TRUDEAU WARNS CONTINUENCE PRESSURE FOR CANADA: TO MOVE EMBASSY TO JERUSALEM COULD STIR ANTI-SEMITISM Also Slams U.S., "Zionist"-Pressure On Carter, By Slams U.S. "Zionist"-Pressure On Carter,

MONTREAL, Oct. 25 (JIA) — Former Premier Pierre Elliott Trudeou, leader of the opposition in the Canadian Parliament, has warned that continuing pressure by Canadian Lewish Lead ers over anti-boycott legislation and the transfer of Canada's Embassy in Israel from Tel Aviv to Jerusalem, could stir anti-Semitism in this country

He also charged that pressure by Zionists in the United States is making it difficult for President Carter-fooid in the current Middle East peace negotiations and that the Israel government's hard line on the West Bank makes a settlement of the Palestinian problem impossible and

could result into new war in the Middle East.

Truded expressed his views in an interview
published in the Toronto Star Today. "Zionists
in the United States, who are more zealous than
in 13raal, have made it difficult for Carter to aid
negatiations by telling israel they must be more
flexible or risk losing American support," Trudeau
was quoted as sayina.

He said-stimilar pressure was exerted by Canadian Jewish leaders who are only now becoming aware that by forcing the Conservative government to promise buggler anti-boycont legislation wand to shift the Embassy to Jerusalem "they have opened the way, to growing anti-Semitism."

Says Pressure Groups Have Hurt Canada

REPORT USSR IMPOSING NEW RESTRICTIONS ON JEWS SEEKING TO EMIGRATE TO ISRAEL

NEW YORK. Oct 25 (ITA) — Burton Levinson, chairman of the National Conference on Saviet Jewry, (NCS)), said today that his disparization is greatly alarmed by reports which it continues to receive from the Saviet Union, that Saviet authorities are instituting, new and unerespectations on Soviet Jews who seek to emigrate. "The NCSJ is concerned that these new Soviet procedures may illustrate an attempt by the Soviet-Union to drastically reduce, levish emigration," the stated.

For the first time, Soviet authorities are challenging whether the Soviet Jew seeking to emigrate and his Israeli family who has sent him an invitation have a "sufficient kinship." Emigration from the USSR for Jews has always been based upon family reputification, "Levinson noted. "Thus, the NCSJ is tremendously concerned that the Soviets are seeking to implement new restrictions under the guise of challenging family kinship," he said.

"Although emigration figures continue to behigh, these new restrictions may presige a substantial reduction of numbers in a few months. Already thousands of geople, primarily in the Utraine, but as well in other republics, have been refused the right to emigrate because of these procedures."

Levinson appealed "to all people concerned about the rights of Soviet Jews to emigrate to apply whateyer processes are available to them to aler United States government officials and others to this new and alarming event and to seek their assistance in demanding that these new procedures be terminated."

He said that "there is also genuine confusion on the part of most Americans because of their misunderstanding" of the West Bank settlement policy of Premier Menachem Begin's government, the said "I personally stand by Prime Minister Begin's decision in this regard."

Declaring that "the survival of Israel is directly connected to the survival of America," Biden said "the creation of a PLQ state" in the West Bank and Gaza "is contrary to U.S. interests. As supporters of Israel we are uneasy because we have become unsure of the fundamental commitment of the American people and the lack of continuity of the Carter Administration" in its Middle East policy.

PALESTINIAN INVITEES WILL NOT ATTEND NEW OUTLOOK CONFERENCE By Joseph Polakoff

WASHINGTON, Oct. 25 (JTA) -- Editors of the radical Zionist magazine New Outlook published in Tel Aviv, indicated today that only three of 13 Palestinian Arabs from the West Bank and Caza Strip who had been invited to attend its three-day international symposium here this weekend would do so. The editors blamed alleged obstructions placed on travel documents by the U.S. and Israeli governments.

However, under questioning at a news con-ference here, they acknowledged that the Palestine Liberation Organization and Israel's Rakah (Communist) Party had roles in the decisions of nearly all of the 13 invitees not to attend the symposium. The editors also indicated uncertainty over the position on visas attributed to the State Department and the Israeli military government authorities on the West Bank and Gaza Strip.

Simha Flapan, editor-in-chief of New Out-look, said he was told three days ago that the 13 Palestinians would not attend. He said this was "a surprising development." He said the reason was the refusal by the State Department to issue visas to "Palestinians from abroad" and indications of refusal by the Israeli authorities to provide exit visas. He said he did not know who had applied for visas and who was refused.

David Shaham, editor of the magazine, in-terjected that they did not have "factual knowledge" that exit visas were refused by the Israeli authorities. He said one Arab left today for Wash ington with a 26-member tyraeli delegation. Several hours later, Flapan told reporters that two other Arabs had been granted U.S. visas and an-

other two were denied them.

Flapan, who said he based his information on a single telephone call from Israel, referred to a-report-from Jerusalem published here that contained a statement by retired Gens Matthyahu-Peled that Rakah and the "Sons of the Village," described as a small but militant Israeli Arab group, had been exerting intense pressure on West Bank Arab leaders not to attend the symposion. Peled was the principal speaker at the Am ican Friends Service Committee's symposium on the Middle East held here in 1977 which supported changes in Israel's policy toward the PLO.

No PLO Members At Conclave

.The State Department declined to say immediately if any applications for visas had been received from Palestinian Arabs on the West Bank in Gaza, Jordan, Lebanon or other places." The Department's chief spokesman, Hodding Carter said "The answer is going to be you will not find any PLO members attending the New Outlook session." The Jewish Telegraphic Agency was privately informed by the State Department that no PLO members had applied for a visa because "they knew they would not get it."

Issam Sartawi, a top PLO official in Beirut, was among those reportedly invited to the symposium. Flapan said he favored exploratory talks between the U.S. and the PLO without preconditions. He also said that nearly 500 persons have registered for the symposium including 50 from Europe, 40 from Israel and 25 Arabs from various

He said that Austrian Chancellor Bruno Kreisky, who is in Washington to meet with U.S. officials and will address the UN General Assembly in New York Oct. 29, had not been invited.

Those attending the symposium will come as individvals, not in any official capacity, Flapan said. (Kreisky told Die Presse in Vienna yesterday that he will try to convince President Carter to open talks

with the PLO.)

Reports from Israel; meanwhile, said the New Outlook symposium suffered a severe setback when the West Bank and Gaza invitees announced they would not attend. They are mainly mayors and the heads of local councils. According to the reports, their announcement followed what was apparently heavy pressure by West Bank extremist leaders, including the mayors of Nablus and Hebron, for them not to go.

Among those invited but who cancelled their

participation in the symposium were the poet and feminist Raymonda Tawil and Mayor Rashid Shawa of Gaza. Tawil was among the West Bank Arabs who participated in the New Outlook-symposium in Tel Aviv two years ago. The official reason given by the Arabs for not going is that they do not wish to attend a conference that supports the Camp David accords and the autonomy plan.

Thirty-five Israelis, including five Knesset members, will attend the symposium. Two other MKs, Yossi Sarid of the Labor Alianment and Mordechai Wirshuvski of Shar, said they may not go because their purpose in attending was to meet with the Palestinians.

PROTEST TERZI INVITATION TO UNIVERSITY

FORT WAYNE, Ind., Oct. 25 (JTA) -- The Fort Wayne Jewish Federation has protested to Indiana University against an invitation extended to the Palestine Liberation Organization representative at the United Nations, Zehdi Labib Terzi, to speak there on Nov. 27. In letters addressed to Dr. Ryan, university president, and Dr. Robert O'Neil vice president, Federation officials said the decision by the university's Memorial Union Board to invite Terzi Tis quite disturbing to the Fort Wayne Jewish community.

The letters stated that Terzi "is hardly the type of person one would expect to receive an invitation from a public institution. His presence, whether of ficially sanctioned or not, places Indiana University in an unenviable limelight of national prominence. The situation is fraught with risk and wrapped with emotion. The result, we fear, would not benefit a discussion of the real-issues but further the hatred

and venom his organization symbolizes."

The Federation urged the university officials "to consider the ramifications of the Union Board's action and bring a sense of reason to those who have thus far demonstrated none." The letters were signed by Janet Latz, president, Frederick Tourkow, community relations chairman, and Benjamin Eisbart executive director of the Federation:

NEW YORK (JTA) -- The National Council of Churches (NCC) will consider a resolution that calls for the suspension of U.S. aid to Israel at its governing board meeting here next month, it was announced. The policy-making board will take up a resolution by the Antiochian Orthodox Christian Diocese of North America that calls for the suspension of aid until Israel "complies with international law and goarantees the human rights of Christians and Muslims in Israel and the occupied territories. The meeting Nov. 8-10 at the Roosevelt Hotel will also hear the first report of a special panel that was created recently to consider NCC positions on the Middle East. The NCC has been under fire for refusing to suspend Archbishop Valerian Trifa from its board.

A JCOMMITTEE STUDY SHOWS THAT THE PASSION PLAY REMAINS ANTI-SEMITIC

SAN FRANCISCO, Oct. 25 (JTA) - Despite a serious effort by officials of Oberammergau in West Cermany to cleanse the 330-year-old. Plaston Play of its anti-devisits political and pre-judice, the drama remains "structurally anti-semitic." It continues to malign Lewish Jaw, to depict the Judoism of Jesus! Time as corrupt and punitive, and to dramatize those Cospel sources which cast the most negative light on Jewish motives and actions.

These conclusions emerge from the latest line-by-line analysis of the revised 1980 Oberammergou Possion Play, published by the Interreligious Affairs Department of the American Lewish Committee: The findings of the study, entitled "Oberammergou 1980-Progress and Problems," were made public here today at a meeting of the

were made public here today at a meeting of the AJCommittee's Interreligious Affairs Commission, whose national chairman is Robert Jacobs of Chicago.

The Commission is meeting in connection with the Al Committee's Notional Executive Courcil sessions, continuing afflough Sunday at the Fairmont Hotel here. In presenting the study's findings to Commission members from throughout the country, Rabbi Marc Tanenbaum, Al Committee's national interreligious affairs director, who met with Oberammergau officials on four successive occasions since 1977, declared:

"Our systematic study of the 1980 text, finds that a number of significant passages, scenes, and languages changes have been made which correspond in detail to the findings of the Cemanianguage analysis which AUC delegations submitted to the Oberammergau Town Council and discussed with them during our four meetings in 1977, 1978 and 1979. The removal of these anti-lewish passages are to be welcomed. Nevertheless, the overriding conclusion of our latest study is: 14sit stands, the drama retains an anti-lewish impact despite the well-intentioned efforts of those who have revised it."

General Conclusions Of Study

conducted by Judith Banki, A Committee assistant interreligious director; the study analyzes in defail major problem themes or areas in the 1980-text, and comes to these general conclusions:

"Faced with the farmidable rayk of removing the anti-Semitism from a structurally anti-Semitic drama, those who revised the script for the 1980 performance of the Oberaminergau Passion Play have tried to accomplish this end largely through judicious cutting. They have made a serious effort to cleanse the play of accusations of collective - Wewish guilt and rejection, and of anti-Jewish

polemic and prejudice.

They have deleted the explicit allegations in the 1980 and 1970 text that God has rejected the lewish people and ended his covenant with them. They have removed many of the most blathern expressions of sadism, vengefulness and greed on the part of the traders (in the Temple), the priests and, the people. They have added an introductory exhaution cautioning each spectator to treeognize himself, as guilty in what happened ...

time are all lumped together as hateful enemies of Jesus who cynically manipulate the populace into a creaming mob, and who hound Jesus to the cross and derive joyful satisfaction from his condemnation and suffering. The merchants, though their importance has been diminished (in thissext), still play their non-Biblical role.

"Pflate is still portrayed as a sympathetic weakling, forced into condemning Jesus by the cruel Jews against his will. Jewish low: is still depicted falsely as harsh and punitive. The Jewish people still call down the blood curse upon/themselves and their children. In short, revision of the Oberammergou drama has taken the form of substantial cutting, but not of essential rethinking. The traditional anti-Jewish polemic which shaped the priginal text has not been examined, nor have the insights of current Biblical and extra-Biblical scholarship been incorporated into the dynamics of the play."

Conclusion of Catholic Priest

Tanenbuum renarted that "significently, e" leading Catholic priest-school in Germany, Father Wilm Sanders of Hamburg, who is a member of the Ecumenical Study Commission of the German Catholic Bishops Conference and German Conditiator for the Societies for Christian-Lewish Relations, has completed his own study of the 1980 revised text, and his conclusions coincide with those of the American Jewish Committee study. These are summarized in his words."

"The play for 1980 is certainly not the play for all of the future, nor has Oberammergau taken seriously its opportunity to share in the changed updatstanding of the relationship between Jews and shadows to a large part of Christendom as our ecumenical study aroup formulated in 1970.

"With abbreviations and the change of words, alone, there is no positive message and this is, of course, the declared goal of those to whom the continued existence of the Passian Play is of heartfelt-concern. You cannot do it in a single sentence in the prologue."

Tanenbaum announced that the A JCommittee study was being published in Cerman by the Bavarian Catholic Academy in Muoich and would be distributed to the Cerman and international press as well as no hourists who will be attending the 1980 performance.
