He favored open borders between that state and Israel once an agreement was reached with the PLO

Meeting Evokes Mixed Reactions

The news of Dayan's meeting with the Gaza leader evoked mixed reactions in the political community. Several ministers seemed to have known in advance of the meeting and appeared to have approved it. But others had reservations.

Most outspoken was the chairman of the Knessef Foreign Affairs and Defense Committee Moshe Arens of Herut, who accused Dayan of "shooting from the hip again -- and in the wrong "Arens deployed Dayan's action, taken, he said, just when Israel was fighting desperately against arowing Western recognition and contact with the PLO.

If Dayan's reasoning was that Israel must know first hand what the various Palestinians were thinking, then by the same token, Arens charged, there was nothing to stop Dayan meeting with PLO chief Yasir Arafat. Arens dismissed the sup-

posed distinction between talking and new tialing.

Carter Administration at the highest levels has for mally declared Israel is practicing "terror" by its attacks on Palestinian terrorists in south Lebanon and rejects Israel's position that its attacks are in self-defense to prevent terrorists from striking at Israelis from their south Lebonese bases

The Administration also has made plain, in a followup to resigned Ambassador Andrew Young's address to the UN Security Council yesterday on violence in south Lebanon that it will consult with Congress on possibilities of reducing U.S. weaponry to Israel as punishment for Israeli incursions in

south Lebanon.

Young yesterday spoke of "terror and counterterror" and called on Israel to "end its policy of preemptive strikes on Lebanese soil." He also said "the Palestinian leadership should stop attacks on the Lebanese militia aroups in southern Lebanon and on Israel.

Young's address, which the State Department and Young himself said was cleared by the U.S. government's highest authorities, did not mention the Palestine Liberation Organization by name.

Today, the State Department's chief spokes Hodding Carter, was asked to explain the shift in U.S. policy since it previously had spoken of the "cycle and re-cycle of violence" or used similar language in describing the PLO infiltrations against Israelis and Israeli retaliation.

"The words have to speak for themselves,"
Carrer said in reference to Young's statement, while confirming that Secretary of State Cyrus Vance had approved them. Vance, who returned from vacation yesterday, is to meet the press next Wednesday at the State Department. Congress returns the same day from its summer vacation.

Dayan Being Blamed

State Department sources are putting out the views that Israeli Foreign Minister Moshe Dayan is to blame for the stiff anti-Israel position taken by the U.S. on south Lebanon. These sources contend that Dayan had said the U.S. approves Israeli shelling of Palestinian bases but apposes casualties the Israeli "preemptive strikes" cause among Aivilians.
The Department response to the Dayan remark

did not fully reject the Dayan comment, the sources say, and this caused the situation among the PLO and others in Lebanon to "become ugly" against Americans. To overcome this "ugly" attitude, which alarmed the American Embassy in Beirut; the De-"strategy" in south Lebanon and then followed up with Young's address and Carter's remarks today.

Carter said repeatedly today that the U.S. no't "condoning" terrorism; that the Young statement "has to stand on its own feet and explains itself"; and that the Department "certainly is not suggesting that any people can be expected to endure terrorism

Responding to questions from a reporter on how the U.S. expects Israel to stop PLO killers from murdering innocent people in Israel after Israel had erected all sorts of barriers in hope of preventing infiltrations by the PLO, Carter replied, "We sug-gest it is no answer in steadily employing use of force" and "particularly when the majority" of the victims are "strictly innocents." He added that "we have been seeking repeatedly to prevent the continuing thagedy on both sides."

Asked whether Young's remarks were intended

to "pick on Israel," Carter denied that was the purpose, the said Young was addressing "both sides" in the added that "both sides" is a "loose term" because "we are talking of more than two sets of players. "He said the U.S. is trying "across the board" to settle the situation. He added shot, "there is no way to settle it by one party."

ISRAEL SAYS U.S. -MADE ARMS, AMMO REACHING TERRORISTS By Yitzhak Shargil

TELAVIV, Aug. 30 (JTA) -- Israeli military sources reported today that a group of military correspondent and several foreign journalists
have been shown an American 105-mm howitzer
shell fired by Palestinian terrorists into a Christian enclave, controdicting a statement by the
United States Embassy in Beirut that the U.S., was
not now delivering arms or ammunition of that
caliber to any of the parties in conflict in south
Lebanon. According to the sources, the serial
number on the shell indicates that it was produced
in the 1970s.

The Embasy, statement contended that several 105-mm howitzer gurs were lost by the Lebanese army to various factions during the 1975-76 civil wer. In Lebanon: Arms of this caliber had last been delivered almost five years ago to Lebanon and these may have fallen into the hands at terrorists, according to the Americans.

CARTER APPEALS, TO BLACKS AND JEWS :

WASHINGTON, Aug. 30 (JTA) -- President Carter appealed today to Blacks and Jews in America to end the rift that developed between them as a result of the resignation of Andrew Young as U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations following his anauthorized meeting with a Palestine Liberation Organization representative:

Speaking at the dedication of a chapse in Emory University in Atlanta, Go., Young's home town, the President declared: "Both groups (Blacks and Jews) have a particular call on the conscience of each other and on the conscience of us at law and a series of the conscience of us at law and the conscience of us at law at

Recalling that both Blacks and Jews suffered "boo much poin, too much persecution;" Carter constinued: "Our pluralistic society is an important source of the Vitality and creativity of American life. But we must not permit diversity to degenerate into division. In a time of trial, we must not permit the legitimate bontest of competing, views to become a war of group against group, special interest against special interest, and finall sech against all atters.

Carter also said in his speech that different political views "must not become the occasion for deep and damaging divisions between groups of citizens in our society. Black Americans and lew-th Americans have worked side by side for generations in the service of human rights, social jus-

tice and general welfare.

Referring to Young, who was unable to ottend the ceremony begause of the current Security Council session, Carfet praised the outgoing Ambassador for having humed the distrust and fear of the U.S. into an understanding that America supported the rights of oppressed people for justices.

LEVY: OLIM AND YORDIM BALANCE

JERUSALEM, Aug. 30 (JTA) -- For the first time in many years, the number of returning ls-, raelis exceeded that of Israelis leaving the country, Aborption Minister David Levy said at a press conference here yesterday.

Levy said that balance was reached last
year when 22, 900 Israelis returned to the country.

in comparison to about 10,000 who left the country in the same period. He said 6662 came back as part of a special program launched by the Ministry of Absorption on the occasion of Israel's 30th anniversory, with the assistance of allya and absorption institutions. The others came back on their own.

The plan to encourage Tsrael is to return home began in January 1978 and is scheduled to end at the end of this manth. According to Levy, within the framework of the plan, some 12,000 returned in that period. Some 30 Israel is were returning daily, he said.

But Jewish Agency sources said yesterday in reaction that only some 4500 registered as returning stratells in the period discussed. They did not know how Levy compiled his figures,

It is understood that the gap between the Absorption Ministry figures and that of the Jewish Agency stems from differences in definitions. Levy, included in his count all Israelis who had spent more than two years overseas as well as all those who returned married to new immigrants. If those two groups are subtracted, the number of Israelis who spent more than four years overseas (the usual definition for yordim) and who return to Israel, the number is 4300.

Using the same statistics, Levy claimed that the number of returning Israelis in the period discussed exceeded in some cases those of the number of immigrants. For example, some 6100 Israelis returned from North America. The number of immigrants from that part of the world was 5125 in the same period.

Levy said that according to Central Bureau of Straistics figures, the number of Israelis who left the country last year and are expected to stay overseas to brigger period did not exceed 10,000, andecrease of 21 percent compared to the year before.

A JCOMMITTEE TO AID BOAT PEOPLE

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (JTA) — The American Jewish Committee bas launched a mojor-campaign to encourage more Americans to sponsor Indochinese refugees who seek admission into the United States, and to provide other kinds of assistance to the uproated people of Southeast Asia, it was ofnounced by Bertram Gold, A JCommittee executive vice-president. Fitted "Operation Boat People," the project will be put into action at the grass-most level by the A JCommittee's 86 chapters and units around the country.

In presenting an action plan to TIS local groups, the A Committee recommended that each chapter, in an emergency session of its executive board, make a commitment to sponsor a given number of Indochinese refugees, and that it appeal to its members to per sonally undertake individual sponsorships. EDUCATORS HOLD CONCLAVE TO DISCUSS ALTERNATIVES IN JEWISH EDUCATION By David Szonyi

That claim was made by Jerry Benjamin, chair-person of the Coalition on Alternatives in Jewish Education (CA IF) and the recently-named executive director of the Maimonides School in Boston: in referring to the fourth CAJE conference which took place at Rutgers University from Aug. 23– 28. Over 1000 people involved in every major facet of Jewish education and representing the entire religious and ideological spectrum attended the conference.

CAJE, a four-year-old grassroots organiza-tion with over 1600 members in the U.S. and Can ada, organized the conference and obtained the co-sponsorship of the Board of Jewish Education of Greater New York (BJE-NY), Financial support was provided by the Fund for Jewish Educa-tion (created by the New York Federation and administered by the BJE-NY, the World Zionist Organization, the EMET Foundation, and the Gimprich Family Foundation). Office space was donated by the National Jewish Conference

Participants at this conference had their choice from among 158 modules (intensive pedagogic sessions lasting up to 12 hours and usually over several days) and 128 Lehrhauses (sessions averaging 90 minutes on one special theme or Topics covered ranged from the practical ("The 'How-Tos' of Starting a Teacher's Center") to more effective areas of learning ("Judaism and Psychosynthesis: Personal and Spiritual Growth"), and included several lessons that were as withy as they are informative ("Laugh with a Lityak:Humor

in the Talmud").

Among the hundreds of session leaders were llya Goldin, an activist in Jewish political and cultural affairs in Minsk who now lives in Haifa. Michael Berenbaum, deputy director of the Pres ident's Commission on the Holocaust, and Samue Norich, a vice president of the World Jewish Congress and doctoral candidate in sociology at the University of Wisconsin.

Eclectic Nature Of Conference

The conference was the first CAJE conclave to include full-day "mini-conferences" on such wide-ranging subjects as "Adolescence," "Day Schools" and "Women in Judaism. "Many in or-tendance expressed the View that no previous group of Jewish educators has ever been exposed to such extensive artistic and creative programming. On the evening of Aug. 25 alone; particl-pants had their choice of attending one of two plays -- one consisting of legends about and biographical sketches of the Baal Shem Toy, the other about the experiences of an unusual Jewish woman growing up -- seeing the Rakdaneen, a dance group sponsored by the American Jewish Congress, or listening to either the Fabrangen Fiddlers -- a "blue grass/klezmer" group based in Washington, D.C. - or singer/composer Debbie Friedman

During the two evening plenum sessions, a number of speakers commented upon the eclectic nature of the conference. "This is the only place in the world where we have the participation of Orthodox, Conservative, Reform, Reconstruction— ist, secular, Zionist and Yiddishist Jews, Hasidim Mitragdim -- everyone abserved Robert Bergman, a Reform rabbi from Santa Ana, California. Steven Shaw, a Conservative rabbi from Ruth-

erford; New Jersey and consultant to the American Jewish Committee and National Jewish Conference Center, remarked that "The Alternatives Conference is the first major Jewish forum where the generation which came of age during the 1960s is doing most of the programming for the entire Jewish community.

21 Task Forces Established

During the plenum sessions, participants voted to establish 21 task forces to help improve teacher training and the sharing of resources, develop new educational materials and explore specific areas of interest. These included: "Developing Effective-th-Service Staff Training," "Confronting Aging and the Aged Through Jewish Education," and "Developing Programs and Materials for Family Education.

They also agreed to create a newsletter, help European Jewish educators (several of whom attended), organize a similar conference in 1980 or 1981, and investigate the possibility of holding a conference in Israel within the next few years

At their concluding plenum, CAJP members adopted a new governing structure and elected Rabbi Daniel Syme, currently national director of education of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations, as the organization's new chairperson.

Reflecting on CA JE's importance, Benjamin told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the organtzation represents "a new movement of people energized both by the problems they've encountered and the belief that, by working collectively, they can begin to end the isolation and frustration experienced by so many Jewish teachers.

JEWISH BOOKS AT MOSCOW BOOK FAIR

NEW YORK, Aug. 30 (JTA) -- The Association of Jewish Book Publishers (A JBP) has accepted an invitation to exhibit at the Second Moscow Book Fair, Jacob Steinberg, president of the AJBP, an-nounced. Steinberg said that the exhibit in Moscow Sept. 4-10, would include more than 650 Jewish books published in the United States. The exhibit consists of a careful selection of the foremost Jewish books culled from literature, culture, history, relig ion and contemporary life, he noted. It will also melude outstanding fiction in English translation; and titles in Yiddish, Hebrew and Russian, and proyerbook.

"Our aim is commercial," Steinberg said, "but at the same time the titles will give their readers access to the Jewish heritage, and an in-depth knowledge, understanding and appreciation of Jews and

Judaism, both past and present.

While the AJBP exhibit at the First Moscow Book Fair in 1977 was limited largely to books by its members, the second exhibit will contain titles of Jewish Interest issued by general trade publishers and university preses as well. The enlargement of the exhibit to double that of 1977, Steinberg said, was made possible by a grant from the Joseph Meyer hoff foundation and the participation of the Ametican Jewish Committee and the Jewish Welfare Board Jewish Book Council as co-sponsors.

The exhibit will exemplify the wide variety of books of Jewish interest published in the United States, and will provide a basis for mutually bene ficial discussion of publishing rights and related matters, with USSR publishers and those of other countries represented of the Fair. The Moscow Fair exhibits will be open to the general public as well as to publishers, librarians and other professional book people.
