BLUM SAYS YOUNG'S EXPLANATION OR HIS MEETING WITH A REPRESENTATIVE IS UNCONVINCING By Yitzbak Rabi

UNITED NATIONS, Aug. 14 (JTA) —
Yehuda Blum, Israel's Ambassador to the United
Nations, sgid today he has told Andrew Young,
the United States Ambassador to the UN, he didnot accept his explanation for his meeting last month with a representative of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

Blum told a press conference at the Israel Missian to the UN that he met with Young for 90 minutes last night at the American envoy's request. Young said his meeting with Zehadi La bib Terzi, the PLO observer at the UN, was "inadvertent" since Terzi dropped in while Young was visiting at the home of Kuwaiti Am-

bassador, Abdalla. Yaccoub Bisham.

Young's explanation is "unconvincing. Blum said, and would be "difficult to accept". by the man in the street. He said he told Young that the meeting was not "compatible" with the U.S. commitment not to talk with the PLO until it recognizes Israel's right to exist and accepts ITN Security Council Resolution 242.

According to Blum, during the course of the Young-Terzi meeting, "certain questions relating to the current debate of the Security Council (on Palestinian rights) were also discussed. " a claim that contradicted Young's statement that the meeting was confined to social conversation.

In Israel today, the Foreign Ministry solid. that Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan had instructed Ephraim Evron, Israel's Ambassador to Wash-ington, to protest the meeting to Secretary of

State Cyrus Vance The State Department, in explaining the meeting which took place in New York July 23, said yesterday that only civilities were ex changed between Young and the PLO representative. The Department said Young had gone to Bishara's house to discuss UN matters. At his press conference today, Blum said he pointed out to Young recent "disturbing events which have worried Israel. He said this included the dispute over placing the United Nations Truce Supervisory Organization (UNTSO) in Singliand a recent statement by Young calling Terzi a "decentiman."

"All that has happened in recent months is highly disturbing to Israel, "Blum said, Noting that there have been reports of changes in U.S. policy toward the PLO, Blum mentioned the "rumors about a change in Resolution 242," As for as Israel is concerned, Resolution 242 contains an "exhaustive list of all the elements needed for peace in the Middle East" and any additional elements would only upset the "delicate balance" of the resolution, Blum stressed.

DAYAN: U.S. ADMITS ISRAEL IS'
WITHIN ITS RIGHTS IN ATTACKING
TERRORIST BASES IN SOUTH LEBANON By Yitzhak Shargil

TEL AVIV, Aug. 14 (JTA) -- Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan said last night that the United States admits Israel is "fully within" its "rights" in attacking terrorist bases in south Lebanan. But, he told Likud Knesset members, the Americans object when civilians are injured and when U.S. made weapons are used in the operations.

Dayan said he saw little hope for a solution to the problem of Lebanon in the foreseeable future. He said the situation was one of utter chaos and confusion with no government to speak of in the country and not even the rudiments of an army.

In addition, soldiers from European countries who serve with the United Nations Interim Force in Lebanon (UNIFIL) return home with anti-Israel feelings, the Foreign Minister said. This is making it harder for israel to win understanding in those countries.

### Basis For U.S.-Israel Differences

Dayan said it is no secret any longer that there is a basic difference between the U.S. and Israel caused by the desire of the U.S. to bring the Palestinians into the autonomy talks. "We are not course," at odds on how we interpret the very concept of autonomy, "he said". "We do not envisage autonomy in quite the same way as the Americans and Egyptians do, and there is even the problem with the use of the term Palestinian Lul

Dayan said the U.S. no longer denies that it is willing to accept a new United Nations Security. Council resolution that would be more attractive to

the Palestinians than Resolution 242.

At the Cabinet meeting last Sunday, Dayan re portedly said that President Carter promised Israeli Ambassador Ephraim Evron at their meeting last week that the U.S. would veto a Kuwaiti-sponsored resolution in the Security Council calling for Palestinian self-determination and an independent state. Days believes the U.S. would support the resolution if the demand for a Palestinian state, which Carter says he opposes, is dropped.

The Foreign Minister said that another problem israel has with the U.S. is the question of Jewish set tlements on the West Bank. Noting that he did not question the right to establish the sefflements, Dayan explained that the Americans argue that Israel says it wants negotiations on autonomy while at the same time it seeks to establish a fair accompli, a new situation independent of the talks by establishing settlements. Dayan told the Likud MKs that they have to understand this situation.

## YANCE ÁDMONISHES YOUNG FOR HIS MEETING WITH PLO REPRESENTATIVE By Heten Silver

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (JTA) -- Andrew Young, the United States Ambassador to the United Nations, came under fire from the State Department today for acting without authorization in meeting with a Palestine Liberation Organization representative in New York last month. The Department said that Secretary of State Cyrus Vance spoke with Young by telephone today and "expressed his displeasure over the incident and the manner in which it happened.

This was announced as Department spokesman Tom Reston read a statement apologizing for saying yesterday that Young did not know that Zehadi Labib Terzi, the PLO observer at the UN, would be present when he went to the apartment of Kuwait Ambassador Abdalla Yaccoub Bishara. In going to Bishara's apartment, Reston said today, "Ambassador Young knew tha Mr. Terzi would probably be there while they discussed the question of postponing the Security Council vote scheduled for July 31 on the Kuwaiti resolution.

The resolution calls for recognition of Palestinian self-determination and the creation of a Palestinian state. It was reported earlier that the Security Council, in postponing action on the resolution until Aug. 23, was acting at

the request of the U.S., Kuwait and the PLO.
"In holding this discussion with Mr., Terzi Ambassador Young acted on his own initiative and without authorization, " the State Depart-ment statement said. "Ambassador Young explained this situation to Ambassador (Yehuda) Blum (of Israel) yesterday."

The statement stressed that "This development does not change our policy regarding the PLO and we have so informed the Israeli government." Reston said that Vance discussed Young's action with him by retephone today be fore the Secretary received an official Israeli protest over the incident. The protest was lodged by Israeli Ambassador Ephraim Evron by telephone to the State Department.

### Other Differences In The Two Versions

Reston said that other differences in the version given yesterday and today is that the meeting between Young and Terzi was between 15 and 30 minutes not 15 minutes and that more than amenities were exchanged. He said that as Young was leaving the Syrian Ambassador to the UN Hamoud el-Chouff, arrived and in that case only cordialities were exchanged. In addition, Reston also said the meeting was July 23, not July 26; as reported earlier. The presence of Young's son at the meeting was not clarified

Reston said he did not know when Vance first became aware of the meeting. He said that except for Vance's expression of displeasure, no action would be taken against Young. "The Secretary believes that Young is an able representative of the U.S., "Reston said.

# DESPITE APOLOGY BY BEN-GAL FOR STATEMENT ON ISRAELI ARABS, ARAB MAYORS DEMAND HIS DISMISSAL By Yitzhak Shargil

TEL AVIV, Aug. 14 (JTA) -- Arab mayors are demanding the dismissal of Major Gen. Aviador Ben-Gal as commander of the Northern District despite his apology for a statement he was alleged to have made questioning the loyalty of Israeli Arabs

Ben-Gal was reprimanded by Defense Minister Ezer Weizman last week after he was quoted as telling a group of Knesset members. Thursday that the Arabs of the Galiles were "a cancer in the body of the nation" and were waiting for the moment, "when they can screw us. A Davar correspondent, who recorded the general's comments, backed Ben-Gal's claim

that he had not used the word "cancer" but had said that the neglect of the Golan Heights is a malady in Israel's body. Ben-Gal said he did not mean to link this comment with the Galilee Arabs.

### Weizman Reprimands Ben-Gal

Defense Ministry sources said that Weizman, after reprimanding Ben-Gal, made it clear that the Galilee Arabs are Israeli citizens and no one has a right to cast doubts on them. He also made it clear that it is the government which will decide whether to establish more settlements on the Golan Heights. Ben-Gal had also been quoted as telling the MKs that there was no more room on the Golan for additional Jewish settlements.

The Regional Council of Jewish Settlements in the Galilee had earlier issued a statement defending Ben-Gal. "What the general is alleged to have

Shmuel Joledano, an advisor to the Premier on Arab affairs in the former Labor governments, said Ben-Gal was apparently ignorant of the enormous damage his remarks have caused Israel both inside and outside the country. He said the number of disloya Arabs was minor compared to the majority who are loyal to the State.

### ISRAELI CHY TO GET TWO BUFFALQS AS GIFT FROM U.S. SISTER CITY By Helen Silver

WASHINGTON, Aug. 14 (JTA) -- After six months delay due to snow storms, air line strikes and the DC-10 groundings, the Israeli hown of Kiryat Gat, a community of 29,000, will be presented with two American buffalos in mid-August. The bison will fly on a one-stop El Al flight from Chicago. The pair are a gift from Kiryat Gat's sister city, Buffalo, NY. They will be air lifted from Colorado to Chicago by United Airlines. Both United and El Al are carrying the bison as a public service.

The buffalos, the first in the Middle East, will be housed in the National Biblical Zoo in Jerusalem where special facilities have been constructed for their display and eventual breeding. The animals

were supplied by the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service.
The gift was the idea of Joselyn J. Berg.
Chairman of the Buffalo-Kiryar Gat Sister City
Foundation who contacted the International Communication Agency (ICA), (the newly formed a whose responsibilities include private sector involvement and educational cultural affairs) with his idea. The private sector programs division of ICA worked with the U.S. Fish and Wildlife Service, Sister Cities International, and United and El Al to coordinate the project.

Berg said, "The Sister City program is based on culture and developing friendship, so it was a natural gift. The buffalo is not only our city's name sake and emblem, it is a rich part of our country's heritage, and the zoo in Jerusalem was anxious to receive its first representative animal from North America." The buffalo, more correctly known as American bison, is also the symbol of the U.S. De

### YEHOSHUA RABINOWITZ DEAD AT-67

JERUSALEM, Aug\* 14 (JTA) — Former Finance Minister Yeloshko Rabinawitz died today at the age of 6/ at Padassah haspital here. Rabinawitz, who was also a former Mayor of Tel Aviv, suffered a heart attack Sunday at the Tuneral of David Horowitz, farmer Governor of the Bank of Israel.

Born in Baland on Nov. 13, 1911, he graduated from the Teachers Seminary in Villag, and was principal of a Hebrew high school. Active in the Hechalutz movement in Poland, he made aliya in 1934. He was active in the Histadrut's cooperative movement and is credited with having been one of the founders of the Histadrut's Hamashbir Jatzarchan supermorket chain.

Rabinowitz was elected to the Tel Aviv Municipol Council in 1956 and was mayor from 1969-73. He initiated many major building projects, such as the new central bus station, Dizengaft Center, the Lamad Plan Estate, all of which are just now being completed to give Tel Aviv the look of a modern, thriving metropolis.

After losing the mayoral election to Likud's plant labat, he was appointed Minister of Housing by then Premier Golda Meir. When Yizhak Rabin became Premier, Rabinowitz served as Finance Minister, succeeding his Jorgtime Friend and mentor Pinchas Sapir. ### ERNST CHAIN DEAD AT 73

the German-born biochemist who shared a Nobel Prize in 1945 for his work in isolating penicilling, died Sunday in Ireland of the age of 73, it was announced here by the Uniterrity of London. The Jewish scientist who was educated in Berlin and earned his PhD in chemistry in 1930 left Germany in 1933 after Hifler came to power. Chain, who became a naturalized British citizen in 1939, did much of his research at Oxford University with Sir Howard Florey. They continued earlier research by Sir Alexander Fleming, and the three shared the Nobel Prize for phislology and medicine.

Chain, who received honorary degrees from Yeshiva University in New York in 1948 and its Albert-Einstein College of Medicine in 1961, was an terrorary fellow of the well-maintin institute of Science in Rehovot, Israel.

Since 1963, was chaimman of the World Health Organization after. World War II. He was in Czechoslovakta to supervise penicillin development when Communists book power in 1946. Three years later, he was denigd a visa to enter the United States, apparently because of his work in Czechoslovakta. He said later he warked there because he was more interested in health than politics.
