# EGYPT CANCELS DIRECT AIR FLIGHT OF UJA LEADERS FROM ISRAEL TO EGYPT By Gil Sedan

JERUSALEM, Aug. 28 (JTA) -- The first United Jewish Appeal Prime Minister's Mission scheduled to fly directly from Israel to Egypt did not take off today, instead they flew to Sharm el-Sheikh, the Israeli town on the south-ern tip of the Sinai peninsula that is to be handed over to the Egyptians at the end of the Israeli withdrawal from Sinai.

The plan for a visit to Egypt was cancelled last night by the Egyptians. They said that at this stage of the peace process no Israeli planes should by affectly to Egypt. The 300 UJA Mission leaders from the United States and Canada were scheduled to go to Egypt aboard an Israel Air Force plane which had taken this route man times in the recent past, usually carrying Israel delegations, including the journalists covering the Israeli-Egyptian peace talks.

The Mission participants arrived in Israel yesterday. Shortly after arriving they were re-ceived by Premier Menachem Begin in his office in Jerusalem. He told them that recognizing the Palestine Liberation Organization is tantamount to accepting the genocide of the Jewish people; rejected as "superfluous," any United States effort to introduce a new resolution on Palestin-ian rights in the UN Security Council, and sold that tensions between Blacks and Jews in America would prove temporary.

Begin also told the UJA Mission members.

that Israeli air and land strikes against terrorist bases in south Lebanon are preemptive and have been effective in deterring terrorist attacks on Israel. He said that "If civilians are also hurt in these strikes, this causes us deep grief and sor-row." He pointed out that the terrorists used Lebanan as a "sortie base" for attacks against "Israel and that "we are trying to hit the terror ist's at their bases prior to their actions.

On the issue of Black Jewish tension in t U.S., following the resignation of Andrew Young as U.S. Ambassador to the UN, Begin said this was "a passing episode." Jews alway Jews always stand for civil rights and equality of rights, he said. He added that whoever recognizes "the socalled PLO is in effect recognizing genotic both as far as the objectives and the methods are concerned.

Meanwhile, despite the cancellation of the UJA flight to Egypt, the Foreign Ministry learned here this week that Egypt had officially notified the International Civil Aviation Organization about the termination of the state of war between the two countries and waived her longtime "exceptions" regarding Israel in the international covenant of the organization.
This notification is in line with an Egyptian

commitment to cancel all-exceptions toward israel in international conventions which were made as a result of the state of war between the two countries.

# MINISTERIAL DISCUSSION ON SOUTH

JERUSALEM, Aug. 28 (JTA) -+ The Ministerial Delense Committee meeting on the situation in south Lebanon scheduled for today was postpoined of the lost minister, at the request of Defense Minister Ezer Weizman. No new date was set for the meeting. It was expected, though, that the subject would be raised at the regular weekly session of the Cabinet this Sunday.

Weizman said that these operations prevented terror actions in Israel such as those on the Haifa-Tel Aviv coastal road in March, 1978 and in Nationiya last April.

S. REJECTS CLAIMS THAT ISRAEL DETERMINES U.S. FOREIGN POLICY By loseph Polakoff

WASHINGTON, Aug. 28 (JTA) -- The Corter Administration today rejected claims by defenders of Ambassador Andrew Young that Israel determines U.S. foreign policy because of the 1975 American commitment not to deal with the Palestine Liberation Organization until it agrees to recognize Israel's right to exist and accepts UN Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338.

That contention, raised loudly since the Young resignation, recurred today when State Department spokesman Hodding Carter was asked whether the commitment is an "encomberance" to the Administration.

"This Administration accepted the commitmen from its first day." Carter replied. "We accept it today. We feel we are bound by it voluntarily." Carter did not comment on whether it is an "encumberance."

Important sections of the media in various way are siding with Young and his supporters, principally, the Black community, that the U.S. should find means to deal with the PLO without the terrorist organization first accepting Israel's right to exist in peace and Resolutions 242 and 338.

The campaign for the Carter Administration to move closer to the PLO is kept alive by continued media activity and pressure from PLO supporters to allow PLO chief Yasir Arafat to visit parts of the U.S. outside the precincts of the UN in New York

Modding Carter today noted that if Arafat accepts an invitation for a meeting in the U.S. and a waiver is requested for his travel outside. No York, the State Department would consider it. He emphasized that requests for waivers "are turned down 99.9 percent of the time,

## Young To Head Trade Delegation To Africa

Meanwhile, the State Department agnounced that Young will go to Africa Sept. 5 with a "high-level" trade delegation that will include business executives to develop contacts with African government officials. The tentative Itineraly includes Liberta, the Jyory Coast, Nigeria, Kenya and Senegal.

#### EMOTIONS RUN HIGH AT TRIAL OF TWO TERRORISTS By Yirzhak Shargil

REHOVOT, Aug. 28 (JTA) — The trial of the two surviving members of the temporat gangwhich hipcked a bus on the coastal Haifa-Tel Aviv. road in March, 1978 and killed 37-people is heavy with emotion. The courreom of the military tribunal here is crowded with survivors and relatives of victims — fathers and mothers, gandparents, bothers and sisters and children.

The two terrorists, Halad Housein, 18, and Housein Fuad, 19, show no remorse. Instead they wave their hands in Palestine Liberation Organization victory signs, they spit at people in the audience and they smile and even laugh when witnesses describe the atrocities of the terrorist gang.

For the survivors/ however, the trial is a return to helf, a return to those harrible minutes on the road outside Tel Aviv when their fellow bus passengers were murdered. Members of the audience begin crying when a witness describes the circumstances of the death of a beloved one.

Emotions run high and there are outbursts from

Emotions run high and there are outbursts from the audience. The anger is aimed, not so much at the two Rolestinians, but their sexish-dawyer, Leah Zemel. Many in the audience are indignant at the questions she asks seeking to undermine the credibility of the witnesses.

#### Eye Witness Accounts

Ethel Socherbott, an elderly woman who was wounded by the terrorists, described how, after, the bus was set afire, a woman with a baby in her arms was shot by the terrorists. Some of the passengers tried to take the baby but, a woman terrorist grabbed the infant and threw it into the burning part of the bus. Fund clapped his bands in joy as the incident was described. There was silence in the courtroom for a moment and then sobs could be heard throughout the addresse.

Mrs. Sacherbrott, who had a heart attack after the massacre, raised her hand over her eyes and cried, "Oh God, I am trying hard to longet these sights, these borrors, but I can't: "She then fainted. The audience began shouting at the defense attorney, accusing her of selling out for PLO money. The testimony continued after Mrs. Sacherbrott was revived.

CAJE ANNOUNCES FORMATION OF JEWISH
TEACHERS' CHAPTER IN THE USSR

NEW BRUNSWICK, N. J., Aug. 28 (JTA) The Coalition for Alternatives in Jewish Education (CAJE), a grasspots organization of more
than JS00 North American Jewish educators which
is holding its fourth annual conference of Rutgers
University here, announced the formation of a
chapter in the Soviet Union.

The chapter comprises 30 Jewish teachers in Moscow, Leningrad, Minsk, Kiev, Vilna, Kishmev, Tbilisi and three other cities. Most of these teachers were visited this summer by Barbara Pomerantz and Kurt Stone, two Cincinnati Hebrew educators and CAJE members who were touring the Soviet Union. Upon their return to this country, Pomerantz and Stone briefed the CAJE board on the state of Jewish education in the USSR. The board then formally invited the 30 teachers to join-the organization and attend its fourth conference which ends boday.

Although the teachers, many of whom are refusniks, were not permitted to leave the Soviet Union; a husbed CAJE plenium listened to a tape appeal from Lev Ularovsky, a 29-year-old refusnik astrophysicist, who is now one of Moscow's leading Hebrew teachers. "We have a tremendous shortuge of educational material," Ularovsky said. He appealed for books, tapes and Other resources which, he added, "are a matter of life and death for the fiture of Jewish life and culture In Kussia."

The plenum voted Sunday night to establish a task force on Soviet Lewish education. The primary purpose of this task force will be to provide desperately needed educational material for Soviet Lews, It will also offer such material to Soviet Lews the this country, and will establish educational links between North American Jewish reachers and students, and their Soviet counterparts.

Even before the task force held its first meeting, a response to the educational needs of Soviet Jews was forthcoming. It was announced by Rabbi Daniel Syme, fictional director of education for the Union-of-American Hebrew Congregations, that Ktav Publishing Co. president Bernard.
