ROME COURT WILL ALLOW EX-NAZIS TO APPEAL HIS LIFE SENTENCE

ROME, Dec. 20 (JTA) — The Supreme Military. Court of Romethas decided to allow former 55 Commander Walter Redec, the last surviving Nazi war. criminal in an Italian prison, to appeal his life sentence, despite expressions of outgoe and protests thom the families of his victims and others. Reder was responsible for ordering the deaths of more than 3000 civilians in the towns of Marzabotho, Luccound.

Loss March, the mithary court in La Spezia rejected Reder's appeal. But this week the Rome tribural multified that decision on grounds that the lower court "did not take into sufficient account Reder's spentence for his deeds." It returned the appeal to the La Spezia court which will have to decide whether there are grounds for his release. Reder was convicted in Bologna in 1951. Over the years, his lowyest have filled repealed appeals to a commutation of spetence. All of them failed, due mainly to the refusal of the citizens of Marzabotto to see Reder

The townspeople are standing firm against his latest bid. "The gravity of the crimes committed by Reder demands the full lest severity of justice," they maintain. The release of the ex-Nazi, they say, would disgrace the memory of the martyrs and the values of the Italian resistance movement.

Reder is incorcerated in the Gaeta Military Prison which housed Herbert Kappler, another Nazi war criminal responsible for the Ardealine Coves massacre and the deportation of over 1000 Jews from Rame: Kappler died last year after escaping from a prison toggital.

CABINET MAY SHUT DOWN EL AL

JERUSALEM, Dec. 20 (JTA) — The Gobinet is seriously considering who sing down El Al, Israel's national of line, which lost SS0 million this year and is expected to lose double that amount next year. ISRAELIS HIT-BY SHARP PRICE HIKES By David Landau and Gil Sedan

JERUSALEM, Dec. 20 (JTA) -- Israelis, were hit this week with sharp hikes in the price

of gasoline, home heating bil and industrial fuel and higher rates for electricity and water are imminent. The fuel prices went up by an average of 30 percent, effective of midnight Tuesday. At the same time, the Knesser's Finance Committee agreed an a 32 percent increase in the price of electricity for both private and commercial consumers. Water rates are expected to jump by 16.8 percent to cover higher pumping costs. These increases will be followed inevitably by an increase in bus and toxi fares, according to economic experts.

Energy Minister Yitzhak Modai went on the radio at midnight Tuesday to announce the bod news on fuel and to justify the Cabinet's action. He said the higher prices were required to cover the increased prices were required to cover the increased prices for cude oil announced by some of the Organization of Petraleum Exporting Countries (OPEC) members in advance of the cartel's pricesetting meeting this week in Caracas, He said the increases were also necessitated by the decline of the Pound to the dollar since the last fuel price rises, two months ago.

Modai offered some consolation. He hold the harried consomers that in some European countries—which he did not name—mohorists pay even more for yusuline. Economists said boday that the latest increases will raise the cost-of-living index by some five percental a time when inflation to summing all an annual rate of about 150 percent.

Electric Workers Shocked

Meanwhile, a major labor relations problem arese boday when the National Electric Corp. board of threators amounced a decision to limit the free supply of electricity to its 7000/employes. Up to now, electric company employes paid no electric bills no matter how much electricity they used in their tomes.

That privilege amounted to hundreds of Pounds per month per household. Now, however, their free consumption will be limited to 400 kilowatts per house which is still double the average private consumption. The employes will be billed on a silding scale, for the power they consume in excess of that amount.

The electric workers reacted angrily. They denaunced "unilateral decisions" affecting their wages. A spokesman for the workers said they were ready to negotiate and "do our bit to help the national economy." But they will not to lerate. "a one-sided violation of the work agreement."

SPECIAL TO THE JIA JIS FACULTY SENATE VOTES 25-19 TO TABLE ACTION ON ORDINATION OF WOMEN Chancellar Says Issue Is Dead For Time Being By Ben Gallob

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (JTA) -- After nearly three-and-a-holf-hours of debate, the 44 members of the Faculty Senate of the Jewish Theological Seminary of America (JTS) voted today 25-19 to table a report recommending the admission of women to the Seminary for ordination as Conserva tive rabbis. Chancellor Gerson Cohen, who had named and headed a special commission to exam ine the issue, told the Jewish Telegraphic Agency that the vote was "a defeat of the motion to accept women as candidates for ordination at the Jewish Theological Seminary.!

Asked whether there was any possibility of the issue being revived, he replied "I do not fore-see the matty being revived in the context of the tive movement. He said that the only further action he planned at the present time was to pres ent a comprehensive report on the issue to the JTA student body next month.

The vote, which had been scheduled origingly, for Fiebruary, came after a day-long meet-ing on Tuesday by 175 members of the Rabbinical Assembly (RA), the association of Conservative rabbis, who called themselves the Conference on Halachic Pagess.

After hearing position papers by five senior members of the JTS faculty, the group at the Tuesday meeting approved a resolution that "we, more than 200 members of the RA assembled at the conference an Halachic Process, express our opposition to the ordination of women by the dewish.
Theological Seminary at this time. We call on the Seminary to assure our continuation as a movement committee to halacha and halachic process.

On Nov. 6, the 16 faculty members considered to be halachists sent a letter to Cohen/informing him that they believed that the JTS Senate, the gcademic policy making body of the Sem-laary, "as presently constituted," is "not the proper forum for deciding fundamental Seminary policy." The signers also declared: "We will not a

continue to participate in debating or voting on the question of the ordination of women unless a proper body is constituted to deal with this question!

Sequence Of Events

The sequence of eyents that ended today in a rebuff to the substantial opinion in the movement favoring ordination of women began when delegates to the 1977 convention of the RA approved a resolution to admit women to the JTS as rabbinical condi-dates but withdrew it when Cohen promised to name a commission, comprised of 14 members representing the entire spectrum of Conservative opinion, with himself as chairman, to study the issue and make recommendations.

Cohen promised the 1977 convention delegates that he would commit himself to bringing the commission findings to the JTS Senate to act on the commission's finding early in 1979. But last April, Cohen said he had agreed to a request by JTS faculty members to defer until early in 1980 action on the commission report, which favored ordination of women.

Last January, the commission, in its final report, submitted a recommendation to the 1979 RA convent. tion, declaring it found nothing in Jewish law barring women from the rabbinate and recommending that "qualified women be ordained as rabbis." Cohen was forced to schedule a vote this month instead of in January by the mounting pressure from the JTS faculty members whose opposition to ordination was expressed both in the meeting Tuesday and in the let ter. of Nov. 6.

HERTZBERG: MUTING OF DISSENT AMONG

NEW YORK, Dec. 20 (JTA) -- The muting of dissent within the American Jewish community is cousing more form to Israel than its, enemies, according to Rabbi Arthur Hertzberg, a vice president of the World Jewish Congress and the tarmer president of the American Jewish Congress.

Speaking of the annual Chanukah dinner of Americans for Progressive Israel-Hashomer Hatzair, Hertzberg warned that "the single most dangerous thing that can happen to Israel is the muting of dissent..." He noted that when American Jews Wish to debate the issues that are reported on and discussed every day, in the Israel press, there are some in the American Jewish community, who charge that it would be "freeson" to do so.

"Dissent in the Jewish community was always legitimate in this country on the right," Hertzberg said, pating that no one faulted the critics of the Lator Party government. He recalled that the history of the Zionist movement is replete with dissent. He pointed out that "labolistisky walked out of the World Zionist Organization" to pursue an independent pelvicy. "For his heirs to say it is dangerous to dissent. its nonsense," Hertzberg declared.

History Of Dissent In Zionist Movement

The Zionist movement, he continued, was in dissent since its beginning. Chaim Weizmann apposed Theodor Herzl on cultural issues and Herzl sow from for Societist Zionism in the Zionist mayement, Hertzberg soid. He noted that since the founding of the State of Istael, American Jews have been asked to unequivocally support the policy of the "in"

Most Prime Ministers since Levi Eshkol have come to the U₂S, and "called together the Jewish leadership and told them that hey were going on a dangerous mission to Washington and must have the unanimous support of the Jewish community. They then returned to Israel and parlayed this domestically into a claim that American Jews are unanimously behind their policies." Hertzberg said he finds that Israelis believe "that all you have to do is push the button, and out comes support for the gayernment." The myth then, he said, is created of American Jewish unanimative.

Hertzberg opined that the future of Israel lies with organizations such as Americans. For Progressive Israel spand individuals who defend Israel for its lasting values, who are against "occupation" and who see "falestinians as having a national consciousness of their own. He characterized the "IsraelL right as indistinguishable from the Ayato'llahs." The authentic valce of Zlonism is "not in the leadership of the arganizations but that of the people who still speak out," Hertzberg asserted.

2817 IMMIGRANTS ARRIVED LAST MONTH

JERUSALEM, Dec. 20 (JTA) -- Some 2817 immigrants arrived in Israel last month, Yehuda Dominita, director general of the Jewish Agency immigration and absorption geograment, told the Agency Executive. Most of the immigrants are Russian, but the dropout rate last manth was still 65.3 percent, halfsaid.

Some 34,500 immigrants arrived so far this year. By the and of the year, Dominitz predicted, the number may reach 38,000; an increase of 30 percent compared to last year. There was a slight rise last month in the number of immigrants from France and Great Britain, compared to a drop in the number of immigrants from South Africa and Argentina. Dominitz reported.
