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A SCOTTISH FISHING VILLAG

OF THE ARAB-ISRAELI CONFINER 3 0 1981

LONDON, March 24 (JTA) -- Until yess recently Dundee was best known as a fitting port in eastern Scotland famous to its fruit cake and its football team.

But It has now acquired unlikely significance as a cockpit of the Arab-Israeli conflict. Some 400 Jews, and Gentile friends of Israel from all over Scotland, attended a stormy meeting at Dundee University Sunday to protest against the town's de-cision to "twin" itself with Nablus as a gesture of solidarity with the Palestine Liberation Organiza-

If Ernie Ross, the town's pro-Arab Labor MP, had thought that this "twinning" arrangement could go through smoothly, he was gravely mistak en. The meeting attracted not only local Jews, ( but Gentile friends of Israel, such as Scottish nationalist leader Winifred Ewing, and the Board of Deputies of British Jews led by its president, Greville Janner MP, who flew to Dundee from London for the day with fellow honorary officers. The national

press, radio and television were also on hand.
What attracted them to Dundee was not merely the gesture to the PLO, symbolized by the display of its flag in Dundee's Council chamber, but the fact that it coincided with unprecedented displays of anti-Jewish prejudice in Dundee.

There are only about 20 Jewish families in Dundee and there is no previous record of anti-Semitic outbreaks since the community was founded

over a century ago.

The fact that the "twinning" did not go unop posed was initially due to the leader of Dundee's tiny community, Dr. Albert Jacob. His outspoken and single-handed protests were "rewarded" three weeks ago by the appearance of anti-Semitic daub-ings on the home of his 81-year-old father.

#### Nazi Symbols On Town's Synagogue

The shock was redoubled last weekend when more Nazi symbols appeared on Dundee's synagogue The perpetrators, however, performed an unwitting service to the Jewish and Israeli cause. On landing in Dundee, Janner asked his pro-Arab colleague, Ross, as well as James Gowans, the Lord Provost, to inspect the daubings.

It was a graphic illustration of Janner's argu-ments about the affinities between anti-Zionism and anti-Semitism. Directly attributing the outbred to the link with the PLO, Janner told the protest meeting: "When you twin a city with an organiza-tion of terror and hang up its flag you are creating a climate of hatred." An abashed Lord Provost promised to ask the Civic Council to have the floa

Council members still remain committed to visiting Nablus in exchange for a visit by the Arab town's mayor, Bassom Shaka, who was himself the victim of a terrarist attack last June widely attri-buted to Jewish extremists. Under the influence of the weekend's uproar, however, Council membe

are considering extending their visit to an Israel Kibbutz. Perhaps they will find that Israel is just as attractive as Nablus.

### WARNING SOUNDED THAT MEETINGS BETWEEN THE VATICAN, PLO OFFICIALS THREATEN JEWISH-CHRISTIAN RELATIONS

NEW YORK, March 24 (JTA) -- Criticism con-tinued here of the meeting held at the Vatican last week by Cardinal Augustino Casaroli, the Vatican's Secretary of State, with Farouk Kaddoumi, head of the Palestine Liberation Organization's political department. The criticism was coupled with a warning that such incidents threaten Jewish-Catholic relations.

A letter protesting the meeting was sent to Msgr. Jorge Mejia, of the Vatican's Secretariat for the Promotion of Christian Unity, by the National Christian Leadership Conference for Israel, a coalition of Protestant and Catholic cleray and laity who seek to foster understanding and support for Israel in the United States.

"By officially receiving those who vowed to add one more horrible chapter to the long history of Jewish suffering, the Church -- we believe -nourishes fear among our Jewish brothers and sisters: that once again Christians will foresake them at a critical moment in their history," the Leadership Conference said." In light of past experience such sentiments are all too understandable."

The letter declared that: "We hope and pray" for a clear word from the Holy See that legitimate concerns about the Palestinian people and questions about Jerusalem cannot be negotiated with people who, through their National Covenant and their actions, threaten the very survival of the State of Israel as well as the peace of the world."

The letter was signed by Dr. Frank H. Littell, president of the Leadership Conference; Sister Rose Thering, vice president; Rev. William Harter, secretary-treasurer and Rev. Isaac Rottenberg, executive director.

#### Concerned Over Emerging Pattern

The American Jewish Congress also expressed concern that Casaroli's meeting with Kaddoumi was part of an emerging pattern of Church actions that threatens a deterioration of relations between the Church and Jews.

With the election of John Paul II (as Pope), a witness to the destruction of European Jewry; we were deeply hopeful that the Catholic Church would be more responsive to the depth of Jewish suffering and the necessity to prevent a recurrence of such crimes against the Jewish people," Henry Siegman, executive director of the AJCongress said. # EBANI ISRAEL HAS TO SHOW SPIRIT OF CONCERN, NOT MELANCHOLY IN FACE OF ARAB INTIMIDATION OF THE WEST By Kevin Freeman

NEW YORK, March 24 (JTA) — Israel will have to display a "spirit of concern, not melan-choly" to fend off "international intimidation" stemming from "Arab ability of extortion of the industrialized nations of the world," Abba Eban, former Foreign Minister of Israel, said here yes-

Addressing the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, Eban, who is presently a Labor Party member of Knesse referred to current West European economic poli cies and British Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher's agreement to let her ministers meet with Palestine Liberation Organization leader Yasir Arafat or with any other PLO representatives.

Eban said, The International community is intimidated by Arab power," in reference to oil supplies, and declared that Thatcher's meetings are "an attempt to undermine" United States Middle East peace initiatives. Eban cited the lack of participation on the part of the European during the Camp David process.

Eban said the Reagan Administration is seeking to "discourage" a PLO-British meeting. He said "No Israeli government would support any initiative" resulting from a British-PLO meeting.

#### Possible Role For Saudis In Peace Process

He reiterated criticism of the proposed sale to Saudi Arabia of U.S. sophisticated equipment for the F-15 jets now awaiting delivery, includ-ing AWACS with capabilities to "peer" into Israeli land bases. He said it is clear that U.S. foreign policy does not consist exclusively of a military program in Saudi Arabia. Eban, however, observed that the U.S. may be able to encourage a Saudi-peace dialogue and hoped there "might be elements in Saudi Arabia who can see that the real danger is not from Israel but from the Soviets." He did not identify the Soudi elements.

Eban said the Saudis may be the "ill or the key for the next stage of a Camp David process. He said with the peace talks stalled, the Reagan Administration took the correct decision "by not putting the Arab-Israeli dialogue at the head of American concerns."

Eban said President Anwar Sadat of Egypt will surely head his government in the later part of 1981, whereas uncertainty still surrounds Israel with elections scheduled in June. Either way, he said the "durability of the final accord respands to Egypt's needs as well as ours.

SEPHARDI JEWISH LEADERS CLAIM CLIMATE IN ISRAEL FOR IMMIGRATION IS "WORSE THAN EVER AND TERM PROJECT RENEWAL A 'TOTAL FIASCO" By Maurice Samuelson

LONDON, March 24 (JTA) -- Sephardi Jewish leaders from several countries expressed profound disappointment with Premier Menachem Begin's Likud government. They said that the climate in Israel for immigration was "worse than ever" and that Project Renewal, Begin's emer-gency plan for improving the lot of 100,000 of Israel's poorest citizens, had been "a total flasco."

The criticism of the Israeli government and the Jewish Agency came at the end of a meeting yester-day of the World Sephardi Federation's aliyah and social commission, which was attended by Nissim Goon, the Federation's president, who had origin-ally proposed Project Renewal to Begin shortly after the 1977 Israeli general elections.

Summing up the two-day conference, Roger Pinto, the commission's chairman, spoke of a "total lack of coordination" between the Ministry of Housing and Absorption and the Jewish Agency and said this was frustrating would-be immigrants to Israel.

#### Aliya Difficulties Spelled Out

Pinto, a French businessman and leader of the French "Ziona" movement, spelled out the difficulties faced by the World Sephardi Federation in promoting aliya to Tiberias and Kiryat Shemona in answer to the government's plea for more Jewish settlers in Galilee.

On the one hand, he said, Jewish Agency officials had told the Federation that there was no scope for immigration in Tiberias because of local unemployment, On the other hand, the European head of the Jewish Agency's aliyah department had said it had 20 vacant apartments there and was calling for families to occupy them.

Pinto added that the Federation would therefore press on with its own program to encourage a further 40 families to settle in Tiberias in addition to the 60 Sephardi families who had settled there in the past two years. If there was not enough work for them, it would find the necessary investment to create new iobs there.

A similar situation had arisen in Kiryat Shemona where the Federation had decided to send out 15 young volunteers to the town despite the claim of the Jewish Agency office in Paris that it had received no instructions from Israel concerning these volunteers, Pinto said.

The charge that Project Renewal had been "a total fiasco" came from another French member of the commission, Jacques Abu-Hatzeira, who said that although the Sephardi Federation had "big hopes" when Begin came to power, "almost nothing" had been done

The project, entailing provision of 45,000 apartments over a five-year period for badly housed israelis, was "still only at the start of the road," even though the Begin government was nearing the end of its term of office, Abu-Hatzeira said. He and Pinto emphasized that they were equally critical of previous Labor-led governments and were not interferring in Israeli domestic politics.

#### HIAS AIDED 28,000 REFUGEES IN 1980

NEW YORK, Morch 24 (JTA) -- During 1980 -its centennial year -- HIAS helped almost 28,000 refugees find new homes in free nations, accord-Ing to reports presented to board members from throughout the country at its annual meeting here yesterday This figure represents the second largest number of people helped by the Jewish migration agency in any single year since World War II, and includes 18,631 Soviet Jews, It was announced by HIAS president Edwin Shapiro.

To carry out its worldwide activities in the past year, the agency spent \$18,587,793; which includes funds furnished by the United States government for the resettlement of 5,157 indochinese refugees, 2,781 Cubans and smaller numbers of other HIASassisted emigrants from other countries.

#### BIPARTISAN OPPOSITION IN SENATE TO U.S. SAUDI ARMS SALE By Joseph Polokoff

WASHINGTON; March 24 (JTA) — Nineten Senators—Il Republicans and eight Democrats— spake out in the Senate today against the Reagan Administration's Intention to provide Sould Arabia with equipment to enhance the combat capabilities of the 62 F-15 warplanes they have purchased from the U.S.

The Administration has not yet formally notified Congress of its proposed sale of extra fuel tanks and air-te-air missiles to Soudi Arabia that critics say would create an additional threat to Isroel. The Administration contends that the purpose of the equipment is to strengthen indigenous forces against Soviet penetration of the Middle East oil fields.

TEL AVIV, March 24 (JTA) — Agricul true Minrister Ariel Sharon claimed today that Jewish settlements on the West Bank were helping the Western world's defense posture in the region. He said he did not think the Carter Administration understand this but saw signs that the Reagan Administration might be more receptive to his thesis.

## BEHIND THE HEADLINES THE SWEET SMELL OF SUCCESS By Maurice Samuelso

LONDON, March 24 (JTA) — The bitter-sweet political relations between Israel and Britain are currently going through one of their bitter phases. But trade relations between them rarely attracted so much attention as they did last week proving the durability of the Anglo-Israeli connection.

Even more significant, perhaps, is the fact that for the very first time the balance of trade has swung in favor of Israel. She now sells Britain not only fruit and vegetables but a growing range of industrial products, like those that were on show in London's West Centre Hotel.

Among the products featured there were automotive parts, security systems, domestic appliances, air conditioning, solar energy equipment, medical equipment, rubber, plastic and metal cutting systems, batteries, computers and many more.

#### **Evidence Of Complex Relations**

The complex relations between the two countries were evident at the Chamber of Com merce anniversary dinner where the guest speak-ers were Sir Keith Joseph and Gideon Patt, the

sh and Israeli industry ministers, respectively Both men were speaking against the background of severe economic difficulties in their res pective countries. Sir Keith, after paying the requisite compliments about Israel's technological achievements, expressed his amazement that Isrgel could remain civilized while their inflation rate was running at 135 percent. "Please write a simple text book for us on how you manage this," he pleaded with Patt.

Patt did not oblige but made it clear that Israel was so dependent on imports of vital weapons that she simply could not afford the "luxury" of the ruthless deflationary policies which raised

Britain's unemployment to its highest level since the dark days of the depression. Israel presented contrasting pictures of iron economic discipline on the one hand and inflation ary anarchy on the other, in terms of their mutual trade it was Israel which was by for the healthier partner.

#### Politics Rears Its Ugly Head

It was here, too, that politics recred its ugly head in the familiar form of complaints about Britain's acquiescence to the Arab boycott. doout Birtains, acquiescence to the Arab coycon.

asserted that fear of the boycoth was the main
reason for the relative fall in British sales in Isreal, causing the Jewish State to access being
Britain's biggest Middle East market,
In immoducing Sir Keith, he challenged him

to provide some words of comfort about the British government's attitude to the boycott and an assurance that it would take active steps to counter it, rather than simply wringing its hands.

With equal cander, Sir Keith, who is a former vice president of the Chamber, said he could not give such an assurance, asserting his belief that trade relations with Israel could flourish regardless of the boycott.

The other political factor which overshadowed the Chamber of Commerce event was Israel's new found friendship with Egypt, symbolized by the pres-ence of the Egyptian Ambassador to Britain, Abu Saeeda, and his economic counsellor. The applause which greeted every reference to the Egyptian Ambassador and to the Egyptian-Israeli peace freaty for exceeded that given to Anglo-Israeli relations, the

official theme of the evening.

Lord Marcus Sieff, the Chamber's president, poke warmly of his recent meeting with President Anwar Sadat and called for British businesses to become involved in the development of economic ties between israel and Egypt. Shlomo Argov, Israel's Ambassador, went even further by forecasting that Egyptian-Israeli trade would one day be greater than Anglo-Israeli trade and that Israel would also begin

trading with other Arab countries. The Ambassador diplomatically steered clear of

his current political difficulties with the British government. But the sweetness of his remarks about Egypt merely emphasized the bitterness of his thoughts about Britain, whatever the course of their commercial relations.

#### UMANIA REPUDIATES AND CONDEMNS AN ANTI-SEMITIC TRACT

NEW YORK, March 24 (JTA) -- Ambassador Nicolai Ionescu of Rumania has informed the World Jewish Congress that his government categorically repudiates and condemns an anti-Semitic tract that has appeared in Bucharest and that appropriate measures have been taken to halt its circulation in Ru-

The envoy made that clear to Rabbi Arthur Schneier, chairman of the WJC American Section who had called his attention to the booklet defaming Jews and expressed concern. Schneler had requested the strongest government intervention to halt dissemination of the material. Among other things, it accuses Rumanian Chief Rabbi Moses Rosen of being an agent of a universal Jewish cabal.

Ionescu explained to Schneier that the publication was neither inspired nor sanctioned by the Rumanian authorities and in fact was not printed in Rumania but illegally introduced from another country. He noted that there are many organizations outside Rumania, most of them fascist or irredentist, that clina to the condemned attitudes of the Nazl era and try to impair good relations between the U.S. and Rumania. He said the Rumanian authorities will not allow this poison to be spread.

"Rumania wishes to reaffirm its commitment to maintain good relations between our countries and with the Jewish community based on mutual understanding and friendly and open cooperation, "the Ambassador told Rabbi Schneier, Schneier observed that it was "reassuring to know that the Rumanian authorities will not permit a renaissance of anti-Semitism to raise its ugly head in any form that would directly effect the Rumanian Jewish community of 35,000."
