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CABINET APPROVES AUTOMOMYPLAN Will Serve As 'Guidelines' For Israeli Team By David Landou And Yitzhok Shargil

JERUSALEM, May 21 (JTA) -- The Cabinet today approved a controversial autonomy plan endorsed last week by a majority of the II-member ministerial autonomy committee headed by Premier Menachem Begin. But it decided at the same time not to submit the document to Egypt as Israel's formal position when the negotiations on autonomy for the West Bank and Gaza Strip begin at Beersheba this Friday. The plan will, for the time being, serve as "guidelines" for the Israeli regotiating beam.

By doing this posservers said, The Cabinet

deferred to the view strongly stated by Defense Minister Ezer Weizman last week that the autonomy plan was too hardline and too detailed to serve even as an opening position. That view wa shared to some extent by Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan and Deputy Premier Yigael Yodin. The plan that emerged from the Cabinet today consis ted of 20 points instead of the original 22 submitted by Begin. But although there was some stylistic editing, the substance of the plan re-

Some of the points were adopted unanimous ly and others by a majority. Cabinet Secretary Arye Noor disclosed that two of the points were adopted by votes of 11-4. Other sources identified the negative votes as those of Weizman, Dayan, Yadin and Minister of Social Betterment Yisrael Katz, The substance of these points was not disclosed but they are believed to be Israel's demand to retain control over all publicly owned and uncultivated land on the West Bank and its declared intention to claim sovereignty over the West Bank and Gaza Strip at the end of the five year transition period.

Both Weizman and Dayan had asked to be excused from the six-man ministerial team, head ed by Interior Minister Yosef Burg, that will conduct the negotiations with the Egyptians. Begin refused on grounds that their positions made their participation essential. The Cabinet decided owever, that the entire six-man team need not be present at all of the negotiating sessions. This allows Weizman and Dayan the option of absenting themselves when the negotiations touch on points in the autonomy plan which they oppose.

The other members of the negotiating feam, are Justice Minister Shmuel Tamir, Agriculture Minister Ariel Sharon, and Minister-Without-Portfolio Moshe Nissim. Following approval of the autonomy plan, the Cabinet dissolved the ministerial autonomy committee inasmuch as it has completed its task of drafting the program.

STATE DEPARTMENT EXPRESSES CONCERN
OVER KHOMEINI'S ATTACKS ON THE
UNITED STATES, JAVITS AND HIS WIFE

WASHINGTON, May 21 (JTA) -- Virulent attacks on the United States/by Iranian leaders, including Ayatollah Ruhollah Khomeini, in which the American government was Called, "a wounded snake" and a statement that Sen. Jacob K. Javits (R.NY) and his wife Marion are wanted in Iran for "corruption and misappropriation of Iranian public funds" were assessed by the State D partment today as-being of "concern." But it refused to take a stronger stand

Referring to the attack on Javits, a Department spokesman, Kenneth Brown, said that the "comments such as we have all read on the distinguished U.S. Senator is a matter of concern to us." When he was asked whether anti-Semitism may be involved in the Iranian attack on Javits, Brown said he was "not going beyond that.

When he was asked whether he would go no further than using the word "concern," Brown replied: "Right now, yes." Brown said "we understand that the New York police" are providing security for Javits and that Javits would receive protection in Washington, too. There was a report that former Secretary of State William Rogers has been threatened, too, but Brown said he did not know of any body else except for Javits. Rogers represents the Pahleyi Foundation that was set up by the Shah's family.

Javits himself said "it's just ridiculous" and his office said he would not have any further comment.

Outraged By Senate Resolution

The Iranian Foreign Ministry expressed its out rage at U.S. Senate criticism in a unanimously adop ted resolution last Thursday sponsored by Javits re garding Iran's execution of more than 200 persons including the former Jewish community leader Habib Elkanian. The Iranians told the U.S. not to send a new Ambassador to Teheran and warned that Senate criticism was "interference" that could result in Iran's "limit" of relations with the U.S. At present the U.S. Mission in Teheran is headed by Charge d'Affaires Charles Nass.

The Iranian Foreign Ministry's attack followed Khomeini's remark that President Garter's concern for human rights is a mackery because Carter is un able to deal with "matters such as humanity." He said that "although the American government has condemned us, we have to see what the American people have to say about it because the U.S. government is like a wounded snake at the moment because of our victory. But the people are not like that." He added that "it is they who need us" because of Iranian oil

When asked whether he had a comment about Khomeini's remarks on the "snake" description, Brown replied, "I do not; " He then added "Don't tread on me, " a reference to the slogan on a banner during the American Revolution.

According to reports here, the leader of the Iranian Tribunal, Ayatollah Sodegh Khalkhali, said that Javits and his wife are wanted in Iran because of Javits' position on behalf of the Shah and Mrs. Jav its' service for a public relations firm hired by the Ironian National Airlines during the Shah's reign. Mrs. Javits resigned from the company in January, 1976 after it was said her work might lead to a conflict of interest because of her husband's position.

Reviewing Relations With Iran

Regarding Iran's protest to the United States, Brown said that the U.S. is reviewing. "the state of our relations" and noted "we have been seeking to establish a sound relationship" and "we will continue." He also said "we believe we should put the past behind us," and that "we support the (Iranias)

revolution's objectives, freedom, justice and democratic institutions for the Iranian people. It will not be easy. We wish the government well in the effort to improve the lives of its citizens."

In his statement to the Senate, Byrd pointed out that the resolution was "co-sponsored" by himself, Boker and Frank Church (D. Idaho), chairman of the Senate Foreign Relations Commit tee. "The Senate's action is not interference in Iran's internal affairs. When a government allows systematic executions without due process, that cannot be looked upon as purely an internal matter," Byrd said. ""And certainly, when officials of the Iranian tribunals "issue whaf they could note to assassinate former leaders of that country who now reside in other countries, it

becomes an international affair," he added.

Byrd said, "I want to see good-relations one more between our two countries. However, such relations should not require that we pay the price of silence when faced with this pattern of executions and international calls for assassinations."

## ECONOMIC PLAN IN LIMBO By David Landau and Gil Sedan

ifRUSALEM, May 2I (11A) — The Cabinet reached no decision yesterday on Finance Minister Simcha Ehrlich's proposed five-year economic program aimed atreeducing inflation-by drustic on time when the Cabinet meets in regular session again next Sunday. Cabinet Secretary Arye Noor said after yesterday's meeting that the ministers seemed generally supportive of Ehrlich's plan. It calls for an immediate cut of IL 3.5 billion from the budget and possibly double that amount.

Other measures sought by Ehrlich include a freeze of the civil service work force, higher interest rates on development loans and periodic increases of the value-added tax (VAT). He said he-hoped by these means to reduce the rate of inflation, currently running at 60 percent per annum, to-less than 30 percent.

Ehrlich's program encountered strong opposition from his fellow ministers when he first introduced if a week ago. But the announcement several days later that inflation rose by 8.7 percent in April, the largest percess since Nov., 19-77, sent shock waves through the government.

Skeptical ministers had second thoughts and the prevailing sentiment now is that something must be done to control run-away inflation. Defense Ministre Ezer Weizman, whose attitude was negative, has indicated that he and the Army Ceneral Staff can "live" with proposed cust in the defense budget.

One of thriftin's aims in framing the budget is to provide funds for the redeployment of Israeli forces from Sinai to the Negev, over the next three years without creating additional inflationary pressures. The Likud government is very much aware of the mounting public dissatisfaction with its economic policies that is encouraging apposition attacks.

Three no-confidence motions aimed at the government's handling of the expromy have been filed in the Knesset by the Labor Alignment, the Shai faction and the Democratic Front (Communist). The Alignment will submit another no-confidence motion Wednesday over the government's, housing policy.

The deteriorating economic situation has created strains between the Heart and Erberal Party branches of Likud and within Liberal ranks where Ehrlich has been challenged by Energy Minister Yitzhak Modai. Herut leaders have become increasingly critical of their Liberal partners where the economy is concerned

The Liberals have pointedly criticized certain.
Herut ministers who favor budget cuts only if their own ministries are not affected. Supporters of Ehrlich said at a Liberal Party meeting in Tel Aviv last week that they would favor quitting Likud if Herut attempts to undermine the Finance Minister's proposals.

# KOSHER FOOD FOR JEWISH CONVICTS -

#### BEHIND THE HEADLINES STICKING POINTS IN THE PEACE PROCESS By Yitzhak Shargil

ITEL AVIV. May 21 (JTA) — Some 2000 dynams (500 acres) of cultivated vegetable fields that form a warth of green on the dune-colored Tardscape of northern Sinai may become an embarrassing obstacle to the smooth transfer of El Arish to Egyptian sovereignly next weekend. The fields belong to Neot Sinai, a tiny settlement on the outskirts of El Arish founded seven years ago by the millitant Betar Zionist youth group. Under the transfer program worked out by a joint Israeli-Egyptian committee, they are to be handed over to Egyptim this Friday along with the town of El Arish.

But the settlers are balking. Initially, they refused to relinquish the fields unless guaranteed compensation for them. Last night, joined by some 120 Gush Emunim die-hards and other supporters, they announced they would fight the Military Government's orders and yowed never to hand over the cultivated potches to the Egyptians

To back up their determination, the Neot Strat settlers revived "Etzel," the pre-Strethood underground fighting group that was headed by Menachem Begin. In its original guise, the name was an acronym for Irgun Zvai Leumi (national military organization). In its reincarnation it stands for "Anachau Izerichim Le'Hilahem" (We Hove to Fight).

Itrhak Regev, of the Neot Sindi area settler committee, said yesterday that to give up the vegetable fields would be "or death blow" to the settlement. Last night, groups of settlers and their supporters camped out in the fields although the Military Government has ordered them sealed off as of tomorrow. The settlers have initiated legal action to invalidate the Military Government's orders.

Government circles in Jerusalem, meanwhile take a grave view of the situation, especially as the Egyptians have focussed attention on El Arish es e-test of Istael's compliance with the peace treaty terms. While the government hopes to avoid a confrontation with the militarits, sources in Jerusalem said force may be used to evacuate them if necessary.

## Other Problems Cited

Meanwhile, other problems have cropped up with respect to Neot Sinai which will remain on the Israeli-side of the new demarcation line until the final stage of the Sinai evacuation in three years. Apart from the vegetable fields, the main source of livelihood for the settlers is a loundromat that will find itself on the Egyptian side of the line this Friday. This means that the settlers will have to cross the checkpoint twice daily, produce papers and possibly undergo searches.

The Neot Sinai settlers are used to carrying small ams for personal protection. A serious question is will the Egyptians allow them to carry ams across the line; will the Egyptians allow Stroeli military vehicles to enter the laurdry area? These questions have remained unsettled as the deadline for the transfer of El Arish to Egypt approaches.

# The Future Of UNEF

Still another problem with international ramifications is the future of the United Nations Emergency Force (UNEF) which has been patrol-

ing the buffer zones between Isroel and Egypt since the end of the Yom Kippur War. According to the Comp David accords and the Israeli-Egyptian peace treaty, UNEF will continue its tasks after the new demarcation lines are readed. But there is astrong likelihood that the UN may pull out. On orders from the UN Secretariate in New York; UNEF has taken no part in the Israeli-Egyptian arrangements. If UN observers do remain, they will be far-behind the Egyptian linesofter next Friday.

The Israeli-Egyptian joint military committee has improvised a system to by-pass UNEF if necessary. It calls for combined Israeli-Egyptian patrols in the limited forces zone to observe compliance with peace terms with respect terthe size and equipment of each country's forces. Israel and Egypt will also patrol their respective sides of the new demarcation line.

Meanwhile, it was learned today that President Anwar Sodat will not fly to Ben Gurion Airport next Sunday to symbolize the opening of an air corridor between Israel and Egypt. According to Egyptian sources, the timerable will no premit such a flight. Sodat and Begin are £hèduled to meet in El Arish and then travel by helicopter to Beersheba where both will address the student body and faculty of Ben Gurion University of the Negev. This event will follow the formal transfer of El Arish to Cayotz.

El Arish itself was crowded with thousands of Israelis who traveled there last Saturday for a fare well visit and to pick up souvenirs. Many residents of El Arish went to the Gaza Strip and Tel Aviv to stock up on various goods which they believe will cost more under Egyptian administration. In El Arish itself, students at the Ulpan Akiva and local citizens planted 120 septings in the Peace Forest. The ceremonies were attended by Israeli and Egyptian

WOMEN RABBINICAL STUDENTS UNDER REFORM, RECONSTRUCTIONIST AUSPICES WILL GET TITLE OF RABBI NEXT MONTH By Ben Gollob

NEW YORK, May 21 (JTA) - Ten of the 46 rabbinical students who will receive the title of rabbi in graduation exercises in June under Reform and Reconstructionist auspices are women, according to a Jewish Telegraphic Agency telephonic survey.

Two of the 18 students who will be ordained as Reform robbis on June 6 at the Cincinnati compos of the Hebrew Union College-Jewish Institute of Religion (HUC-3IR) are women. Seven of the 22 candidates who studied at the New York HUC-3IR compus are women. Their graduation exercises will be held June 10 at Temple-Timpus-II here.

One women and five men will receive the title of rabbi at graduation exercises of the Reconstructions's Robbination College in Philadelphia. The ceremonies will be held on June 10 at the Germaniawa Jewish Center, according to Rabbi Ludwig, Nadelmann, associate director of the Reconstructionist Federation of Congregations and Fellowships. He said Linda Holtzman of Philadelphia will be the new Reconstructionist women rabbi. She is being interviewed and is likely to get a pulpit, according to a spokesman for the Reconstructionist Robbinical College.

The two women to be ordained in Cincinnatias Reform rabbis are Vicki. Lee Hollander of Beechwood, Ohio; and Beverly Lerner of Shawnee Mission; Karsas; according to Harald Epstein, notional director of information and development for the Reform seminary.

Large Group In N.Y.C.

The seven women who will be ordained as Reform robbis in New York City on June 10. are: Michal Bourne, Mount Kisco, N. Y.; Ellen Dreyfuss, Chicago; Jan Kaufman, Baltimore; Beverly Magidson, Detroit; Janet Ross, Tarzana, Calif.; Sheila Russian, Cranston, K.I.; and Bonnie Steinberg, Belmont, Mas.

If Robbi-designate Holtzman does get a pul-

pit, she will be one of two women Reconstructionist rabbis -- out of a present total of five Reconstructionist women rabbis -- to hold a pulpit. Rabbi Sandy Eisenberg Sasso is currethly-the only-Reconstructionist women rabbi holding a pulpit. In a unique arrangement, she shares the pulpit of Cangregation Beth El Zedeks in Indianapolis, with her husband, Dennis Sasso, who is also a Reconstructionist rabbi.

The other three Reconstructions we meny rabbis are: Rebecca Alpert, director of student, affairs at the Reconstructionist Rabbinical College; liene Schneider, principal of the Cyrus Adler regional Hebrew High School in Philadelphia, and Ruth Sandberg, director of religious education at Reform Congregation Kneseth Israel of Elkins Park, Pa.

The seven women to be ordained as Reform rabbis here on June 10 will bring to 14 the number of such women rabbis, of whom three hold pulptise Robbi Sally Jr. Preissand, who made history by being ordained as the first woman rabbis. A vote by the JTS Senate on the recommendation, scheduled for May, 30, was postponed by Cohen at the request of JTS faculty members who asked for more time to study the issue. In announcing the postponement, Cohen said a definite stand would be taken on the issue for the 1980-81 academic year.
