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MA JOR RESHUFFLING OF CABINET SEEN

JERUSALEM, Oct. 24 (JTA) -- A^mmajor reshuffling of Premier Menachem Begin's Labinet appeared imminent body in the wake of Moshe Dayan's resignation as Foreign Minister. Although no official announcements have been mode; the probable composition of the reorganized Cabinet emerged following a series of meetings between Begin and, a number of key ministers this morning.

Deputy Premier Yigael Yadin, leader of the Democratic Movement, is expected to replace Dyan as Foreign Minister. The Deputy Premiership may be assigned to Finance Minister Simcho Ehrlich who with, in turn, be replaced as Finance Minister by Yigal Hurwitz, the former Minister of Commerce who quit the Cabinet last year in protest against the Camp David accords, which he opposed, Ehrlich, who has been under fire because of Israel's deteriorating economy and galloping inflation, is a member of Likud's Liberal Party wing. Hurwitz belongs to the small, militantly nationalist Laam faction of Likud.

In addition, Begin is expected to name. Yehuda Ben-Meir, chairman of the National Religious Party's Knesset faction, as Deputy Foreign Minister and Yigal Cohen-Orgad of Herut, as Deputy France Minister. The elevation of Ben-Meir, to sub-Cabinet rank is believed intended to mollify the NRP which is angered because the Democratic Movement, the smallest coalition partner, would control three Key portfolios - the Foreign Ministry. Justice Ministry and Ministry of

Labor and Welfare.

The NRP has demanded the Foreign Ministry for Yosef Burg, the Minister of Interior who heads the Israeli negotiating team in the autonom talks with Egypt. Herut has also demanded the Foreign Ministry on grounds that it is the largest coalition feetion.

There was no indication today as to when an official announcement may be forthcoming. Yadin is still confined to Hadassah Hospital where he is recovering from a mild heart attack. He said this morning that no one has approached him as yet but he is under doctors orders to rest and is not permitted to engage in political discussions or read the newspapers. The probable reshuffle has not been discussed by the official bodies of the various parties concerned.

WEIZMAN TO MEET SADAT IN EFFORT TO BREAK IMPASSE ON OIL PRICE

TEL AVIV, Oct. 24 (JTA) — Defense Minister Ezer Weizman is expected to mee' Egyptian. President Anwar Saday tomorrow: in an effort to break the impasse over the price Egypt will charge israel for Sinai oil. The Egyptians are asking \$32 a barrel for the two million barrels: they have promised to supply Israel annually but the Israelis are demanding \$22-\$524.

Weizman, who was in Egypt all week for talks with Egyptian Defense Minister Kanal Hassan-All, was flown back to traid yesterday. In a special Egyptian plane to take part-in the Knesset votes on opposition motions of no confidence. With the government of Premier Menachem Begin defeating the Knesset challenge; he returned to Cairo today on the same plane.

They were met by Dr. Eliyahu Ben-Elissar, head of the Prime Minister's Office, Begin's press chief, Dan Pattir; and Gen. Ephraim Poran, Begin's military advisor.

TOON WARNS AGAINST PALESTINIAN STATE By Yitzhok Shargil

TELAVIV, Oct. 24 (ITA) Moleo Im Ioen, the former U.S. Ambassador to Israel and, until his retirement this month, the U.S. Ambassador to Moscow, warned here that it would be a "terrible mistake" to establish a Palestinian state adjoining Israel.

Speaking and replying to questions at the Tel Aviv University's Center for Strategic Studies, the American career diplomat warned that a Palestinian state on the West Bank would pose a serious threat to Israel's security because the Soviets could easily urn it into a Russian base and "run the whole show."

Toon said that in his opinion, the U.S. and

Toon said that in his opinion, the U.S. and brack-would be unwise to maneutour themsetves into a position in which there would be no alternative but to set up a state for the Palestinians. He acknowledged, however, that the Soviet-Union will have to be involved as an active party at some point in the negotiations for a comprehensive peace settlement in the Middale East. The Soviets are a political, milliary and economic force in the Middals that won't go away, he sold. "The Soviets are here to stay and we must take account of them when negotiating a peace agreement."

Toon noted that they also have legal status as a party to Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338 and as co-chairmen of the Geneva conference. According to Toon, Russian policy in the immediate future will be to continue what the termed an obstructionist role, to confinue to isolate Egypt from the rest of the Arab world and try to draw closer to Jordan and Saudi Arabia. At the same time, however, Russia will not attempt a major effort to discupt peace because their allies "would be clobbered by isingel," he said.

CARTER RECEIVES CITATION, SHOFAR FROM SYNAGOGUE COUNCIL OF AMERICA By been holdsoff

"MASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (JTA) - President Carter boday received a fementie shofar from the Symagogue Council of America (SCA) as "a symbol of his pursuit of freedom for all people" and was also presented with a citation in the form of an acrostic that spelled out the name Jimmy Carter and also spetted out this to be devotion to worldwide human rights. It was the SCA first International Human Rights Award. Some 50 rabbis and lay leaders from the SCA made the presentation to Carter in the Rose Garden of the White House.

Accepting the two presentations, Carter said that "the sho far is symbolically very important by me" and added that "there is no question the whole world needs to be awakened from its slumber an human rights." He noted that human rights "transcends differences among our people" and that "we have espoused the cause of human rights for persons to leave the Soviet Union to escape persecution, to reunite families, to be able to speak without "fear or punishment."

Saying he was "encouraged by your recognition that I stand for what our nation represents, the President concluded by saying; "I accept this with gratitude because you have recognized that the President of the United States ought always to withstand any pressure that contravenes the furtherance of our-basic commitments, our basic beliefs, our basic principles, our basic obligation to our fellow lurran beings and our obliga-

tion to the God we worship.

Rabbi Arthur Lelyveld, president of the SCA, whith is the coordinating organization of Conservative; Orthodox and Reborm Jews, Said the SCA was "one in admiration of the fact that you have made the pursuit of freedom for all people of a primary concern. We of the Jewish community are particularly grateful for the direct efforts you have made in behalf of the "Prispres of Conscience", in the Soviet Union, and we pray that, with your support, all of those still unjustly held will Unimately find release.

Pointing out that the shofar has become a symbol of the High Hold Days to arouse people to thill their responsibility, Rabbi Bernard Mandel: baum, executive vice president of the SCA, who presented Carter with the shofar which came from strael, declared: **On this day, the sound of the shofar symbol izes the clarion call from President Jimmy Garter to the nations of the world and to individual men and women within these nations, all created in Cod's image, to make real our most sacred possession — human rights for all, in the uplifting creative climate of freedom and liberty."

MCHENRY: PEACE PROSPECT IS BRIGHT

NEW YORK, Oct. 24 (JTA) — "We have reason to reloice because the prospect for peace in the Middle East is better in 1279, than at any time in the century of modern Jewish-Arab relations," soid Denald McHenry; United States Ambassador to the United-Nations, who was guest speaker last right at the Appeal of Conscience Foundation's Award Dinner at the Pierre Hotel bosoting Harey Helmsley, a prominent realitor, and Axel Springer, a noted German publisher; Members of the audience included Ambassadors from 25 countries.

The Appeal of Conscience Foundation, an interreligious organization headed by Rabbi Arthur Schneier, spiritual leader of the Park East Syna-

gague in New York, promotes religious freedoms throughout the world.

McHenry declared that "None of us can be insensitive to the courage of President (Anwar) Sadat and Frime Minister (Menachem) Begin, or the risks which each has taken. The treaty (between Israel and Egypt) is a major step forward towards peace, but it is not an end in Itself. The principal unfinished item on the Middle Edy agenda today is the relationship between Israel and the Polestinian Arab people. Our goal now must be to assure on a permanent besis the full security of Israel and at the same time to respect and fulfill the legitimate right of the Polestinians."

Springer, in reply, stated: "Israel is threatened now because her triends in the world make recommendations and suggestions which, if carried out, will imperil the safety of the young Lewish State. Israel is threatened because so many among us follow the dictate of oil, instead of the dictate of conscience."

ALLON BRANDS ÀS TOTALLY FALSE ACCOUNT OF EXPULSION OF ARABS IN 1948 WAR By Yitzhak Shargil

TEL AVIV, Oct. 24 (JIA) — Yigal Allon, Isroet's former-Foreign Minister who was the commoder of Pollmachron the central Forth during Israel' War for Independence in 1948, today branded as a total fabrication an alleged "first person account" of the forced expulsion of 50,000 Arab civilians from the towns of Lod and Ramle by Israeli forces at the direct orders of then Premier David Ben Gurjan.

The account, the subject of a story published in the New York Times yesterday by its correspondent David K. Shipler in Jerusalem, was purportedly contained in the original-manuscript of the memoirs of former Premier, Yitzbak Rabin but deleted from the published Hebrew edition and the English translation by tracetic censors.

Rabin was commander of the Harel Brigade which was assigned to eliminate the Jordanian Arab Legión from the Jeruselem-Tel Aviv Road. According to Shipler, "A copy of his manuscript was provided to The New York Times by Peretz Kidron, who translated the book from Hebrew to Profilith."

Offers Version Of Events

Allon, who was at the time Rabin's superior officer. Jeld a broadcast presses on the superior of the Times story. He gave a detailed version of the events discussed. "As the supreme commander of the "Daniny Operation" in July (1948) during which the towns of Lod and Ramle were captured by the Israelis. I did not request permission to evacuate or affive our the Arabs of these towns. Ben Gurion gave no such order. "I gave no such order and there was no such order," he said.

"The evacuation of Lod and Ramle by its population was a result of a coincidence of two factors. One was an order, from the Arab Legion to clear the town so its unit could embark on a counter-attack and recapture the howns and the panic that engulfed the population. There was no problem of driving (people) out. Any allegation that Ben Gurian or anybody else gave such an order is totally without foundation," Allon soid.

According to The Times story, Rabin wrote that he, Allon and Ben Gurion were discussing the battle then in progress for the Jerusalem-Tel Aviv Rood and the problem of the 50,000 inhabitants of Ramle and Lod (then known as Lydda) arose.

"Not even Ben Gurion could offer any solution and during the discussions at operational headquarters he remained silent." Clearly we could not leave Lod's hostile and armed populace in our rear. We walked outside, Ben Gurion accompanying us. Atlant expected his question; "What is to be done with the population?" B, G, waved his hand in a destroy which said, "Drive them out." The Times reported that the deleted portion of the Rabin memoirs also described how some is-roell soldiers who participated in the expulsion were sickened by it and propaganda sessions were required afterwards to soothe their troubled coinsciences.

The Times said that all references to these events were ordered expunged by a ceinstrip board composed of five Cabinet members, headed by Justice Minister Shmuel Tamir. It noted that Israeli law also forbids Rabin to discuss the matter publicly. It was a disturbing situation. We did not know whether we were occupied by the population or whether we had occupied by the population or whether we had occupied the town.

"Next morning, the units started combing the town and it was then that the Lordanian Arab Legion started its counter-attack while the soldier in muft! who penetrated during the night fired at the Israelli soldiers. The fire was returned and the ottack was repulsed and the lordack was repulsed and the sounce.

"At that time, the flight of the population started. The Israeli command helped the population by giving them both transportation and water. The reason was simple: the battle went on and fearing the civilians may come between the Ijnes, enter mine fields and interfere with operations, the decision was to help an orderly escape.

"Ramle was taken over without a single shot.
At that time, Ramle notables asked the israells to
enable the population to leave for the Ramallan

NEW YORK, Oct, 24 (JTA) — Former Premier. Rabin explained to the JTA that he cannot discuss the issue because doing so would be a violation of Israeli law.

Most of these letters made the point that grass roots reaction to Spanish reception for Artest would reduce trade and fourism.

NEW JEWISH GROUP FORMED

PARIS, Oct. 24 (JTA) — The creation of a new organization. "Jewish Renewal," has been announced by a small group of young French professionals. The new group, which seeks to become a mass grassoon organization, is gimed at those Jews who support Israel and Jewish causes generally, without, however, planning their own aliya to Israel in the immediate future:

The president of the new movement, Henri Hadjenberg, said Jewish Renewal will be affiliated to the World Zionist Organization and will work in close cooperation with the Jewish Agency. Hadjenberg said his organization plans to stage a "Salute to Israel Day" next spring and organize a Paris-Jerusalem exhibition within the next 18 months.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 24 (JTA) — The executive director of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People and the vice president of the Union of American Hebrew Congregations (UAHC) joined this week in pledging to create a stronger and more "mature" relationship through which Blocks and Jews could renew their

partnership on social issues.

Benjamin Hooks, the Black civil rights leade
and Albert Vorspan, director of the Commission on
Social Action of the WAHC, spoke at a forum
titled "A. Social Justice Agenda for the 1980s"
sponsored by the UAHC here last Sunddy night. It
marked the first public exchange on Black Jewish
relations since the continversy that grew out of the
resignation of Andrew Young as U.S. Ambassador
to the United Nations following his unauthorized
meeting with Zehdi Labib Terzi, the Palestine
Liberation Organization observer at the United
Nations.

"Blacks and Jews, working together, are indispensable to pragress in social justice in America," Vorspan told some 300 Reform Jewish Leader from across the country at the Washington Hebrew Congregation. "We are linked by a common heritage, a common destiny, a shared vision of America," he declared.

Hooks hold the meeting: "The Black people and the Jewish people are on the threshold of a great regeneration of cooperation. There is every reason to be hopeful about the future and to be optimistic about improving Black – Jewish relations. Black people are not going to abondon their althes or shirk their moral principles over a barrel of oil. It is up to the leaders of the two communities to devise the mature strategies that will reckon with the new emerging world economic order and reduce intergraps pensions."

Hooks continued: "It is important that calm reasonableness prevail, that the difficulties of adjustment be realized and that without any societies of basic principles, the spirit of sharing and co-operation characterize our future civil and human rights campaigns."

Need For Candid Discussion

Both speakers emphasized the need for candid discussion of the issues that divide Blacks from Jews as well as those that unite them.

Vorsdan said American Jews bad. "Felt betrayed" when Black leaders gave "respectability to
a terrorist group whose sole platform is the extinction of Israel. They have also done infinite misthist by aspectant throused and its territary

Vorspan observed that "both Blacks and Jews see themselves as beleaguered, threatened, vulnerable. Each sees the other as powerful. Truth is each of us has some limited influence, but both are nothing when compared to the massive power of the political and economic forces that delight in having us at seach other's throats."

Jewish anger and fear are "understandable," Vorspan said, "But we must also maintain some tail ance. Not all Black-Fooders have joined the demagogic back.
