JEWISH JOURNALIST EXECUTED IN IRAN

3y Edwin Eyron PARIS, Dec. 21 (JTA) — An Ironian Jewish

journalist, Simon Forzani, was executed fast Tuesdry night by a firing squidd in Feheran. The news was first reported here last Thursdry by the French news agency, Agence Feance Presse (AFP) for which the veteran journalist wasted, for several vears. However, sources in Paris continued only last Friday that Farzani was Jewish and had at one time been an active member of the Teheran Jewish community. He was reportedly the seventh Jew executed by the regime of Ayatallah Ruholla Khomeini.

Farzani, who was 70 years old, headed for almost 20 years the main Teheran French-language daily, "Journal de Teheran;" sérving as its editor and publisher. After the paper closed down following the tokeover of the Iranian government by the Aytoollah, Farzani started working for the AFP os a translator and reporter. A rested last February, his trial was held in camera and the verdict was kept secret.

"Teheran's "Islamic judge," Hadjatoleslam Gulhani, sold at the time that Farzani was armsted on the basis of documents found at the American Embassy after its occupation by the Islamic students.—He soid these documents show that Farzani was paid a monthly stipend by the "American impegfalist sples."

Explained Source of Stipend

Farzami, according to French sources, explained at the time of his arrest that he was paid for various translations and that he needed, this morey to "supplement his meager, income" from the AFP. The Swiss-born Jewish jegirialist was executed in Teheran's Evin Central Prison where 337 people have already been executed since the Aystallah came to power. Police have assigned a 20-member hamicide squad to investigate the crime and have offered a 20,000 Mark reward for information leading to an arrest and conviction. Immediately after the shoot ing, the police said the assailants would be found among enemies of Israel and the Jews but they did not repeat that speculation and inisted later that there were no clues.

No organization or individual has claimed re sponsibility for the killings. Premier Franz-Josef Strauss of Bavaria denounced the crime and promised that every effort will be made to trace those responsible. Levin came to West Germany in the late 1950.

TEL AVIV, Dec. 21 (JTA) - Israeli officiali tended today to play down the Syrian shelling of villages in the Christian enclave in south Lebano vesterday and last Thursday as a one-time affair that did not herald a serious deterioration of the situation. Syrian artillery opened fire Thursday apparently in retaliation for the deaths of three Syrian soldiers during an Israeli attack on terror ist targets in south Lebanon several hours earlier.

One Israeli soldier, a corporal, was killed and three were wounded in the strikes against six terrorist strongholds and supply bases by para troopers and elements of the crack Golani Brigode. An estimated 10-15 terrorists were killed

An army spokesman said the attacks were in line with Israe 's declared policy of hitting terrorist targets preemptively to forestall attacks on Israel before they can be launched. judicial process of our country. He denounced the Council for hypocrisy in considering the case for the third time this year while ignoring the Soviet invasion of Afghanistan, the Libyan invasion of Chad, the Iran-Iraq war and the ordeal of the American hostages in Iran.

U.S. Goes Along With Condemnation

The real bombshell in the vote was that the United States went along with the other Council members to condemn Israel for expelling the two mayors. It was the first time since last March that the U.S. had voted against Israel in the UN, and President Carter himself repudiated that vote after he came under fire from American Jewish organizations. However, after the vote Friday evening, U.S. Ambassador Donald McHenry stated, "Cynics may claim that we would have voted differently before November 4, but I can't be hostage to cynics. As soon as the vote was taken Friday, Kawasme and Milhim announced that they were conducting a hunger strike inside the UN; hoping that this unprecedented action would force Israel to readmit them. Sécretary General Kurt Waldheim gave the two men personal permission to conduct their hunger strike: The mayors had been expelled originally last May following the terrorist ambush killings of six yeshiva students in Hebron. They appealed against their expulsion and were again expelled earlier this month.

Their hunger strike in the UN building is unprecedented. Other demonstrators have also staged profests on the UN premises but have be removed by guards and turned over to New York City police. entist and activist Viktor Brailovsky, seen in the context of the dramatic drop in Jewish emigration from the USSR and the intensification of anti-Semitism, was profoundly disturbing. Cotler observed that Brailovsky's arrest in particular was "an aminous note, Brailovsky being for the Soviet Jewry movement what (Andrei) Sakharov is the dissident movement."

Canada's Stand Appreciated

Cotler expressed appreciation for Canada's strong stand in Madrid by Ambassador Louis Rogers, particularly his outspoken condemnation of anti-Semitism. MacGuignan replied that "Canada regards Soviet anti-Semitism as unacceptable and has told the Soviets in Madrid that all persecutions, harassments and violations of human rights must stop at once.

The Canadian minister has recommended a post-Madrid continuing review of human rights violations by an internationally established co mittee of experts to monitor compliance with the Helsinki human rights agreements. He also proposed to the Soviets the establishment of a bilateral round-table conference on the impleme

ISRAFL LINVEILS ITS NEW CHANCERY IN WASHINGTON By Joseph Polakoff

WASHINGTON, Dec. 21 (JTA) - Israel unveiled last Thursday its magnificent and spacious new chancery in Washington in the presence of about 500 leading Washington officials, including U.S. government officials, diplomats, business and professional leaders.

The four-story brick structure, the design and color of which reflect contemporary construction in Jerusalem, houses all the Israeli offices, that, for the past several years, have been scattered in three buildings.
The Embassy itself, the residence of Israel's

Ambassador, also is considerably closer to the chancery. Under Secretary of State David Newson, the top U.S. official present, lauded Ambassador Ephraim Evron's services and friendship, and added: "On this day, a special occasion, I can congratulate the government of Israel on this beautiful symbol of

the beauties of Israel, and also congratulate my good friend, Ephraim Evron."

"Newsom also observed "the very sincere hope" of the State Department that the Camp David peace process will continue. He noted that the mental and frank discussion" between Israel and the United States "made this process possible and will be

carried on."

Washington's Mayor, Marion Barry, expressed the "friendship and kinship of the people of Israel and the people of Washington." Barry is Black and Washington's population is three-quarters Black. Both Barry and Newsom spoke at the ground-breaking ceremonies for the chancery on Israel's Independence Day in May, 1979.

Chancery Is Well Protected

Israel's chancery, located at Van Ness Street and Reno Road, is the first in the "international center" established by the State Department for a dozen char ceries. None other has yet been built, although options have been taken by various governments. The center adjoins the University of the District of Columbia and is in a well-to-do residential area of northwest Wash-

In keeping with modern security requirements, the building is protected by brick and metal feat an entrance that permits easy access only with the approval of a secluded award. The cost of the building and its furnishings totalled \$5 million overall, Evron

· Dominating the chancery is the atrium that involves the building's four floors and leads to a large hall for conferences and receptions. Works of some 50 Israeli artists decorate the interior and exterior. making the structure a showcase of Israeli art. Works include those of Ruben Rubin, Menasha Kadishman, Yigal Tomaikas, and Yisrael Shemi.

Planning for the building began in 1977 during Premier Menachem Begin's first trip to the United States, when former Israel Ambassador Simcha Dinitz and former White House Chief of Protocol, Evan Dobell, signed an agreement leasing to Israel land in the international center.

In lauding those who contributed toward the planning and construction, Evron-gave special thanks to Robert Kogod of Washington "for his tireless efforts on overall development." Architect Louis Bernado was credited with the building's architectural design, and Yeshayahu Mandel, Israel's architectual consultant, added the flavor of Jerusalem to the design.

Sam and Saul Stern were named for their assistance in the procurement of office furniture and the interior design services provided by their designer, Wilda Schrade. The Israel Museum of Jerusalem, the Tel Aviv Museum and the America - Israel Cultural Foundation assisted in the art program and coordinat ing the contributions of the works of art.

SPECIAL TO THE JTA WIENER LIBRARY HAS BEEN MOVED FROM LONDON TO TEL AVIV UNIVERSITY

Library, described as the world's largest, mostimportant and most comprehensive source of information on anti-Semitism, the Holocaust and fascism, has been moved from London to Tel

The collection, which has been referred to

Aviv University. as a chamber of horrors, was established in Amsterdam in 1933 by Dr. Alfred Wiener, a Ger

man Jewish scholar who early on recognized the dangers of the rising Nazi Party and began to devote himself to documenting its practices. Wiener moved it in 1939 to London, where

it opened on the very day World War II broke out. During the war the library, which he continued to head, was extensively used by the

British intelligence services as a major source for information about German affairs and by the British Broadcasting Corporation for its counterpropaganda services. After the war, the library was expanded by the addition of eye-witness accounts of Naz

atrocities, transcripts of the Nuremberg and Eichmann war crimes trials, and documents from the gestapo and Nazi Party archives.
Wiener died in 1964. Since then the library which bears his name has been headed by Prof. Walter Loqueur, who divides his time between London and Tel Aviv, where he is on the faculty

of the Tel Aviv University. Information Contained In The Library

It also comprises up-to-date material on modern manifestations of anti-Semifism, including material published by Arab propaganda offices.

The Wiener Library, which is continually being expanded by the addition of new current material and older documents now being discovered, is a major source of information for all scholars doing research on the Nazi period and

anti Semitism. A complete copy of the collection remains in London, on microfilm. During his lifetime Wiener made frequent efforts to have the library transferred to Israel. The move was finally made possible by a donation from an undisclosed bene-factor.

Childrens' Games Included

The collection includes a number of children games widely sold during the Nazi period. One of them, entitled "Juden Raus" (Jews Out), is in the form of the children's game of snakes and lodders, or the modern game of monopoly, in which powns depicting Jews in medieval hats and clothes were to be moved about a board until undoubted victor. Addressing a ceremony last week marking the Wiener Library transfer to Israel, Tel Aviv University rector Yoram Dinstein described it as "one of the most important collections now housed in the University."
