA)--Israel reacted with bitter resentment at last night's vote by the UN General Assembly. A policy paper issued by the Foreign Ministry today described the resolution, adopted by a 72-35 majority with 32 abstentions as "a page torn from the annals of Nazism."

But the Ministry declared, "Zionism will continue to survive and flourish long after the UN resolutions have sunk into oblivion.... The real victim of these attacks will be the UN itself whose moral authority has been destroyed, whose words have ceased to matter and whose decisions are irrelevant to the affairs of mankind."

United States Ambassador Malcolm Toon said after the vote last night that the UN had adopted resolutions "that all mankind will regret" but

affirmed that "these resolutions will have no bearing on the future of Israel and no bearing on the relations between Israel and the U.S.," which he described as "strong and healthy across the board."

The American envoy was referring to the anti-Zionist draft adopted last night and to the two pro-PLO resolutions adopted by the General Assembly earlier yesterday. He made his remarks in the course of an address to the opening session of the Histadrut Solidarity Conference in Tel Aviv, sponsored by the Histadrut Foundation in the U.S. and attended by American trade union delegates.

The World Zionist Organization Executive, meeting in special session this morning, adopted an "emergency plan" for world-wide Jewish counter-action. Acting chairman Leon Dulzin said the WZO would call on Jews in countries which supported the anti-Zionist resolution to raise the issue strongly with their respective governments no matter how unpleasant that task might be. Dulzin said that the action of governments which voted to equate Zionism with racism clearly did not reflect the opinion or will of the people of those countries.

In a radio interview, World Jewish Congress President Nahum Goldmann said the vote was "one of the most immoral" ever taken by the UN General Assembly. It was an "absurd perversion" of history and sought "to deny the Jewish people their right to statehood," Goldmann said. He called for a momentous world Jewish reaction expressing a renewed and all-embracing Jewish identity with the State of Israel. The WJC, he said, would do all it could to raise such a reaction of "total identity" by world Jewry for Israel.

JEWISH LEADERS CONDEMN RESOLUTION

NEW YORK, Nov. 11 (JTA)--American Jewish leaders all over the nation today denounced the anti-Zionist resolution adopted by the UN General Assembly last night, branding it an act of cynicism and anti-Semitism, a distortion of fact and falsification of history that has dealt a mortal blow at the principles for which the UN is supposed to represent rather than to Israel, Zionism and the Jewish people against which it was directed. They also praised the U.S. delegation to the UN, the Ford Administration and Congress for their unequivocal opposition to the resolution.

Mrs. Charlotte Jacobson, chairman of the American Section of the World Zionist Organization, said that the two pro-PLO resolutions and the anti-Zionist resolution were a form of racism—that represented "a black day in the history of the United Nations." Addressing an emergency meeting of the WZO-American Section Executive here, she accused the Assembly of "flying in the face of both logic and history" in what was its "day of infamy."

B'nai B'rith President David M. Blumberg called on governments "which respect truth and decency" to suspend financial support of the UN "until the General Assembly breaks the stranglehold of the Arab bloc and undoes the shameful action" of equating Zionism with racism. Blumberg said last night's vote will "undermine the UN just as surely as the failure to condemn Fascist aggression in the 1930s led to the collapse of the League of Nations."

Elmer L. Winter, president of the American Jewish Committee termed the anti-Zionist resolution "the most shameful of all anti-Israel resolutions adopted by the UN bodies and committees to date."

Frank R. Lautenberg, United Jewish Appeal General Chairman, said the resolution "is a moral outrage against humanity. Anti-Zionists are anti-Semites—bigots in mind and heart. Today, we are all Zionists. Today, who threatens Israel, threatens not only every Jew, but all who care for the future of decency, integrity and democracy."

Raymond Epstein, president of the Council of Jewish Federations and Welfare Funds, said that "An unholy alliance of totalitarian and barbaric dictatorships has attempted to equate the existence of a democratic Jewish homeland founded in social justice, with the very evils which it was created to help eradicate. This action will rebound only to the shame of those who have perpetrated it."

Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, president of the American Jewish Congress, charged today that "the United Nations has become a willing tool in the Arab campaign against the territorial integrity and legitimacy of the State of Israel." He added, "It is time for the free nations of the world seriously to consider the value of the UN as an instrument of peace—and their own participation in it."

Seymour Graubard, national chairman of the B'nai B'rith Anti-Defamation League, declared that the UN "is now the crucible for anti-Jewish hatred and no longer deserves the support of the American people and the American purse."

The Agudath Israel of America, at its 53rd national convention in Atlantic City, NJ, adopted a resolution condemning the UN action which it said, is "an attempt to deny the divinely-accorded rights of the Jewish people to the Holy Land, and as such an abominable act against the entire Jewish people."

Rabbi Fabian Schonfeld, president of the Rabbinical Council of America, declared that the UN resolution was "not an attack on Zionism, it is an attack on all of Jewry; it is an attack on the human race and is merely an effort to label black as white by a vote of cynical politicians and diplomats."

Rabbi Mordecai Waxman, president of the Rabbinical Assembly, said the Assembly vote is "almost a reversion to Hitlerian Nazism," and that the resolution itself "is an indictment of the moral state of the world today." Mrs. Sarah Shane, president of the American Mizrahi Women, said that by adopting this measure, the UN committed an "obscene and anti-Semitic attack against the Jewish people and men of good will everywhere." Harold Ostroff, president of the Workmen's Circle, called the anti-Zionist resolution "a victory for the fifth column infiltrators of the UN."

In Montreal, the Canada Israel Committee said today that the "despicable event at the United Nations on Black Monday, Nov. 10, may well be the beginning of the end for the noble dream of a United Nations founded as an alliance against Nazism 30 years ago. The UN today has become a forum for anti-Semitism. The Canada Israel Committee is proud of the Canadian government's opposition to this virulent attack on the Jewish people and religion."

But the CIC viewed with dismay Canada's abstinence on the UN resolution calling for the PLO to participate in the Geneva talks. The CIC added: "We will call upon the Canadian government to begin a serious reassessment of its relationship to and participation in the United Nations."

In New York, the Student Mobilization for Israel announced it was sponsoring rallies on college campuses across the country to protest the resolution.

TEXT OF UN RESOLUTION

UNITED NATIONS, Nov. 11 (JTA)--Following is the text of the anti-Zionist resolution adopted by the UN General Assembly last night.

The General Assembly, Recalling its Resolution 1904 (XVIII) of 20 November, 1963, proclaiming the United Nations declaration on the elimination of all forms of racial discrimination, and in particular its affirmation that "any doctrine of racial differentiation or superiority is scientifically false, morally condemnable and socially unjust and dangerous" and its expression of alarm at "the manifestations of racial discrimination still in evidence in some areas in the world, some of which are imposed by certain governments by means of legislative, administrative or other measures,"

Recalling also that, in its Resolution 3151 G (XXVIII) of 14, December, 1973, the General Assembly condemned, inter alia, the unholy alliance between South African racism and Zionism.

Taking note of the declaration of Mexico on the equality of women and their contribution to development and peace, proclaimed by the World Conference of the International Women's Year, held at Mexico City from 19 June to 2 July, 1975, which promulgated the principle that "international cooperation and peace require the achievement of national liberation and independence, the elimination of colonialism and neocolonialism, foreign occupation, Zionism, apartheid, and racial discrimination in all its forms as well as the recognition of the dignity of peoples and their right to self-determination."

Taking note also of Resolution 77 (XII) adopted by the assembly of heads of state and Government of the Organization of African Unity at its 12th ordinary session, held in Kampala from 28 July to 1 Aug., 1975, which considered "that the racist regime in occupied Palestine and racist regimes in Zimbabwe and South Africa have a common imperialist origin, forming a whole and having the same racist structure and being organically linked in their policy aimed at repression of the dignity and integrity of the human being."

Taking note also of the political declaration and strategy to strengthen international peace and security and to intensify solidarity and mutual assistance among nonaligned countries, adopted at the Conference of Ministers for Foreign Affairs of nonaligned countries held at Lima from 25 to 30 Aug., 1975, which most severely condemned Zionism as a threat to world peace and security and called upon all countries to oppose this racist and imperialist ideology.

Determines that Zionism is a form of racism and racial discrimination.

WEST EUROPE ALMOST UNANIMOUS IN BRANDING ANTI-ZIONIST RESOLUTION

PARIS, Nov. 11 (JTA)--Western Europe is practically unanimous in branding last night's United Nations vote equating Zionism with racism as "unfortunate," "ill advised" and "encouraging extremist elements." Holland has already announced that it will no longer cooperate with the United Nations anti-racist program and Luxembourg is considering similar steps.

Dutch Foreign Minister Max Van Der Stoep who announced his government's decision, said the resolution "is a danger for the United Nations itself." He said under "these circumstances, the

Dutch government will no longer be able to cooperate with the anti-racism program."

In Luxembourg, government circles said the government will consider "concrete steps" as a result of the resolution vote. The sources said a final decision will be taken only after the return home of Prime Minister Gaston Thorn who is also President of the General Assembly.

In West Germany, where Israel's Foreign Minister Yigal Allon arrived today, the Association of Roman Catholics described the resolution as "ill advised" and encouraging "to extremist elements." The Association's president, Bernhard Vogel said "It will help those forces which aim at Israel's destruction." Holland, Luxembourg, West Germany and France were among those nations opposed to the resolution in last night's vote.

Call For A Demonstration

In Paris, the influential evening paper "Le Monde," in a front page editorial described the resolution as "regrettable for both moral and political reasons." The paper added "morally, it is shocking that the people who has suffered most as a consequence of racism should be charged with this offense." The paper stressed that the vote was reached "by a coalition which includes Saudi Arabia, which disseminates anti-Semitic forgeries, and Uganda whose President praised Hitler."

In Paris, local Jewish organizations have called for a protest meeting which will take place next Monday in the city's largest hall, "Salle de la Mutualite." Jewish organizations have issued communiques branding the vote criminal and disastrous for the United Nations itself.

In Eastern Europe, official press agencies praised the resolution. The Soviet news agency, "Tass," in a two paragraph dispatch from New York, said it was "a major decision taken by the international community in spite of inadmissible pressures to which it has been submitted by Zionist and international imperialist elements." It said "the resolution denounced Zionism as the ideology of imperialism."

In East Germany, the ADN news agency hailed "a great success for the just cause of the Palestinian people of Palestine" and "an encouragement."

Israeli Foreign Minister Yigal Allon said this morning at the conclusion of a five-day visit to Holland "The resolution marks the bankruptcy of the United Nations." He stressed that "the nations supporting the resolution have jeopardized the chances for peace in the Middle East" and "encouraged extremist and undemocratic elements."

ANGER, INDIGNATION SWEEPS THROUGH BRITISH JEWISH COMMUNITY

LONDON, Nov. 11 (JTA)--Britain's Jewish community reacted today with anger and indignation to the passage of the three pro-Arab resolutions in the United Nations General Assembly yesterday, especially the resolution equating Zionism and racism. Jewish leaders here said the immediate effect of that resolution will be to enhance Jewish unity and strengthen the ties of the diaspora with Israel.

But they expressed grave concern that the resolution might restrict Zionist activities in less democratic societies and encourage anti-Semitism throughout the world.

A British Foreign Office spokesman told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that Prime Minister Harold Wilson's government "has made its stand

abundantly clear in the General Assembly" and was not considering any further statements on the issue of the anti-Zionist resolution. Britain voted against the resolution.

Speaking on behalf of the Board of Deputies of British Jews, Lord Fisher of Camden described the anti-Zionist vote as "a blatant and cynical act of international label." He added: "The sickening hypocrisy displayed by certain states within the UN is a grim reminder that anti-Semitism did not disappear in the ruins of the Third Reich." Lord Fisher thanked the British government and those of the other countries which took a stand against the resolution--"for their courage and steadfastness."

Will Unite World Jewry

Speaking on behalf of the British Zionist Federation, Malvyn Benjamin, chairman of the ZF's public relations committee, stressed that "this obscene act has done more to unite world Jewry with Israel than a thousand speeches."

The ZF statement continued: "We are not prepared to stand by passively in this monstrous and crude attempt to stamp anti-Semitism with international respectability. Whatever moral authority the UN ever possessed has now disappeared. Just as nobody listens to the convicted murderer advocating the sanctity of human life, so no heed will be paid to a slanderer claiming concern for the brotherhood of man."

A statement by the Israeli Embassy in London issued today said the anti-Zionist resolution was part of a year-long campaign being waged at the UN by enemies both of Israel and peace. "The Zionist movement was in the vanguard of the drive to liberate oppressed peoples," the Embassy statement said. The British press so far has reported the facts of the UN votes without any comment.

60 PROMINENT WOMEN CONDEMN UN ANTI-ZIONIST RESOLUTION

NEW YORK, Nov. 11 (JTA)--Sixty prominent women today sent a telegram to UN Secretary General Kurt Waldheim, General Assembly President Gaston Thorn and Assistant Secretary General Helvi Sipilä condemning the anti-Zionist resolution.

"As women committed to the worldwide struggle for human rights and equality," it is "our unanimous conviction that all human rights are indivisible. We are appalled at the 'racist' label applied solely to the national self-determination movement of the Jewish people. We decry this implicit denial of Israeli statehood and this incitement to worldwide anti-Semitism." The resolution, they continued, is the "first and only time an authentic movement for national and ethnic survival would be condemned as racist. This resolution endangers the moral principles of the United Nations Charter by abandoning them to cynical political expediency."

KADDISH FOR THE UN

DALLAS, Nov. 11 (JTA)--In an emotionally charged session, the 3000 Reform delegates to the 53rd biennial assembly to the Union of American Hebrew Congregations uttered a prayer for the dead (Kaddish), pronouncing the "moral collapse of the United Nations" as a result of the international body's approval of the resolution equating Zionism with racism.

Led by youth delegates, the representatives of 715 Reform congregations signed their names to a 100 foot-long petition to be sent to UN Secretary General Waldheim. The petition said: "We stand shoulder to shoulder with our brethren in Israel. We are Americans, we are Jews, we are Zionists."

Upon receiving the UAHC's award as an outstanding American and Jew, Philip M. Klutznick, former UN Ambassador to the Economic Committee, and chairman of the governing council of the World Jewish Congress, called the action "a plain lie, clumsy, and a stupid act." He asserted that this doctrine adopted by the UN "could only harm the welfare and movement of international peace."

He indicated that this step represents "a very tough question for the American people and Congress regarding our relationship to the United Nations." He added: "This may be one of the saddest days for the entire world. I hope it does not precipitate the kind of chain reaction that may bring us back to the days of what occurred to the League of Nations. If that were to happen, then we are on the brink of something much bigger than what a General Assembly resolution could mean."

DETROIT CITY COUNCIL BRANDS UN VOTE

DETROIT, Nov. 11 (JTA)--The Detroit City Council today adopted unanimously a resolution condemning the United Nations anti-Zionist resolution. Council President Carl Levin read the text of the city's resolution at a specially convened press conference at which the position of Zionism was outlined. Jewish, Catholic and Protestant representatives were present as well as leaders and members from the white and Black communities to express their disgust at the UN resolution. The press conference was broadcast live by all radio and television stations in the city.

In a similar action the Los Angeles City Council also adopted a resolution condemning the UN anti-Zionist measure and condemned those who took a stand for it. It also commended those who voted against the measure.
