CABINET CONDEMNS UN ASSEMBLY RESOLUTION DECLARING THE CAMP DAVID A GREEMENTS AS INVALID

JERUSALEM, Dec. 2 (JTA) -- The Cabinet hoday strongly condemned the United Nations General Assembly's resolution declaring the Camp David accords evolicy. The resolution good price of the declaring the condenses the condenses are supported thursday night by a vate of 75-33 with 37 abstentions, was denounced in a Cabinet communique as "another proof of the decline of the United Nations. The international organization designed to keep the peace, "condemns" a peace-

agreement, "The communiture said.

The General Assembly resolution declared that the Camp David agreements signed in September, 1978 by Israel, Egypt and the United States, "Index-on-validity insolar as they purport to determine the future of the Palestinian people and the Palestinian territories occupied by Israel since 1967." Although the General Assembly, and other UN badies have expressed apposition to the agreements in the past, this declaration was the first by the General Assembly to reject the accords by name.

The resolution also condemned all partials agreements and separate treaties which constitute of lagrant violation of the Palestinian people, "a reference to the Israeli-Egyptian peoce treaty, and rejected those provisions at the Camp David agreements "which ignore, Infringe upon, violate or destinities including the right of return, the right of self-determination and the right to tational independence and sovereignty in Palestinie."

The resolution was apposed by Israel,

Egypt, the U.S. and eight of the time member states of the European Economic Community. France, the nirth member, obstained. An earlier attempt by Egypt to delete the references to the Carifp David accords was deteated by a vote of 56-51 with 30 abstentions.

The resolution was supported by Third World countries. The Cabinet communique criticized, the non-aligned bloc, for "vating automatically for resolutions proposed by the most extreme of the Arab states which are backed by the Soviet bloc."

FOREIGN AID BILL STATLED

WASHINGTON, Dec. 2 (JTA) -- Much at the current U.S., governmental-fiscal year may have elapsed before the Congress adopts new foreign aid legislation, already two months overduce, and President Carter signs it into law. The Senate-House conterence held its last session Nov. 1 in attempting to limn out differences between the appropriation bills, passed in the two chambers and the likelihood is that the conterees will not reconvene until late January at the earliest.

The hangup involves a dozen items on which they disagree or have not decided but the main issues are on U.S. funding for the World Bank and the International Monetary Fund with the Senate being more liberal. Agreements have been reached with no dissent on-most Middle East appropria-

tions but until the legislation is formally determined all decisions are considered merely tenta-

The legislation calls for \$1.8 billion in military aid and economic supporting assistance for Israel; \$750 million for Egypt-in economic supporting assistance exclusive of some \$250 million in Food for Peace products, and \$180 million for local military support. The Senate bill is for \$8.140 billion for the House measure is for \$7.746 billion for the fiscal year 1979-1980 that began last October 1

The conferees agreed to pare down the funding-for Syria-to SS5 million from the S60 million asked by the Administration but they disagreed on the Senate-approved measure that would prohibit use of the U.S. funds to the United Nations to be 3 diverted to program helping the terrorist Ralestive Liberation Organization. The Item concerning the RQ includes a ban on funding also for Rhodesian guerrillas.

Congress will enter its year-end holiday recess either Dec. 14 or Dec. 21 and not return until probably Jan. 22. Should the conferees report to their respective chambers that they are unable to reach agreement, it is indicated that the Congress will use a continuing resolution to sundification of the foreign aid programs on the last fiscal year's ilmitations until the new programs are legislaced, which may not take place until late winter.

NEO-NAZIS SENTENCED - FINED

BONN, Dec. 2 (1TA) — A-West Berlin courths sentenced a 28-year-old coal dealer to 11 months in jail and fined two 17-year-old youths \$170 and \$115, respectively. They were found guilty of spreading neo-Nazi propaganda in a television broadcast and for displaying Nazi Party symbols. The Nazi Party is illegal in West Berlin.

The three appeared before a West German TV team last March in a Berlin cate where they adescribed themselves as members of the Kampfgruppe Grossdeutschland and demanded the abolition-of-the ban on the Nazi Party. The trio displayed placards with swastikas and distributed, them to the patrons;

The judge sharply criticized the television station which, he said, stood morally accused for televising whethree: "The mild sentence and low fines were justified, the judge said, because the TV station bears part of the responsibility. The TV station's reporter was criticized for screening the 90-second scene, the TV station-had-paid of \$140 fee to the trio."

THE ANTI-SEMMISM OF THE USLP

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (JTA) -- Anti-Semitism is an integral component of the United States Labor Party (USLP) headed by Lyndon LaBouche, Ir., a candidate for President of the United States in 1980, according to reports published by Our Town, a weekly Manhattan newspaper, the New York Times, and the Anti-Defamation League of Binai British.

The ADL has charged the USLP, the political

cam of the National Caucus of Labor Committees (NCIC) with sonducting an anti-Jewish hate propagarda compaign that adds "an insidious dimension to its bizarre conspiracy theories and political hallustrations."

ADL recently issued an 18-page report, linking the USLP with Liberty Lobby, the far right group headed by "long-time anti-Semite" Willis Carto, and with Iraq and the Soviet Union, from which it reportedly received laundered. I for the property of the pro

The report also says that TaRouche has created a "conspiracy fantasia" in which-lews supposedly instigate anti-Semitism as part of a conspiracy involving the British morarchy; the British mobility and upper classes; the British Secret intelligence Service and cults and secret societies such as the "Cult of Isis" and the "Blod Guelph mobility."

Three Anti-Semtic Themes Cited

The three basic anti-Semitic themes cited by ADL use; the Nazis did not kill ax million Jews during the Holocoust; the Jews-were responsible for the crucifiction of Christ; and Zientin is making.

LaRouche, 57, is a veteran of the far left and is a former Marxist teacher and theoretician, and a former member of the (Trotskyis) Socialist Markets Parky, the Star founded various extremeleft groups, including one allied with Students for a Democratic Society in the late 1960s. He ran for President in 1976, and polled a total of 40,043 votes in 26 states.

The USLP has approximately 3,000 members, according to ADL. Both The Times and Our Town report that, despite their anti-Semihism, NCLC-USLP have a significant number of Jewish members, but ADL does not discuss this phenomenan.

Both NGLC and USI P are part of an "international complex of affiliated, parallel and front organizations, plus various publications controlled by LaRouche, and active in the U.S., "Canada, Mexico, Latin America and Europe, the apparative reportedly spends S3 million a year for its activities," the ADL report says.

Publications include a twice-weekly newspaper called "New Solidarity," with a circulation of about 25,000, a magazine called "The Campaigner," a technological monthly called "Eusian," and "Executive Intelligence Review;" a weekly-political-economic analysis for business and industry that sells for \$10 per issue and \$400 per year. Affiliated and front organizations controlled by LaRouche in the U.S. include the taxexempt Fusion Energy Foundation, according to ADL.

Anti-Semitic Campaign Traced

The report traces USLP1s anti-Senthie compaign to March 1978, about the same time that Liberty Lobby!s weekly, newspaper "Spotlight" was giving front page coverage to a lawsuit brought against the ADL-by Liberty Lobby. A similar article appeared in USLP1s "New Solidarity;" and in the following months, the USLP paper, carried a barrage of articles attacking ADL, B'nai B'rith's the 'Jewish' community and Israell' officials.

In April 1979 the USLP and NCLC filed suit against the ADL in Supreme Court of New

York County, charging ADL with stander, libel, invasion of privacy, asseutt and harrossment, and seeking \$26 million in damages. ADL has filed a motion for dismissal of the suit.

Explaining the link between NCLC-USLP and Liberty Lobby, the ADL report says if began during LaRouche's 1976 Presidential campaign. On Oct. 11, 1976, Liberty Lobby's "Spetlight" published a generally favorable review of a USLP report entitled "Carter and, the Party of International Jerrorism."

USLP claims to have units in 36 cities in 19 states and the District of Columbia, with head-quarters at 304 West 58th Street in New York City, ADL says. The New York regional office is listed as 26 Court Street, Brooklyn, in "New Solidarityae".

The Jewish Telegraphic Agency has made several attellings to reach USLP officials and discuss the ADL report with them. An Albany, New York phone number fisted in a recent issue of "New Solidarity" hids been disconnected. There was no answer at the New York regional office. The JTA then called Campaigner Ablications in Manhattan, publishers of "New Solidarity," asking for information about USLP. "We only print their paper" was the reply, but the person answering the telephone provided another Manhattan phone number for USLP. However, there was no answer at this number. BRZEZINSKI: IHE U.S. WILL NEVER . -

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (11A) — President Carter's National Security Advisor told 350 delegates to the Jewish Labor Committee's bigenial convention here last Eriday night that he considered Camp David "one of the greatest achievements" of the Carter Administration.

achievements of the Larrer Administration.
Zbigniew Brzezinski, who spake at the opening session of the JLC's 45th anniversary convention, said that "we hope to draw, with Cathy David as the beginning, more Arab riotions who want to live together with the West, into the treaty process. We want to make Camp David intention to a wider reality. We will never so anything to thinimize the security of Lurel." Brzezinski alsosated that "Islam is not our enemy" and the seizing of the U.S. Embassy in Teheran is "an abberation" that goes against the teachings of the Islamic religion.

Shimon Peres, leader of Israel's Labor Party, told the delegates yesterday that "the free world" is being "too free" by abandaning its democratic allies at their moments of crisis Stating that. We in Israel knew in our hearts about the secret links between "Iran's ruler. Ayaratlah Ruholla Khomeini and Palestine Liberation. Organization chief Yasir Arafat, Peres worded that "unless we stand united against the PLO-type terrorists, we stall Justier separately."

He said that neither Moslems nor Arabs were the enemies of the free world, but that ferrorists, added and abetted in the main by the Soviet Union, were. Peres stressed that the links between the PLO, the Red Brigades and the Bader-Meinhof gangs made It-incumbent on the democratic nations to unite against such terrorist acts.

Commenting on the situation in Iran, he said the free world seems to be abandoning the United Stotes. "I thought that after all the U.S. has done for Europe, they would act more united with her," Peres said. "France's Resident has parted himself on the back because Khomeini was given refuge near Paris, France's affitude seems to be; befter the U.S. than us."

U.S. Labor Steadfastly Supports Israel

Jacob Sheinkman, president of the JLC and secretary treasurer of the Amalgamated Clothing and Lextile Workers Union, AFL-GIO, said the failure of the world community to curb, and condenn terrorisms by the PLO "only service to encourage more of such acts by others. The events in Iran, Saudi Arabia and Pakistan are but the fruit of such reaction."

Lone Kirkland, president of the AFL-CLO, in a message to the convention, said the American labor movement "will remain steadfast in its support of Israel, strengthened by the knowledge, made, surer in recent months; that to hold the fort for demogracy and reason in the Middle East is to hold it for Americans."

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (JTA) -- Philip Klutznick, president of the World-Lewish Congress, who has been cominated by President Carter to be Secretary of Commerce, announced here that at a meeting of the WiCongress Executive several days ago fie had formally taken a leave at absence from his post as WiCongress president during his government service.

Klutznick also announced that the Executive had decided that during his beenee and pending a review of the situation by the W-Congress Coverning Board when it meets in April, 1980, the powers and duties of the president will be entrusted to the chairmen of the W-Congress' four regional branches, with Edgar Bronfman, Chairmen of the North American branch, as convenor, and in cooperation with W-Congress secretary general Gerhart Riegare.

The three offer regional chairmen are Zalman Abranov, Israel branch; Gergorio Faigon, Latin American branch; and Maurice Grynhogel, European branch. Klutznick, expressing settlifee than with the Executive's decision, said that to the extent that his new responsibilities permit, he intends to maintain his interest in the educational and cultural activities of the W.Kongress.

UN SELECTS A JCOMMITTEE OFFICIAL TO LEAD CONCLAVE IN THAILAND

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (JTA) — The United Nations has selected the director of the American Jewish Committee's division of International Organizations to introduce a discussion on a proposed UN declaration against discrimination at a special international consultation this week in Baráckok. Theiland.

Sidney Liskofsky, an internationally recognized authority on human rights issues, who is also program consultant to the Jacob Blaustein Institute for the Advancement of Human Rights, will open the discussion, which will be held through Dec. 7. The international consultation, sponsored by UNESCO, will bring together some 20 experts on the subject from all parts of the world, as well as about 40 non-governmental organization observers.

The consultation was organized at the request of the UN's Human Rights Commission. Several UN bodies have been working for about two decades on a "draft declaration on the elimination of all forms of intollerance based on religion or belief." The Human Rights Commission asked UNESCO to organize the consultation "embracing various established schools of religious thought, on the cultural and religious basis as buman rights in reliation to the premaren of religious Thought in the conclusions will be considered by the Human Rights Commission when it next takes up the draft declarations this February.

Lubavitch leaders said that the accused Hassidim were yeshiva students returning home from a wedding party who had "averreacted" to taunts by Rhodes who, they charged, snatched a skullcap from the head of one of the Hassidim.

INTER-RACIAL GROUP LAUNCHES CAMPAIGN TO REDUCE CRIME IN NYC

NEW YORK, Dec. 2 (JTA) A company to reduce crime in New York City was launched in loyer Manhattan at a rally of some 700. New Yorkers, may of them Jews. The rally represented a cross-section of New Yorkers, from actors to elected officials and rabbis to small business operators. It was spearheaded by the Crown-Heights Coalition, on inter-racial group organized to cope with problems in a racially-troubled section of Brooklyn which is the center of Lubavitcher settlement.

Rabbi Mendel Shemtov, co-chairman of the coalition which also led to formation of the New York Mobilization against Crimes, said that "everyone agrees that crimes are deplorable and "criminals are reprehensible" but that "it's mostly like the weather — unpredictable. Everybody, seems helpless." He urged all levels of government to move in against crime in New York and

everywhere else in the United States.

The rally last Thursday grew out of the murder of & Hassidic rabbi, David Okunov, 68, in Crown Heights last month. The organizers, describing the "chilling borror." of victous crime in their neighborhoods, called for a review of the judicial system, a federal department dedicated to crime prevention, and "immediate overhoul" of the periol system.

WASHINGTON (JTA) — The Department of Commerce has accused the Core Labordiories, Inc. of Dallas of 28 violations of the U.S. anti-boycott laws. The Department said Histaduring 1978, Core supplied a strement to "entities" in Egypt, Iraq, Libya and Bahra in hat it had "no direct or indirect connection whotsoever with Israel." The Department pointed out that "this is a violation of the prohibition against furnishing information about business relationships with a boycotted country." It said that Core could be fined up to \$280,000 and its authority to export could be suspended or revoked. This is the fourth action against such/violators in the last three months.
