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ISRAELI PLANES HIT TERRORIST BASES IN LEBANON FOR THIRD CONSECUTIVE DAY By Yitzhak Shargil

TEL AVIV, May 8 (JIA) - Israeli Air Force planes struck today for the third consecutive day at terrorist bases in Lebanon. There were two sep arate attacks today, one in the morning in an area south of the Zaharani River and the second in the afternoon against, terrorist concentrations near the village of Rehan, 15 kilometers north of Metullah, which was the target of yesterday's

Reports reaching Israel from south Lebanon are that the attacks are having an effect. There are reports that in some places the local popula tion is demanding the removal of the terrorist bases from their area. There is a growing numb of people leaving the large cities and they are filling the roads leading northward to Beirut.

While the Lebanese government has been denouncing the Israeli attacks, it was learned that it was also trying to get the Polestinian terrorists to abide by an agreement prohibiting terrorist activities against Israel from Lebanese bases, The terrorists have rejected these demands.

The United States has been urging Israel to discontinue the air attacks. But Premier Menach em Begin reportedly told U.S. Ambassador Samuel Lewis at a meeting yesterday that Israel will continue to hit the terrorists any time it feels it is necessary. (In Washington, State Department spokesman Hodding Carter said today "The continuing Israell air strikes are contributing to an already dangerous situation. We are urging that those air strikes be stopped." Expanding on a comment he made yesterday when he said that the U.S. is "increasingly concerned about violence in Lebanon, Carter added" "We understand fully that these raids are not occurring in isolation They are accurring against a backdrop of terroris activities aimed at Israel and that those attacks have taken innocent lives.

Lebanon Rejects Begin's Proposals

· Meanwhile, Lebanese Premier Selim of-Hoss has rejected Begin's call yesterday for Lebanon to begin peace negotiations with Israel. He said the Israeli attacks on Lebanese territory was blackmail. "It is out of the question that terror and in timidation will force Lebanan to break its ties.... with the common Arab destiny," he said in a statement carried by the state-run Beirut Radio.

Hoss also rejected a demand by Israel that Syria withdraw its 30,000-man force in Lebanon. The future of this force is expected to be discussed at a meeting between Lebanese President Elias Sarkis and Syrian President Hafez Assad.

Begin's proposals were made in a Knesset speech yesterday. During that time he also suggested that the problem of some 165,000 Pales tinians now living in Lebanon be solved by reset tling them in Saudi Arabia, Syria, Iraq and Libya. Hoss rejected this proposal, too, declaring that "everyone knows that Israel is the cause of the Palestinian tragedy through their displace-, ment from their land." He added that "any solution for this crisis which does not provide a just solution for the Palestinian people's case through ensuring their legitimate national rights cannot

serve as a proper Middle East settlement." PLO DELEGATION'S VISIT TO MEXICO SPARKS ATTACKS A GAINST ISRAEL, THE UNITED STATES AND EGYPT

MEXICO CITY, May 8 (JTA) -- The Jewishcommunity here is deeply disturbed by the visit to Mexico several days ago of a delegation of the Pal estine Liberation Organization which became the occasion for an upsurge of anti-Israel, enti-American and anti-Egyptian propaganda. The PLO group was the guest of the Mexican Communist Party (PCM) which sponsored their public appearances in

cluding a press conference.

The delegation included the Palestinian poet Mahmud Darwish and Abdel Rahman, editor of the magazine "Palestine," who charged that "American imperialism is developing a conspiracy against the Palestinian people to liquidate freedom of movement and promote the Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty in order to surround Syria and help (President Anwar) Sadat against isolation in the Arab world.

Sergio Nudelstejer, secretary general of the Central Jewish Committee of Mexico and represenrative of the American Jewish Committee in Mexico and Central America, reported on the activities of the PLO visitors and their left ist supporters. He noted that the PCM and other left-wing political movements have been legalized and may participate in the next parliamentary elections to be held July I.

In their propaganda they always stress the strug-gle of the "Palestinian people against Zionist imperial san; " Nudel stejer said. They accuse Israel of sending weapons to Nicaragua, Argentina, Chile and other right-wing military regimes in Latin America. Nudelstejer produced samples of anti-Semitic, leaflets directed against Israel and prominent local Jewish personalities. He said that Mexico probably will be the site of next year's Conference of Arab Federations in Latin America.

VANCE SAYS U.S. WILL DEAL WITH ANY PALESTINIAN ARABS ABOUT FUTURE OF THE WEST BANK, GAZA, BUT NOT WITH THE PLO By Joseph Polakoff

WASHINGTON, May 8 (JTA) -- Secretary of State Cyrus Vance said today that the U.S. would deal with any Palestinian Arabs about the future of the West Bank or Gaza Strip regardless of their political leanings provided than they live in those areas.

However, he reiterated under questioning by members of the House Foreign Affairs Committee, that except for such matters as the security of the U.S. Embassy personnel in Beirut, the U.S. would not deal with the Palestine Liberation Organization until it accepts Security Council Resolution 242 and recognizes Israel's right to exist.

Vance appeared to supercede the testimony given by Harold Saunders, Assistant Secretary of State for Near-East and South Asian Affairs, who told the same committee two weeks ago that the U.S. could have "informal" contacts with the PLO in the peace process without violating the U.S. agreement with Israel. Vance said "We are free to do what is in the interests of the U.S. but we will always consult with Israel." Israel's position to that if the U.S. has contacts with the PLO it would be violating the letter and spirit of the second Sinai interim agreement of 1975 which

contains the prescribed two conditions. When pressed about "informal contacts" with the PLO, he replied, "If people are residents of the West Bank, we are prepared to discuss the peace process with them regardless of their policities." However, he told Rep. Lester Wolff (D. NY) that the U.S. might talk with a West Bank mayor "who may have PLO leanings" but "not with the PLO as such,"

When Rep. Paul Findley (R. III.), a supporter of the Palestinians, asked about Vance's assertion that "we are free to do what is in the interests of the U.S.;" the Secretary replied; "As a matter of law, this is correct burl have spelled out what I meant." Vance said the U.S. knows about the PLO position through discussions with Syria and Lebanon.

Findley asked if "direct talks would not be better," and Vance replied "not necessarily." When Findley pressed as to whether "you are satisfied with the present circumstances," the Secrefary replied, "Under our commitments that we have made we are doing the best we can:"

CAPUCCI GETS NEW POST IN EURÔPE By Lisa Palmieri-Billig

VATICAN CITY, May 8 (JIA) - Pape John Paul II offered a new job yesterday to the controversial Greek Catholic Bishop Hiturion Capucci at a private audience during which his "unauthorized" attendance of a Polestinian National Council meeting in Damascus was not raised. Capucci was released by Israel after serving 39 months of a 12-year juil sentence for gun-running for the Palestine Liberation Organization.

He was freed in 1977 after intercession by Pope Paul VI on condition he never return to the Middle East. Capucci was assigned to a post in Latin America but suddenly turned up at the Damascus meeting, cousing isrbell protests and a statement by the Vatioan that his trip there was "unauditorized." He had been waiting in Rame for a month for his audi-

ence with the new Pope.

Capucci, the former Melchite Bishop of Jerusalem, will now administer to Melchite groups in France, Belgium, Luxembourg, The Netherlands and Switzerland; the Vatican said after the audience. With Capucci at the audience was Patriarch Maximos V Hakim of Antioch.

Asked if Capucci's attendance at the Palestinian talks had been raised during the Papal audience, Maximos sold "No, it was not discussed. That is water under the bridge. It is all over." He added, "In any case, no one can stop (Capucci) loving the Palestinian people. This is perfectly in keeping with the spirit of the Catholic Church."

Maximos said that many subjects were discussed at the meeting with the Pope, including Lebanan, Jeruyalem and "the forces for peace in the Middle East." He did not elaborate beyond saying, "I repeated my opinion that there can never be a lasting peace in the area without a solution being found to the problem of the Alestinian people."

CONNECTICUT SUPREME COURT RULES IN FAVOR OF BEIT HAVURAH

NEW YORK, May 8 (JTA) -- The American
Jewish Congress today hailed as, "a major victory
for religious freedom" a decision by the Connecticut Supreme Court holding unconstitutional zoninglaw restrictions on the operation of religious
institutions.

The decision was handed down this morning on, an appeal from a ruling by the Norfalk, Conn., zoning, board limiting the number of doxs when the members of a Jewish congregation known as Beit Hawrah (House of Fellowship) may worship and spend the night in the nine-room converted farm house that is their synagogue.

Beit Hovurah was represented in the appeal by Nathan Pershowitz, director of the A Jongress' Commission on Law and Social Action. Wesley Horron of Hartford served as co-counsel, The Litchfield County Court of Common Pleas had upheld Beit Havurah's status as a house of worship but rejected its objection to the zoning board action restricting overnight worship to certain holidays specified by the Board.

In 1975 some 40 young Jewish professionals purchased the farm house in Norfolk, about 40 miles northwest of Hartford, it was shortly thereafter that the Norfolk zoning board said Beit Havurah did not qualify as a permitted "church or other place of worthip."

The Supreme Court reversed this aspect of the

lower court's ruling. Justice Ellen Pefers, speaking for three of the court's five members, held
that constitutional guarantees of religious liberty
bar governmental agencies from determining
which activities of a religious institution/may be
limited under zoning regulations. Any "accessory use" of its facilities by a church or synapogou
the court soid, must be viewed as part of its religious mission and therefore as immune to governmental regulation or restraint, unless it is
found to be a public ruisance.

Commenting on loday's decision, Henry Siegman, executive director of the AlCongress, declared: "The direct effect of the court's ruling is that Beit Havurah's use of its property for Jewish worship and religious study may not be limited to days and hours set by a zoning board on the basis of its notion of an institution's religious beliefs.

"However, the principles laid down by the court as the basis for this ruling go much further. They effectively guarantee the right of churches synagogues and other religious institutions the right to conduct their operations free of burdensome and arbitrary zoning regulations."

FLAP OVER RELEASE OF TERRORISTS By David Landau and Yitzhak Shargil

JERUSALEM, May 8 (JTA) -- Premier Menachem Begin's government is in for a severe bufeting because of its release of 3/6 Patestinian terrorists for one Israelli prisoner last March and she sevelation yesterday that at least 33 of the Palestinians had been serving maximum sentences for outrages that needed in loss of life or injuries to Israelli soldiers and civilians.

Two no-confidence motions filed in the Knesset yesterday by the opposition Labor Party and the Shai faction are expected to be defeated — but only because coalition discipline requires all members to rally in support of the government against such motions.

Many coalition MKs are, in fact, seething with anger. Yehuda Ben-Meir of the National Refigious Party. said today that he sympathized fully with the apposition motions and while he will have to back the igovernment, he will do so with a "heavy heart." Ben-Meir seemed to echo the majority sentiment in the Knesset when he observed that the release of the terrorists was "one of the most serious mistakes ever committed by any Israeli government."

He revealed what had been shrouded in secgacy until new — that the decision to make the lopsided prisoner exchange was taken by the Ministerial Defense Committee by a narrow 4-3 majority. Neither the full Cabinet nor the Knesset's Foreign Affairs and Security Committee was

It was learned today that Begitt, Defense Minister. Ezer Weizman, Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon and Health Minister Eliezer Shostak woted in favor of the exchange. It was opposed by three non-Likud Gabinet members -- Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan, Interlor Minister Yosef Burg and Justice Minister Shouel Lange.

Covernment Taken To Task

The government is also being taken to task, for lack of candor in the affair. Labor Party chaiman Shimon Peres accused it of deliberate misrepresentation when it claimed, at the time of the exchange, that two-thirds of the released prisoners were common criminals serving time for non-terrorist related offenses and that none of the

rest were "well-known" temorists. Until the list was published in Yediot Achronot yesterday -- after it appeared in terrorist propaganda pamphlets -- the government had refused to divulge the names of the refeased prisoners.

Most serious, according to the apposition, is the effect the exchange will have an israel's war against the terrorists. It is bound to serve as a pracedent to encourage the futestinians to capture more Israeli hostages and bargain for the release of other imprisoned terrorists, many MKs said today. Peresobserved that the government's recent decision to apply the death penalty to terrorists convicted of brutal crimes will only make matters worse. That was tantamount to saying "either capture hostages and bargain for the release of your men or we will have them." Peres will

and bargain for me release of your man of and heary them, "Peres said.

Meir Amit, leader of the Shai faction, and other critics, have asked publicly whether Israel will now have the moral right to refuse to negotiate with the terrorists or to risk lives by sending soldiers in to rescue future hostages who might be released in a prisoner exchange.

Begin Defends Action

Begin defending the government's action, denied that he bod ordered the prisoner exchange that was effected in Geneva last March I as a "gesture" toward Egypt. He said he acted out of purely human tarrian reasons on behalf of captured Reserves Pvt. Avraham Anram who had been invitred By the terrorists and might have been executed; Previously, government sources said the humanistana approach had been warranted by the condition of Amram's wife and children.

Meanwhile, the exchange has proved to be a propaganda bonaza for Ahmed Jabril's Popular Front for the Liberation of Palestine-General Command which captured Amron and killed four of his companions in south Lebanon a year ago. They are bosting that they are the first Palestinians ever to succeed in Treeing their comrades and did so without risk to themselves.

The matter has raised new security concerns.
There is no guarantee that the freed killers will not murder again. At least II are reported to have returned to Israel or Israeli occupied territory. According to one report, they are being used to train terrorisf recruits and teach them how to conduct themselves under the pressure of interrogation by Israeli security officers if caught.

Dr., Etian Rubinstein, head of the infectious disease department at Sheba Medical Center in Tel Hashomer, said in a radio*interview today that a woman tourist from Argentina has died of the viral disease. Four Israelis also reportedly came down with the disease but recovered. Rubinstein said the woman, who came to Israel after visiting Spain and France, was first hought to have perupania, but it is now certain that she had Legionnaires Disease.

FOCUS ON ISSUES
REVAMPING ZIONIST EFFORTS IN FRANCE

JERUSALEM, May'8 (JTA) — The recognition of a slow but steady "owakening" within French Jewry, and the desire to foster and encourage it, has prompted the World Zionist Organization to appoint a senior Israeli diplomat, AVI Primor, to the newly-created position of "Delegate General of the WZO and Jewish Agency in France."

Primor, 44, served for six years as Minister-Counsellor (the number two spot) or the Israel Embassy in Paris, leaving in 1976. He is thoroughly familiar with French Jewry — now the second-largest community in the diaspora — and deeply believes in the need, and in his ability, to engender greater identity and Israel—awareness among much broader sectors of it.

Primor flew to Paris last weekend for an intial six-week or inentation stay. He will return to Jeruschem in the jummer to coordinate his buture activities with the various WZO and Jewish Agency departments here, and will take up residence in Paris, with his wife and two children.

after the vacations.

In an interview with the Jewish Telegraphic Agency, Primor said he had been asked to undertake the assignment by leaders of the French Jewish community, among them Zionist Federation head Albert Najmon (a leading leukemia expert) and leading fund-raiser Michel Topict.

Enormously significant Developments

He-had only agreed, however, after WZO chairman-Leen Dulzin suggested he conduct an in-depth shudy-visit, during which he discovered "enormously significant developments that have affected French Jewry since I left three years agos."

Eistly, said Primor, there is a marked new willingness among young people to be Jewishly active and involved. Primor called, together an informal evening meeting of some 200 young people, mostly in their thirties, to discuss the challenge that Dulzin had faced him with.

"I said to them; If I call on you to help me, on an ongoing basis, in volunteer work, will you respond?" He was assured not only that they readily would, but that they could and would bring hundreds of others who would be equally ready to give of their time and energy. Primor noted, too, the warm welcome the received from the old-established leaderships of the various communal arganizations; the Zionist Federation, the Fond's Social Juli fulfie, and the Consisterie

His intention is to create Jewish centers-wherever there are Jewish community of any size Most of the Jews are concentrated in the greater Paris area and on the Mediterranean coast. The Consistoire has already pledged to put its synagogues at his disposal, and he has also been promised the use of the community centers and the put he fonds Social.

Nominally, Primor will be developing Zionist centers. But in 1867, he said, the aim will not be restricted in any way by this label. The purpose is to infuse as many Jews as possible with Jewish and Israel oriented content to their lives.

Increasing Zionist, Aliya Consciousness

Pàradoxically, Primor noted, the weakness of organized communal life in France, compared to other Jewish communities, is an advantage: he will not be fettered by jurisdictional disputes or other extraneous considerations and will thus be able, he hapes, to focus whally on the job'n hand. The second pleasant surprise of his study-visit, he said, was the high quality and competence of many of the Jewish Agency personnel.

The immediate aim, Primar concluded, is-to-ensire that as many lews as possible have permanent, ongoing contact with a Jewish organization (the local Zionist center and through it the Zionist Federation). In the long, run, success will mean more pride and assertiveness on the part of the 750,000-strong French community, and also more Israel-awareness which is the sine qua non for any aliya-consciousness, he stated.

Obviously it is not an overnight process. But Primor believes that objective conditions are ripe for an energetic effort by the Zionist movement, as the representative of Israel and of world Jewry, to catalyze what is perceived as a promising, if belated, bestring within French Jewry.

ONTARIO USING EDUGATIONAL TECHNIQUES DEVELOPED BY CANADIAN HADASSAH-WIZO

MONTREAL, May 8 (JTA). — Techniques developed by the Canadian Hadassah-WIZO's Research Institute in Jerusalem are currently being employed by the Province of Ontario to improve the academic performance of culturally deprived and retarded — younsters.

The techniques, known as Learning Potential Assessment Device (LPAD) and the Instrumental Enrichment Program (IE) were devised by the Research lastifute under the direction of Do. Reuven Feuerstein They are also being used by the Ministry of Educa-

tion in Israel to benefit Arab children.

According to Hadassah-WIZO, the LPAD technique helps create programs of instruction for low
functioning adolescents and adults. It is geared to
madifying the returded performen! Plearning skills,
vocabulary and motivations so that they are prepared
to cope with agademic life. Both are employed by
the Ontacion Institute for Shudies.

Application of the techniques is also being funded by the Ontario Ministry of Education for use in the province's public schools. The Ministry is funding two studies of the effectiveness of IE on teachers and students. LPAD is also being used an academically retarded immates at two English-speaking federal prisons.

Hadassah-WIZO announced that as part of its observance of the International Year of the Child in Canada, it will present copies of Dr. Feuerstein's soon-to-be published book "The Dynamic Assessment of Retarded Performers" to fall universities in Canada that have departments of psychology and education. Each volume will have a book plate marking the occasion and an explanation of Feuerstein's connection with Youth Aliya and Canadian Hadassah-WIZO.
