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TOP REAGAN AIDES TELL JEWISH AUDIENCE HE WILL KEEP CAMPAIGN PROMISES ON ISRAEL IN VIEW OF HIS 'PRINCIPLED' POSITION ON TAIWAN By David Friedman

NEW YORK, Oct. 23 (JTA) — Top aides to Republican Presidential candidate Ronald Reagan told a Jewish audience last night they could be certain Reagan would keep his campaign promises on Israel based on the former California Governor's "record," and his "principled" position on I Jaiwan.

One of them, Edwin Meese, Reagan's chief of staff, also said that anyone appointed by Reagan, especially in the foreign policy field, will have to be "identically aligned with the Governor's position, particularly as regards Israel."

Meese was responding to a question on whether former Texas Gov. John Connolly and others with close fies to Soudi Arabia and other Arab countries would be appointed to high positions by Reagan. He said that Reagan is not considering potential appointments until after the Nov. 4 election.

Meese, Richard Allen, Reagan's top firerign policy advisor; Alan Greenspan, his top economic odvisor, and Raymond Tonter, another breign policy advisor, antwered questions for 90 minutes at a meeting in the 51. Regis Hotel sponsared by the Jewish Community Relations Council of New., York (JCRC) attended by some 200 pissons.

Both Malcolm Hoenlein, executive director of the JCRC, and George Klein, a JCRC vice president who chaired the meeting, said they hoped to have a similar meeting with advisors to President Carter.

Long Standing Support Of Israel City

The assurances on Reagan's position came when a questioner pointed out that the Jewish community hears promises on Israel every four years only to see them broken after the election. Meese said that Reagan's support of Israel goes back long before he ever considered entering politics. "Look at the record," he said. "I can assure you on that basis you don't have to worry about Robrald Reagan."

Allen added that Reagan's "principled defense" of Taiwan, despite strong pressure on him to abandon that position, is proof that he will stand by the friends of the United States, including Israel.

Allen said that Reagon supports the Camp David framework based on United Nations Security Council Resolutions 242 and 338; He said any expansion of the framework must come through the desires of the parties involved and not U.S. pressure. Allen added that a Reagon Administration would "probably not" seek to bring the UN into Mideast negotiations and would "probably categorically not" seek to involve the Soviet Union in the talks.

On Verusalem, Meese sold that Reagan believes Jerusalem must remain undivided with "Israeli sovereignty over Jerusalem." He said the designation of where a country's capital should be,

and thus where embassies should be located, is a matter for a sovereign state.

Meese said that a Reagan Administration would take the lead in fighting terrorism throughout the world and would not hesitate in branding the Palestine Liberation Organization as "outlaws."

Allen said that in any arms sales to Saudi Arabia and other Arab countiles by a Reagan Administration there would first have to be assurances that it would not damage the balance of arms power against Isrpel. He said the first test will be Israel's ability to defend itself.

Stand On Far Right Fundamentalists.

When the question of the for right fundamentalist groups which support Reagan was raised, Meese replied that Reagan has "mode it clear" that groups like Moral Majority who support him must accept his views and not he accept theirs.

He said Reagan believes in the separation of church and state and that no religious group will be able to impose its beliefs or doctrines on a Reagan government. Allen also said Reagan believes in tuition tox credits for parents who send their children to private schools, including paraehial schools, as a way of protecting their right to send children to the schools of their choice.

Klein, a leading supporter of Reagon, also introduced several other major supporters of the Republican candidate, including Max Fisher, of Detroit; Albert Spiegel, of Los Angeles; and Maxwell Robb, John Loeb and Rito Hauer, all of Thew York.

Klein said that the audience was made up of the leaders of the organizations in the JCRC. Meese said he was hold that while there were some Reagan supporters and even Carter backers, most of the audience was undecided. JCRC president Laurence Tisch who arrived at the end of the meet—"Ing. stressed the importance of voting.

REPORT TO SENATE UNIT QUESTIONS ADMINISTRATION'S HANDLING OF ISRAEL'S SECURITY, ECONOMIC PROBLEMS By Joseph Polokoff

WASHINGTON, Oct. 23 (JTA) -- A 7500ward report to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on U.S.-Israeli relations prepared by its Middle East staff specialists questions President Carter's statement that a "reasessment" of relations between the two countries has not and will not take place under his Administration and stressed "the need" by the U.S. "to understand and address Israel's security and economic problems."

The report was prepared by staff members Barry Schoefiet and Graeme Banneman following their July visit to Israel and was presented to the Committee on Oct. 15 by Sen, Richard Stone (D. Fla.), chaiman of It's subcommittee on Near Fastern and South Asian, Affairs. It is expected that hearings on Middle East issues will be held by Shore when Congrey returns from its Presidential election recess to conclude this session's susiness.

"This report," Stone wrote the full Committee in a memorandum released yesterday, "raises gnumber of serious questions regarding the Administration's handling of Israel's security and economic problems and makes specific recommendations regarding ways in which this committee can address these problems."

In an Interview following the report's relegency stoke was asked by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency about Vice President Walter Mandale's statement Oct. It to the Zionist Organization of America's Stan anional convention here that appeared to vary with the report's criticism of U.S. military policy.

No Information Available On M-60 Tanks

Pointing out that Israel's strength is being increased by U.S., aid, Mondale said "the reason that they (Israel) will have substantially more than a thousand of our best M-60 tanks, the reason our beint Chiefs of Staff..., and our Undersecretary of Defense just want to Israel to work with her leaders is that the President sent them on these missions and made these decisions."

However, neither Stone nor the Committee staff had information on the 1000 tanks nor could information on their delivery be obtained from

Administration sources.

"I've pever heard about their 1000 traks," and Stone through whose subcommittee the Administration would start seeking Congressional authorization for delivery. "But even if they were to be provided, how is payment to be made?" Stone asked. "Israel is out of money. If the Administration had not escalated the arms race in the Middle East to the disadvantage of Israel this situation would not have arisen."

Committee specialists felt Israel could make it own tanks. Their report showed that U.S.—Israel coproduction of an advanced "Merkava" Iank" allows Israel to produce it at a savings of \$400,000 per tank,and the project "has substituted for the otherwise needed purchase of approximately 170 M-60 tonks," "It added, "this program is a good example of providing funds for Israel to produce its own produce! while it purchases substantial quantities of materials in the United States. This tank project is in need of further funding."

Says U.S. Mideast Policy Is Shortsighted

Commenting on the report, Stone said, "present U.S., policy toward Israel and the Middle East is shortsighted. It is helping to accelerate the Middle East arms race and to endanger efforts to convince Israel to take the additional risks that will be necessary to reach agreement on the peaceful future of the West Bank and Gaza Strip."

"Undermining Israeli confidence in the U.S os a long-term ally is not the way to successful peace negotiations," he said. "Yet, Israeli's doubts and insecusives have been heightened by the U.S. in many ways." Noting "Israel is an important strategic asset to our country," Sone-said the Administration has been increasing sophisticated weaponry to Soudi Arabia and coordinating joint military exercises with Egypt which it also is supplying with major weapons while down-grading trael's strategic importance

"We are giving and selling military weapons to countries that refuse to join the peace process," Stone added. "And by rewarding Jordan, Saudi Arabia and others for refusing to talk peace, we are penalizing Israel for the major concessions it made in the Camp David agreement. This makes no sense since peace is our goal."

Pointing out that the report "shows how counter-productive our policies are to the chances of expanding the peace process," Stone

raised these questions. What incentive do the confrontation states have to turn from belligerency to peace? What are we trying to prove in denying-ourselves the military expertise and regional knowledge of our strongest ally, the State of Israel? What are we trying to prove by escalating the arms race in the Middle East? And what are we trying to prove by requiring that Israel's weakened economy bears still larger detense burdens?"

While the report was prepared prior to the signing Oct. 17 of the U.S. -Israel oil agreement that assures U.S. supplies to Israel in time of emergency although at the highest U.S. prices paid for imported oil, the report's conclusions set forth'a number of other "tanglible steps" to alleviate Israeli concerns.

These include a necycling of Israel's debt servicing into programs which can strengthen Israel's economic base by improving its ability to export speak; and technology to the U.S. Another suggestion is lifts' ing of U.S. restrictions on Israel's military export soles which would allow Israel to sell military items which it produces or which is surplus to its needs to third countries which are friendly to the U.S.

International financial assistance also is recommended, Israel is excluded from development capital under most international financial institutions because its per capita income level is too high but these institutions do not take into account a country's percapita debt.

Israeli participation in U.S. aid projects for Egypt was urged. This could serve "as a natural bridge" for stimulating Israel-Egypt namalization economically and be a source of economic benefit to Israel, the report said.

"There can be no doubt that the body politic of Israel is undergoing great political, economic and security stress -- much of which has arisen as a direct result of the Camp David process." the report said.
"Israel ip olitical, economic and military leaders have been suprised, discouraged and even angered by what is perceived as a lack of interest and understanding by the U.S. of the effect of the peace process upon Israel."

TWO DEPORTED WEST BANK MAYORS APPEAL TO HIGH COURT TO REVERSE DEPORTATION ORDERS By Gil Sedan and Yitzhok Shargil

JERUSALEM, Oct. 22 (JTA) — The mayors of Hebron and Halhaul, Fold Kowasme and Mohammed Milhim, appealed to the Supreme Court today to reverse the deportation orders under which they were expelled from Israel-held territory, last May. Their attorney, Felicia Langer, submitted the appeal after Premier Menachem Begin, in his capacity of Defense Minister, refused to intervene.

Begin told Mayor. Rashad A-Shawa of Gaza and Elias Friej of Bethlehem yesterday that he could not bypass the Supreme Court which will render the final judgement in the case. He promised that the government would abide by whatever the high court decides. A-Shawa and Friej met with the Premier for an hour and 40 minutes yesterday in a vain attempt to have him intervene with the West Bark Military Government whose special review board upheld the deportation orders after deliberating over the weekend.

The appeal to the Supreme Court asked that the State show cause why the deportation orders should not be reversed. Ms. Langer claimed that the proceedings of the military review board were illegal because "the testimonies of the mayors were not taken into consideration. Their ebquently expressed desire for peace and co-existence were ignored."

Instead, the board ruled on the basis of interviews given by the two mayors while traveling abroad

after their deportation whereas it should have been limited to the deportation order itself. Which was carried out summarily without they hearing the appellants were entitled to under street law, Larger, said.

Long Judicial Process Expected

The Supreme Court is scheduled to begin its consideration of the appeal tomorrow in what is expected to be a long judicial process, possibly lasting for weeks. Kawasme and Milhim wed deported on May 2; within hours of the ambust killing of six yeshiva students in Heban by Palestinian terrorists. While they were not directly implicated in the murders, the Military Covernment contended that their extreme rationalist, anti-Israel public statements created the climate for the terprist act.

Their attorney reportedly has not ruled out a final appeal to Begin should the Süpreme Court decide against them, Veterday's meeting with Begin by mayors A-Shawa and Friej was the first time either of them had been received in the Prime Minister's Office in Jerusalem. In the post, their dealings with the Israeli government were conducted through the Defense Ministry

office in Tel Aviv.

The two mayors, regarded as moderates on the occupied herritories, were aggarently abashed by the failuge of their encounter with Begin. They left his office throught a side door and refused to speak to reporters,

Begin told reporters afterwards that he had explained to them that the review board's decision was not the final word since the deporters have recourse to the Supreme Court. "I told them I cannot grant their request to intervene with the court's decision. If I would have granted their request, it would have meant bypassing the Supreme Court and that I could not do," Begin soid.

Käwasme and Milhim, who remain in custodiners the Allenby Bridge, went on a hunger strike Monday. A demonstration by their relatives outside the Prime Minister's Office was dispersed without incident. Langer said she would demand that the their men be transferred to a regular place of detention where they could receive medical attention.

Meanwhile, attempts by their supporters to convince the mayors in the occupied territories to resign en masse as a gesture of solidarity with the deporters have so far failed. Mayor Ibrahim Tawil of E Bireth spake by telephone last night to Mayors Bossam Shaka of Nablus and Karam Khalaf of Ramallah on the subject, but apparently got no commitment.

Relatives of the deportees appealed in vain to Mayor Friej to resign but he refused. Military Government officials are convinced that there will be no mass resignations because, they said, the mayors know that this time their resignations may be accepted.

90 BILLION SHEKEL BUDGET PRESENTED TO THE KNESSET; NO-CONFIDENCE MOTION ON ECONOMIC POLICY LOSES BY 59-42 BY Gil Sedon

JERUSALEM, Oct. 22 (JTA) — Finance Misser Yigal Huwitz submitted 9.90 billion Shekel revised budget the Knesset yesterday. At the same time, the credited his fiscal policies with holding down inflation and substantially improving Israel's balance of payments situation.

He acknowledged that heavy defense expenditures and the general recession pose serious economic problems.

A no-confidence motion on Huwitz's economic policy was bandily defected in the Knesset today by a vote of 59-42, after which the Knesset approved the amended budget. The motion, introduced by the opposition Labor Alignment, was the first since the Knesset began its winter session-earlier this month. The Alignment summoned home several of its members traveling abroad to participate in the vote although it was clear that the government enjoyed a substantial majority.

Huwitz said the 1980-81 budget had to be re-

Hurwitz soid the 1980-81 budget had to be revised at miglaoint because at the start of the fiscal year the Treasury did not know if it would succeed in containing the inflation rate and whether wage settlements would be reasonable. It esaid that when he took office a year ago, the inflation rate was expected to reach 170 percent but the steps he took put a brake on the spiral which has stabilized at 125 percent.

Brightest Part Of Economic Picture

The brightest part of the economic picture, he said, was, the decline in Israel's balance of payments deficit by "fibilion more than had been forecast at the beginning of the year. At the same time, however, israel has been forced to spend an extra SI billion on fuel, he said."

Full writz claimed that real wages have been preserved in all sectors and workers have been compensated for price increases. The problem now is to restrain spending as much as possible, he said, noting that the deficit remains high and revenue has been reduced because of the recession. He mentioned the problems of covering the budget for Kupar Holim, the Histodrut sick-fund, local municipal ties, universities and other institutions which have legitimate demands.

But the government still spends too much and all cuts introduced so far were cancelled out by deferies spending, he soid. The infrastructure and investments have suffered but welfare has remained constant. The issue is whether the government should contain. inflation first and only then bring the rate down, he soid.

TERRORIST BASE IN LEBANON ATTACKED

TEL AVIV, Oct. 22 (JIA) — Israel Air force planes attacked a territarist base in Lebanon, south of Beirut this aftermoon and returned safely to their bases, a initiatory communique said, It was the second streetly thick on terrorist targets in Lebanon this month within the framework of Israel's policy of pre-emptive action to prevent terrorists from launching attacks on Israel, The terrorist bases were also attacked last Hundrady night.

"We cannot wait until manuders reach. Nohariya or Misgav. Am once again," Premier Menachem Begin declared after today's air attack. He said it was effective in forestalling a termoist raid on Ismel. According to Lebanes sources, the Ismeli air raid lasted over an hour. Ambulances were seen speeding southward from Beirut, apparently to evacuate casualties.

JERUSALEM (JTA) — The chairman of the Böard finish the finish the control of Institutions of Higher Learning, Amos Horev, said Tuesday the current financial crisis might cause universities to shut down. He hald the Knesset Education Committee that universities were short 400 million Shekels and it is not clear where the funds to continue operations would come from. The committee, called for an urgent meeting with the Eindince and Education ministers.

OSIDACH TRIAL TO RESUME NOV. 17.

PHILADELPHIA, Oct. 22 (JTA) — The trial of occused wor criminal Weldedmir Ordidach, which opened here Sept. 25, and was briefly adjourned earlier this month due to his hospitalization with chest pains, is scheduled to resume Nov. 17, it was reported by Jewish Exponent News Editor David Gross, At that time the prosecution and the defense will submit their "requests for findings of fact and canclusions of law" — showing what each side feels the evidence has proven and the law requires — and present their final arguments.

The defense rested its case last week without Osidach having taken the stand on his own
behalf. Defense attorney Louis Konowol had offered to let the 76-year-old Lagan resident testify as long as his time on the stand was limited,
but he also submitted a physician's letter asserting that Osidach, who has a history of heart
truble, could testify only if his medical

condition was "stable.

U.S. District Judge Louis Bechtle, who has been hearing the denaturalization case without a jury and had postponed the proceedings for two weeks while Osidach was hospitalized, ruled that the court could not be responsible for the defendant's health in the absence of a physician. Since Osidach could not afford to keep a physician in attendance — the government had provided such a service while he was a prosecution witness — the prosecution and defense agreed that his carlier deposition would be admitted as evidences.

The government also stipulated for the record that Osidach would have testified to several things had be taken the stand, but not that those things were true, Among those was that he had hidden a lewish family — a wongh and child named Landau — in his cellar during the Nazi occupation of the Ukrainian village of Rowa Ruska. He also would have said that he was not into have with the 'lewish gherto while serving as a Ukrainian millitamon — be face he become police chief — and would have disputed several specific points about, locations and names about which presection witnesses had testified.

The government also agreed to admit the deposition of Osidach's wide levans mather than having her take the stand. Konowor added that Osidach would have stated that he helped a young Jewish girl obtain an identity card, but Justice Department prosecutor Neal Sher would not stripulate that because it is not contained in Osidach's deposition. Konowol-also maintenachtat a photograph of Osidach in uniform published in the Daily News was not really a picture of the defendant.

CANADIAN JEWISH COMMUNITY PROTESTS AGAINST AIR TIME GIVEN TO KKK REPS By Ben Koyfetz

TORONTO—Oct. 22 (JIA) — The National Joint Community Relations Committee of the Canadian Jewish Congress and B'nai B'ni th have protested to the Canadian Radio, Jelevision and Telecommunications Commission (CRTC) about the number of radio stations which have placed their "hot-line" or "open mike" programs of the disposal of a small self-styled Ku Klux Klan point in Jaconto.

The protest, in the form of a memorandum noted that some of the stations which provided air time for KKK representatives were CHIN and CKEY in Japanto, CKOC in Hamilton and CHEX in Peterbarough, all in the province of Ontario. In at least one instance, a talk show on CKEY with a KKr representative was rebroadcast to Western Canada on a hook-tup and calls were received from Western Canadian points, the memorandum poted.

According to the memorandum, CHOK in Samia was so encouraged by its open line interview with a KKK representative "that three days later it scheduled an awayed nea-Nazi, Martin Weiche of London, Ontario, to appear on the same program." The show was cancelled, however, because of protests.

Freedom Is Not License

Radio station owners, their aides and lowyers contended that the interviews complied with free speech. The memorandum agreed that "As a community and as Canadians we can flourish best in an open society which enjoys political democracy and freedom of speech and discussion. This does not, however, mean giving license to propagandists to dissemintended between various classes of citizens and non-citizens. That is the road to debasement of the political coinage."

The memorandum concluded by noting that "the radio stations hold their licenses as a public trust. We appeal to the Commission to ensure that this must is lived up to in a responsible manner."

A similar point was made by Rabbi Lordan Pearlson, chairman of the National Loint Community Relations Committee, who presented the memorandum to the CRTC. He told CRTC members that no radio station would be permitted to let a drug addict give explicit instructions on how to use narcotics, yet hate mangers are allowed free rein on the talk shows.

ACCORD SIGNED FOR U.S. DISTRIBUTION OF ISRAELI-MADE ARAVA COMMUTER PLANE

LOS ANGELES, Oct. 22 (JTA) — An exclusive agreement for U.S. distribution of the Ardvo, 18 to 20 passenger commuter airplane manufactured in Israel, has been announced jointly by Gabriel Gidor, president of Israel/Aircraft Industries in Tel Aviv, and Michael Savage, executive vice president of Consolationard in Beverly Hills.

The Arava, to be known in the United States

as the CommuterLiner, his bean certified by the Federal Availion Administration, the announcement said. The first aircraft will be arriving in this country on Nov. 1. Consolidated Aircraft hos projected sales in the first year of 20 aircraft to serve the needs of the rapidly expanding commuter industry here, according to the announcement.

The Arava, unique for its swing-toil cargo handling capability, can be converted to comfortable, wide-body passenger configuration within minutes. Israel Aircraft Industries has sold 86 Arava airplane during the past eight years in countries throughout the world. The cost for each airplane delivered in the United States is \$1,650,000, the announcement noted.

JERUSALEM, Oct. 22 (JTA) — Costa Rica's envoy to the United Nations in the-late 1940s, Ricards Fournier, played a key role in helping, the Zionist movement win a majority for sovereignty. Last week, his memory was honroadiby the Jewish National Fund in a ceremony at the Peace Forest near Jerusalem, attended by Costa Rican Ambassador Ronald Fernandez-Pinto and senior Foreign MinStry and JNF officials. Fournier's daughter spoke of her father's love of the Zionist cause, and planted a tree in his memory.
