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NEW VIOLENCE ON THE WEST BANK FOLLOWING SHOOTING AT TEMPLE MOUNT

JERUSALEM, April 12 (JTA) -- Violence erupted anew on the West Bank, in East Jerusalem and the Gaza Strip today in the aftermath of the shooting on the Temple Mount yesterday morning. The Arab population observed a general strike to protest the killing of two Arabs and the wounding of more than a dozen others by a man tentatively identified as Allan Harry Goodman, an American-Jewish immigrant serving in the Israel army reserve.

Marches and demonstrations in the occupied territories escalated into clashes with Israeli security forces. At least a dozen Arabs were injured as troops and border police fired weapons and used tear gas to disperse rioters in villages, towns and refugee camps.

Six Israelis and four tourists were hurt in stone-throwing incidents this morning. An NBC television cameraman received a bullet wound in the left shoulder. It was unclear whether it was a live bullet or a cartridge used to propel a tear-gas canister. He was treated at a hospital and released.

Sixteen persons were reported hospitalized for injuries received in disturbances in East Jerusalem today. An Israeli woman and her two-year-old son were on the critical list for head wounds suffered when a bus was stoned near the Jewish suburb of Neve Yaacov.

Almost Total General Strike

The general strike, called by the Moslem Supreme Council in East Jerusalem yesterday was almost total there and in the territories. Schools and shops were closed and public transportation was at a standstill. The Council, the supreme religious authority of Palestinian Arabs, renewed its call today for a week-long strike. In effect it rejected the Israel government's expressions of regret over the shooting and the government's contention that the killer was demented.

While the government condemned the shooting, it accused the Council of exploiting the incident for political purposes. A statement issued by the Prime Ministers Office today described the perpetrator as "mentally ill" and expressed pain over "the terrible sacrilege and the loss of life."

At the same time, it cautioned the Moslem religious body against "spreading a blood libel." The statement observed that the Council should "remember that the days of the Mufti, Al-Husseini, Hitler's agent, are gone never to return."

The reference was to the late Haj Amin Al-Husseini, the Grand Mufti of Jerusalem during the British Mandate in Palestine, who incited to violence against the Jewish community and defected to the Nazis in World War II.

The statement by the Moslem Supreme Council today expressed disbelief that the man responsible for the shooting was mentally disturbed. It noted that it was hardly likely that an insane man would be inducted into the Israeli army.

Mayor Teddy Kollek of Jerusalem attempted to restore calm to the city. He raised no objection to an attempt by Moslem notables, escorted by Christian

clergymen, to hold a "peaceful march" to the Temple Mount today. Kollek advised the police to allow the Moslem community to "let off steam." But security forces halted the procession just as it got started on the main street of East Jerusalem and arrested several of the participants for questioning.

Casualties Mounting

Meanwhile, casualties mounted throughout the occupied territories where order appeared to have been restored last week after 10 days of disturbances triggered by Israel's ouster of three West Bank mayors. Incidents today ranged from attempted sabotage to fierce rock-throwing melees.

The Jerusalem-Tel Aviv railway line was blocked near the Arab village of Batir on the outskirts of Jerusalem. The barrier was removed without incident. But fires were burned in the village streets and several Israeli vehicles were stoned.

Serious disturbances were reported at the Deheishe refugee camp near Bethlehem. Arab youths blocked the Jerusalem-Beersheba road and threw rocks at Israeli soldiers and military vehicles. Soldiers opened fire, aiming at the feet of the Arabs. Tear gas was also used to quell riots in Ramallah and El Bireh north of Jerusalem.

The most serious disturbances occurred at the Nusseirat refugee camp near Khan Yunis in the southern Gaza Strip. A massive demonstration was held by Arabs waving Korans and Palestinian flags. Stones were thrown at Israeli vehicles. Soldiers opened fire, wounding six Arab youths.

In Rafah, on the Gaza-Sinai border, an Arab youth attempted to set fire to the town hall. Others stoned Israeli vehicles and hurled burning tires at the local branch of the Bank Hapoalim. The demonstrators reportedly were dispersed without casualties.

A curfew was clamped on the Balata refugee camp near Nablus after riots this morning. In Nablus, an Arab youth was wounded when soldiers opened fire on stone-throwers in the central market place.

Investigation Of Assailant Continues

Meanwhile, police continued to investigate the background of the man apprehended in the Temple Mount shooting. After some initial confusion, his name was given as Allan Harry Goodman, 38, originally from New Jersey. The first police reports yesterday had identified him as Elliot Guttman, 30. According to police he immigrated to Israel recently, was enlisted in an army reserve training program for older immigrants and was on active duty. He used an Israel-army issue American M-16 automatic rifle in his shooting spree.

The police reportedly have established that Goodman had no connection with the extremist Kach faction headed by Rabbi Meir Kahane, founder of the Jewish Defense League. A Kach spokesman in Jerusalem denied the group had any knowledge of Goodman and said Kach deplored his act.

But in New York today, Kahane told a press conference that Kach would provide a lawyer for the accused man and said it was "outrageous that people are throwing someone who is Jewish to the dogs." According to Kahane, Goodman had visited Kach headquarters in Jerusalem several times to pick up leaflets.

The police investigation appears to be centered now on Goodman's brother, reported to be in Europe, Kol Israel Radio said today, on grounds that both men are members of some other extremist Jewish group.

Although the police have given few details apart from identifying the accused man, they reportedly determined that his actions during the last few days indicated that the attack on the Temple Mount was premeditated. Eleven of the wounded remained hospitalized today, four in critical condition.

(In New York, the American Jewish Committee said today that it "shares the outrage and condemnation expressed by Israel's government and people at the murder and the sacrilege committed yesterday." The statement, issued by Rita Hauser, the AJCommittee's foreign affairs commission chairperson, added: "Our sympathy goes out to the victims. Vigilante action, like terrorism, spawns hatred and death. Both must not only be condemned but halted, if peace is to come to the Mideast.")

STOESSSEL GOING TO ISRAEL TO TRY TO REDUCE TENSIONS IN THE MIDEAST

WASHINGTON, April 12 (JTA) -- Declaring that "the situation remains tense in the Middle East," the White House announced today that Deputy Secretary of State Walter Stoessel is being sent to Israel to confer with Premier Menachem Begin over concerns here that an Israeli strike into Lebanon may be imminent.

Deputy Press Secretary Larry Speakes said this morning that Stoessel's mission would be to "do what he can to reduce tensions" through discussions with the top level Israeli leadership. The announcement came only hours after the U.S. Ambassador to Israel, Samuel Lewis, emerged from a three-hour meeting with Begin in Jerusalem last night saying he had the Prime Minister's personal assurance that Israel has taken "no decision to go into Lebanon in any way, shape or form."

Stoessel is the ranking official at the State Department in the absence of Secretary of State Alexander Haig who is currently attempting to mediate the British-Argentine crisis over the Falkland Islands. Concern was expressed here over the weekend that Israel might attack Palestine Liberation Organization bases in south Lebanon while world attention is turned toward a possible Anglo-Argentine war in the South Atlantic.

Speakes said the U.S. is "in relatively constant contact" with Middle Eastern governments urging them "to use maximum restraint." Appeals to all parties to exercise restraint were made by the State Department over the weekend. The Department's Deputy spokesman, Alan Romberg warned Friday that "This is a time for maximum caution."

New Tension Between Israel and Egypt

Meanwhile, Nicholas Veliotis, Assistant Secretary of State for Near East and South Asian Affairs, arrived in Israel from Cairo today for a series of conferences with government leaders in Jerusalem. Veliotis is reportedly seeking to ease new strains said to have developed between Israel and Egypt as the April 25 deadline for Israel's withdrawal from Sinai approaches.

Israel has raised complaints against Egypt in recent days but it was not certain if any of them were sufficiently serious to delay the withdrawal. Israel has accused Egypt of cooperating with the PLO and helping it smuggle weapons from Sinai to Palestinians in the Gaza Strip.

Israel has also expressed concern that the Egyptian delegate to the non-aligned conference in Kuwait failed to refer to the Camp David accords and the autonomy negotiations in his speech there over the weekend.

Finally, Israel has alleged that the Egyptians have deployed more troops than allowed under the peace treaty terms in the sectors of Sinai they now control. There is, in addition, the unsettled dispute over the Sinai-Israel border. Israeli Defense Minister Ariel Sharon was scheduled to go to Cairo tomorrow in another attempt to resolve the border dispute. (See separate story, P.4.)

ISRAEL ARMY BEEFS UP ITS PRESENCE IN THE YAMIT AREA

TEL AVIV, April 12 (JTA) -- The army today beefed up its presence in the Yamit area to prevent the infiltration of more members of the "Half the Withdrawal" movement, as members marched along the northern (Israeli) side of the border in an anti-withdrawal demonstration.

Some 2,000 movement members took part in the march, which the organizers had originally planned would take place within the Yamit zone. But the area has been declared closed to civilians by the army, and the organizers decided to avoid clashing with the army by keeping to the north of the fence and marching along the main roads "to allow even babies in perambulators to take part," the organizers said.

The movement organizers said "hundreds" of supporters had infiltrated into the Yamit area last night. They were chased by troops and many were detained for illegal entry into a closed area. But most were released immediately as they were under the age of 16.

Meanwhile, the dismantling of homes and equipment continues in Yamit and the surrounding villages, some of which now consist only of one of two buildings in which die-hard residents are holding out to the last minute.

SHAMIR WARNS ISRAEL WILL DEAL WITH THE MURDERERS OF BAR-SIMANTOV

BONN, April 12 (JTA) -- Foreign Minister Yitzhak Shamir of Israel warned that his country will find a suitable answer to the murder of Israeli diplomat Yaacov Bar-Simantov in Paris last week. In an interview with the West German daily, Die Welt, Shamir asserted that "the answer will come, but not in the same place where the attack took place." Bar-Simantov, 42, was gunned down by an unidentified woman outside his home. Israel holds the Palestine Liberation Organization responsible for the murder.

Shamir, in his interview, launched an appeal to all European governments "to create conditions" which would substantially limit the activities of the PLO offices in various European capitals. He said that because the PLO offices have diplomatic immunity "international terrorism can almost undisturbed meet all the necessary preparations for its operations. The immunity provides a cover for the subversive activities" in which the PLO is engaged.

According to Shamir, the PLO is the largest world wide terrorist organization. "In its camps in Lebanon terrorists of various nations get military training,

arms, forged papers and anything necessary to carry out their missions," he said. Currently, he noted, there are 2,500 non-Arab terrorists in PLO camps, including Turks, French, Germans and South Americans.

Shamir observed that all the terrorists trained by the PLO were prepared for missions in the Western, democratic world, and not in Communist countries. "This is their operation area," he said. "They abuse the freedom of the West."

TWO TERRORISTS NABBED BY ISRAELI SOLDIERS AS THEY INFILTRATED INTO ISRAEL FROM JORDAN

UNITED NATIONS, April 12 (JTA) -- Israel sent today a letter to the president of the Security Council, Ambassador M. Kamanda va Kamanda of Zaire, drawing his attention to an infiltration of two terrorists last Friday night from Jordan to Israel. The two terrorists were captured by Israeli soldiers in the Jordan valley and were identified as members of El Fatah, the military arm of the Palestine Liberation Organization.

The letter, written by Israel's Ambassador Yehuda Blum, concluded by stating: "This act once again testifies to the criminal character of the terrorist PLO which is bent on the deliberate indiscriminate murder of civilians irrespective of nationality and creed."

Lebanon Charges Israeli Troop Concentration

Meanwhile, Lebanon sent a letter to the Security Council, dated April 10 but circulated here today, charging "massive Israeli troop concentrations" on the Lebanese-Israeli border. The letter, by Ambassador Ghassan Tuani of Lebanon, said that the concentration of troops by Israel violated the 1949 armistice between the two countries.

The Lebanese envoy stated: "Massing of troops which has been taking place during the past few days, widely publicized, had been preceded and is now accompanied by official Israeli threats against the territorial integrity of Lebanon, in total violation of the UN charter and the most elementary principles of international law."

NEO-NAZIS IN HAMBURG REPORTED TO HAVE ORGANIZED INTO A NEW GROUP

BONN, April 12 (JTA) -- Interior Minister Alfons Pawelczyk of the federal state of Hamburg said the neo-Nazis in the city have been organized under a new name. According to the minister, the newly organized "Hamburg List to Stop Foreigners" is a coalition of several neo-Nazi groups, including one led by Michael Kuehnen, who has been sentenced to four years in prison for rightwing violence.

The first meeting of the Hamburg List was called by Ulrich Harder of the neo-Nazi National Democratic Party (NPD), who was himself elected vice chairman. The elected chairman is Hans-Juergen Sabrautzki, who was chairman of the NPD in Hamburg from 1976 to 1978. Other members of the central committee are activists of the young guard of the Hamburg NPD.

At least two members of the committee are, according to Pawelczyk, well known activists in Kuehnen's organization, which has been involved in many violent incidents and in continuous anti-Semitic propaganda. The Hamburg List is apparently under close surveillance by the

Internal Security Service, which may explain the detailed data possessed by the Interior Minister.

Meanwhile, scores of public organizations have called for a ban on the new group which intends to participate in the upcoming Parliament elections in Hamburg.

PLANS UNDER WAY TO ESTABLISH MEMORIAL FOR SOME 300 MEMBERS OF ISRAELI INTELLIGENCE COMMUNITY KILLED SINCE ISRAEL WAS ESTABLISHED

TEL AVIV, April 12 (JTA) -- About 300 members of the Israeli intelligence community have fallen in active service since the establishment of the State in 1948, and plans are now under way to establish a memorial to them.

Reserve Maj. Gen. Meir Amit, former head of military intelligence and chairman of the Intelligence Memorial Committee, said that about two-thirds of the fallen 300 were members of military intelligence, with about 100 members of other non-military intelligence services, including several non-Jews.

"Till now, they have been as anonymous in death as they were in their work," Amit told a press conference here yesterday. The memorial will contain the names of some of the fallen, but not all, as some must still remain anonymous. One was buried abroad as a non-Jew, after execution as a spy.

Defense Minister Ariel Sharon has said it cannot provide financial support for the project, and a public appeal is therefore being made.

SPOKESMAN SAYS PALESTINIANS ARE VICTIMS OF NAZI GERMANY

SAN JUAN, P.R., April 12 (JTA) -- In a speech to the Puerto Rican Society of Women Journalists Dr. Hatem Hussaini, director of the Palestinian Information Office in Washington, D.C., declared here that today's Zionists are the same as yesterday's Nazis. "We, the Palestinians, are today's victims of Hitler's Nazi Germany," Hussaini stated. "We, the Palestinians, are the modern Jews."

Blaming Zionists and supporters of Israel, as well as the Western press, for stereotyping the Palestinian people as blood thirsty terrorists Hussaini insisted the opposite is true. "(We) are human beings who have suffered a devastating tragedy, a people who yearn for peace and tranquility but who have been robbed of their lands, their homes, their property, their inherent rights."

The Palestinian spokesman, holder of a Doctorate in political science from the University of Massachusetts, rejected terrorism as a means to achieve the creation of a Palestinian state, but claimed, "we must have justice before there can be peace."

Referring to a United Nations General Assembly resolution adopted in November 1974, Hussaini emphasized "the right of the Palestinian people to regain its rights by all means." When queried whether this is not in fact a code phrase for terrorism, he replied that "the people have a right to resist oppression and mass relocations. Why are Israeli acts of violence against Palestinians not seen as acts of terrorism against us?"

NEW YORK (JTA) -- The American Jewish Congress has called on the Reagan Administration to support a bipartisan resolution in the Senate and House that would require the U.S. to suspend its participation in the UN General Assembly and withhold its assessed contribution to the UN if Israel or any other democratic state is expelled, suspended, denied its credentials or denied its rights."

6 JEWISH LEADERS CONFER WITH REAGAN

WASHINGTON, April 12 (JTA) -- Six Jewish leaders met with President Reagan at the White House today in what was described as an effort to improve the access of the Jewish community to the Administration. None of the six would comment to reporters as they left the White House, except to say it had been "a good meeting."

Richard Krieger, director of Jewish community affairs of the Republican National Committee, said the White House had asked for the meeting and limited the number attending to six.

He said that Max Fisher, of Detroit, chairman of the Republican National Jewish Coalition, and Albert Spiegel, of Los Angeles, were asked by the White House to select the other four. They selected three other Jewish Republicans -- Gordon Zacks of Columbus, Ohio, Richard Fox of Philadelphia and George Klein of New York. The sixth person was Lawrence Weinberg of Beverly Hills, Calif., who is president of the American Israel Public Affairs Committee (AIPAC).

Anticipates Complaints

Krieger acknowledged that there would be complaints from other Jewish leaders, such as Howard Squadron, chairman of the Conference of Presidents of Major American Jewish Organizations, who were not invited. He said the number was limited to six by the White House and originally was to have been only Republicans but it was decided to invite Weinberg who is not a Republican.

Krieger noted that other members of the executive committee of the Republican National Jewish Coalition could not be invited. He stressed, however, that this was the first of a series of meetings and others would be included in future meetings, such as Squadron, Morton Mandel, president of the Council of Jewish Federations, and the presidents of other Jewish organizations.

Before the meeting with the President began, Krieger and Thomas Dine, executive director of AIPAC, attended a briefing by the National Security Council. Dine and Krieger did not attend the meeting with Reagan or a luncheon later with Elizabeth Dole, the President's Assistant for Public Liaison. Krieger said one of the matters discussed today was finding a replacement for Jacob Stein as the President's liaison to the Jewish community. The position, which is under Mrs. Dole's jurisdiction, has been open since Stein resigned last January.

I.D. OF ATTACKER OF MOSLEM WORSHIPPERS REMAINS UNCERTAIN

NEW YORK, April 12 (JTA) -- Uncertainty continued today as to the positive identification and United States address of the bearded man who opened fire with an American made M-16 automatic rifle into a crowd of Moslem worshippers and tourists on the Temple Mount in the Old City of Jerusalem yesterday morning.

Israeli police sources yesterday tentatively identified the assailant as Elliot Guttman, 30, who is married and who emigrated from the U.S. six years ago. According to Israeli Interior Ministry sources, quoted by Kol Israel Radio last night, his name is Allan Harry Goodman, a 38-year-old bachelor from Tenafly, New Jersey who

immigrated to Israel only 13 months ago. According to information obtained by the Jewish Telegraphic Agency from various news organizations today the assailant was not a resident of Tenafly, but from Baltimore. The Baltimore Jewish Times said today that Guttman (Goodman) resided for an unknown period of time in a boarding house in that city. It is now boarded up, the Jewish Times reported.

Further information suggests that the link between the assailant and Tenafly resulted from Guttman's (Goodman) use of a stolen passport from a female resident of the northern New Jersey town. According to information from The Record in Hackensack, N.J., the leading North Jersey newspaper which serves the Tenafly area, Guttman (Goodman) may have been able to use the woman's passport because of the similarity in their names. No other information was immediately available concerning this allegation.

ISRAEL'S DISSATISFACTION WITH EGYPT IS GROWING STRONGER

JERUSALEM, April 12 (JTA) -- Israel's dissatisfaction with Egypt seemed to grow stronger today with several senior ministers issuing sharp public warnings and criticisms and some Herut politicians openly urging a postponement of the final Sinai withdrawal on April 25.

These developments came as the U.S. Deputy Secretary of State Walter Stoessel prepared for a diplomatic rescue mission to Israel and Egypt. Designed to patch up the disputes between the two countries before the withdrawal deadline, Stoessel will arrive in Israel Wednesday night and meet with Premier Menachem Begin Thursday.

Regarding the other current crisis, over the situation in the north, tension appeared to lessen somewhat following Begin's assurance to U.S. Ambassador Samuel Lewis last night that the Israel government had not decided to go into Lebanon "in any way shape or form." Lewis repeated this assurance to newsmen, and Begin himself reiterated it at a meeting today with visiting U.S. Congressmen.

At the same time, however, Defense Minister Ariel Sharon and other ministers warned publicly today that the government would fulfill "its duty to defend the citizens of Israel" and would strike at the Palestine Liberation Organization "when and how it sees fit." Sharon made those remarks at a convention of "Young Herut" in Jerusalem and Trade Minister Gideon Patt echoed them while visiting a factory in the northern kibbutz of Hanita.

As regards Egypt, officials here still steer clear of the word "crisis" in describing the present situation. But they do speak of a "crisis of confidence," and are united in their insistence that Egypt must respond to a string of Israeli complaints before the Sinai withdrawal deadline is at hand.

Begin remarked to the U.S. Congressmen today that while Israel's compliance with the terms of the peace treaty is "scrupulous" Egypt's is sometimes not so. Both Begin and Shamir, in their meetings with the Congressmen, a delegation of the House Armed Services Committee, expressed the hope the problems could be "overcome."

The U.S. diplomatic effort to shore up the peace treaty and see it safely through the April 25 deadline got under way today when Assistant Secretary of State Nicholas Veliotis met for several hours with Israel's top leaders.
